LUNCHEONS - Our second Thursday luncheons have continued with wonderful food and interesting speakers as well as a great chance to socialize. The April 2023 speaker was Grace McCarthy and the May 2023 speaker was Monica Hawk of Spectrum generations. Watch for future speaker announcements.

FELLOW'S GRANT WORK ENDING - Kathryn Harnish a Lifetime Communities Fellow of the Maine Center on Aging is ending her year of work with us made possible with grant funding. The work began with the organization of a listening session with representatives of area organizations and programs which serve older adults, especially those at risk or socially isolated (Food Pantry, churches, fire and rescue, select board, sheriff's office). They were asked what they perceive as the needs and strategies to better connect with older adults and work together.

Kathryn wrote a report on the listening sessions (now available on the town's committee website) which identified community assets and resources, partnerships, strategies, and needs. These conclusions served as the basis for our past year's work: the creation of winter kits which were distributed late last fall, a resource directory to be published soon, and greater collaboration with the Bowdoinham Food Pantry. The Committee Co-Chairs had weekly zoom meetings with Jason Lamoreau, Bowdoinham's Older Adults Services Coordinator and Kathryn Harnish to check on the projects. Kathryn has assessed these projects and she and Jason will share this report with other Lifetime Communities Fellows. We will remain in touch with Kathryn as issues emerge or when an outside perspective

is needed. THANK YOU, KATHRYN, FOR YOUR WORK!

Jason attended a meeting with the group of Lifelong Community Fellows to share experiences in their assigned communities and network on issues. Jason, has to deal with a huge number of age related town issues. He indicated that there was a lot of interest in Bowdoinham's winter kit project. Jason continues to be extremely busy with tasks for the committee. He responds to many individual calls about community resources, organizes committee events, networks with many local groups and agencies. THANK YOU, JASON, FOR ALL YOU DO!

UNIVERSAL DESIGN - Bowdoinham has received a Flagship Grant of \$8,240 through the AARP Community Challenge to develop a handbook on Universal Design. This strategy is intended to help residents and contractors involved with new construction or renovation projects make buildings more accessible to everyone of any ability. It suggests both large and small steps in building design to improve accessibility.

This grant coincides with town initiatives to expand Bowdoinham's housing supply for two growing markets: young families and older residents. Our housing committee has hosted 2 forums concerning community housing needs. Age Friendly Bowdoinham Committee member Grace McCarthy is Co-Chair of the Housing Committee.

TRAILS EXPERT - We continue our work to make every Bowdoinham activity and place accessible for anyone with movement challenges. To this end we hired well-known trail evaluator Enoch Glidden of Community Geographics to advise the Community Development Advisory Committee, Recreation Department, and Age Friendly Bowdoinham Committee on improving accessibility of its waterfront trails. He visited Bowdoinham and followed the existing trails on June 5th for a formal assessment. This was made possible thanks to an anonymous gift and a grant from UNE & Maine Center on Aging that paid him for this professional assessment. We should note Enoch is well known in this field and has been featured on NPR describing his work on making trails accessible.

GORGEOUS ACCESSIBLE TRAIL - With regard to accessibility, I was lucky enough to

visit The Boothbay Land Trust's Oak Point Farm which has beautiful accessible trails - a 0.6 mile loop to the rocky shore, along the shoreline, and around the fresh water pond which is suitable for wheelchairs and strollers. There are benches in lovely spots and lots of birds and wildflowers to admire. There is a longer loop as well and a delightful ecofriendly playground. It is near the Coastal Botanical Gardens.

Bowdoinham Historical Society - The Bowdoinham Library Plant Sale

In 1974, Bowdoinham's School and Public Library was a small building with big glass windows between the brick former hardware store and 26 Main Street, the house across from Merrymeeting Hall. The building has had a number of persona- a pool hall, a candy store, perhaps other sorts of shops. Inside, it had been painted, at some point, battleship gray, likely paint someone had on hand. At her oak desk in the light of the back window sat Bowdoinham's librarian, Eva Palmer.

The late 1960s and early 1970s had seen an influx of new young families to town. Several of the young wives decided that the library could use a sprucing up! But what to do for money? One of them had the idea of selling extras of their house plants and maybe even a few perennials they had found growing in the gardens of the old homes they had bought. So on May 18th, 1974, they assembled their wares and set them out behind Dot Dickinson's store (now the Three Robbers). Enough of them sold to bring in \$131.00 which purchased enough paint-grapefruit and tangerine- to brighten things up a good deal. In fact, the tangerine is still with us. It is the back of the wooden shelves that form the hall in Merryreading Books. We conserve, preserve, and make use of what we have.

