      - v. Senators Collins and King cosponsored a law to increase protection against robocalls, and it has been signed into law. It

will broaden the authority of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to levy civil penalties of up to \$10,000 per call on people who intentionally flout telemarketing restrictions; Extend the window for the FCC to catch and take civil enforcement action against intentional violations to three years after a robocall is placed. Under current law, the FCC has only one year to do so, and the FCC has said that "even a one-year longer statute of limitations for enforcement" would improve enforcement against willful violators;

Require telephone companies to adopt call authentication technologies, enabling a telephone carrier to verify that incoming calls are legitimate before they reach consumers' phones; Requires telephone companies to provide robocall blocking technology at no additional charge; and Direct the FCC to initiate rulemaking to help protect subscribers from receiving unwanted calls or texts from callers.