The sale had grown and evolved by 1977 so that we decided to move it into the Town Hall. The next year, our 5th sale, Frank Beckwith of North Yarmouth delivered flats of annual and vegetable seedlings for us to add to the sale; and the Fire Auxiliary held a snack bar and back sale in the parking lot.

In 1981 we began keeping track of what we had and what we sold on index cards in order to help us gauge what we needed for the next year's sale. This record keeping continued for nearly 40 years until 2020 when the pandemic forced the sale to retreat to a few plants lined up on the Steen's lawn.

In 1982 part of the proceeds in the amount of \$1,513 was set aside to help fund the 1984 move into the Coombs School. The Coombs School Thrift Shop, dedicated to renovating the Coombs Building, opened on Plant Sale Day. We also began creating the 2" x 7" plant signs with picture, Latin name and information on each plant.

In 1983, our 10th sale made \$2,008. In 1986 Frank Beckwith delivered 2 trucks (736 packs) of seedlings for the sale. (Up from 214 in 1981)

The Burroughs gave the first of many crabapples, purchased to raffle at the sale. To celebrate our 15th year, we sold our first t-shirts. In 1989, we had expanded to the point where the trees and shrubs had to be moved outdoors, and Cathy Reynolds became our Tree Lady.

Lots happened in 1992: Strings were strung for the hanging of plant signs, Frank Connors sold Town Hall bat guano. Sarah Stapler open her garden for tours, and for the first time, Mike Patterson piped the line of customers into the hall.

In 1993, our 20th sale, we stopped collecting and potting in styrofoam cups. We created the first Plant Sale Gift Certificates, and \$300 dollars was set aside to buy tables for the town hall.




In 1996, Brent Zacheau and Josephine Mussomeli built the wonderful tulip signs to advertise the sale. In late 1990s tables and sawhorses were built for the sale and

Cathy Reynolds took over as our undaunted Chairperson in 1999. For 2003, our 30th year, Sarah Stapler designed canvas tote bags to sell. And we were recognized be the State Legislature as the Longest Running Plant Sale in the State of Maine.

2007 saw Chuck Kincer begin playing the bagpipes to open the sale. In 2009 we shifted from wooden tongue depressor plant labels to printed plastic sticks, all under the supervision of Kate Brinsmade, our 'label Queen.' In 2010 we made the most money for the library of any previous sale: \$14,598. 2013 was our 40th sale. It rained hard all day- the worst weather in 40 years - but the sale went on and we added a cake decorating contest; "40 Years and Still Growing Strong" was the theme.

Little did we know that 2019 would be our last in the Town Hall. In pandemic years, 2020, 2021, 2022, the annuals were sold online, and there were some plants for sale at Steen's. This year -2023- we had hoped to return to the Town Hall, but recent strong weather events precluded that, so we held our 50th and final sale in a huge tent at the waterfront. Cathy Reynolds and Jen Foley, back from plant sale retirement, watched over it in strong winds, and the sale was a huge success. We had sold out of nearly everything by 2:00 pm. The new tote bags also sold out but Kate Cutko has ordered more! We raised over \$16,000, a record breaking amount. A HUGE thank you to all who have helped with this special Bowdoinham event over the years.

Happy Summer from the Bowdoinham Food Pantry!

Ten years ago on May 18th, 2013 the Bowdoinham Food Pantry opened its doors for the very first time. Out of a small basement room no bigger than a large closet, the Pantry's very first client, a woman shopping on behalf of a young mother too embarrassed to be seen at a food pantry, was assisted. Ten years later, the Pantry operates out of its current location at 9 Main Street serving well over 180 families, close to 330 adults and over 180 children each year.

The idea for the Pantry was born from the experiences Kathy Tome had while volunteering at the Bowdoinham Community School. Kathy, a resident of the town, Selectboard member, and active community volunteer noticed the need and organized a meeting to gauge interest in a pantry. On January 17th, 2013, twenty community members assembled at the Community School and it was quickly determined that yes, Bowdoinham needed and wanted a food pantry.



On May 4th, 2013, a food drive was hosted in front of the Bowdoinham Fire Station. Volunteers fired up a grill and cooked for folks as they dropped off non-perishable items that would soon stock the newly built shelves in the Pantry's first home located in the basement of the First Baptist Church. Floors had been replaced and walls repainted by enthusiastic community members. The Pantry, in its first iteration, was ready to serve the folks of Bowdoin and Bowdoinham. At the beginning, a few shoppers, mostly folks

who were older and on fixed incomes, utilized the Pantry each week. Volunteers recognized the need to get food into the tummies of kiddos, and our beloved Backpack Program started quickly thereafter. Volunteers often made homemade soups and bread to serve to folks who shopped each week, filling the small space with warm delicious smells and a sense of community.

As months passed, business picked up. It quickly became evident that the basement room would soon be outgrown. The search began for a new home. Determined to stay independent and not be under the regulation of the town or state, Pantry organizers were particular about where the Pantry would move. In 2014, Kathy approached Fred Haer, CEO of FHC, Inc. and secured a space at 9 Main Street. This location was a room that sits next to Merrymeeting Art Center's gallery. The space was a significant improvement allowing for larger quantities of stock, a centralized location and increased visibility.

When COVID hit the scene, demand increased dramatically. For the safety of all, the Pantry shifted from in-person shopping to a drive-thru model. Volunteers 65+ were sent home and the Pantry faced the task of feeding more with less hands, in an entirely new way. During this time a larger space opened up at 9 Main Street and the Pantry moved to its current home. Through a grant from Good Shepherd Food Bank, the Pantry purchased a large walk-in refrigerator. This allowed us to expand the quantity and quality of fresh foods we were able to store and distribute. After the COVID vaccine became widely available we began offering a combination of drive-thru and in-person shopping options. In mid-2021, in-person shopping fully resumed.

Jennifer Stonebreaker was hired as Executive Director in the fall of 2021. Jennifer has made it her mission to reduce the stigma around shopping at the Pantry, increasing the numbers of folks utilizing our services, and fostering an atmosphere of inclusion, compassion and community. Over the past year, raised garden beds have been planted in front of the Pantry: open 24/7 to all members of the community. We have worked with SNAP-Ed hosting elementary aged kiddos for a six-week Cooking Matters class held right



here at the Pantry. In the summer of 2022 the Pantry began staffing the Info Booth/SNAP table at the Bowdoinham Farmers' Market - our presence there doubled the amount of SNAP purchases in just one summer. Recently, we have partnered with Mid Coast Hunger Prevention Program out of Brunswick renting their Community Kitchen once a month to hold classes and cook ready-made meals to offer during pantry distribution.

As we celebrate our 10th birthday, the Pantry has never been busier.

The Pantry is abuzz and we are so grateful to our Pantry Family - volunteers, donors, and clients alike.

We're open for in-person shopping each Wednesday from 4-6PM. Come shop with us!



What Boaters Need to Know About the New Engine Cut-Off Switch Law

A law which took effect in 2021 requires boaters to use an engine cut-off switch on all personal watercraft (PWCs) and most powerboats less than 26 feet in length except those whose main helms are inside an enclosed cabin. The law aims to reduce the problem of runaway boats and propeller strikes.

Also called a “safety lanyard” or “engine kill switch,” an engine cut-off switch is designed to stop a boat’s engine if the operator is thrown from the helm. The system typically consists of a switch mounted to the boat’s console (or the engine itself in the case of tiller-style outboards) and a clip that must be inserted into it for the engine to run. The clip is attached to the operator’s life jacket, clothing, or wrist with a flexible lanyard, ensuring that when the driver leaves the helm for any reason the clip pulls out and immediately stops the engine. Wireless versions are also available, doing away with the physical tether and allowing the operator a little more flexibility to roam.

The law doesn’t require you to have the lanyard attached when the vessel is idling or performing docking maneuvers. The rule takes effect when the boat reaches planing speed, which means you’ll need to have your cut-off switch and lanyard attached before you push the throttle forward. The Comprehensive Planning Committee (CPC)

The Comprehensive Plan update process takes a long time! Although it's almost a year before the 2024 Town Meeting, when community members will vote on the 2024-2034 Comprehensive Plan, the committee members are already holding additional meetings to review and update each Goals and Recommendations section. We are discussing and approving several sections and finalizing our recommendations at every meeting.

We completed the Vision about a year ago. Since then, we have had many discussions and presentations by community members. At the May meeting we approved Goals and Recommendations for the two existing sections of Recreation and Water Resources as well as two new sections on Age Friendly and Public Health.

I've included the Goals of those four sections below. If you would like to see the recommendation details, please let me know. All of our materials are public records – just too long for a newsletter!

Recreation: Recreation is an important aspect of life in Bowdoinham that greatly adds to Bowdoinham's quality of place.

Goals

1. To promote, protect, and improve the availability and accessibility of outdoor recreational opportunities.
2. To plan for, develop, promote, and encourage recreational opportunities for all ages.
3. To plan for and develop regional recreational opportunities and facilities.
4. To expand on the list of current recreational offerings.

Water Resources: Bowdoinham prides itself on its location on Merrymeeting Bay, Kennebec River, Abagadasset River, Cathance River, West Branch and many streams; all of which have played an integral role in Bowdoinham's history.

Goal

1. To manage and protect our water resources, including aquifers, wetlands, ponds, streams, rivers and Merrymeeting Bay.

Age Friendly: The vision of Age Friendly Bowdoinham is to foster changes in the physical and social environment to make Bowdoinham a better place to live for people of all ages and physical abilities.

Goals

1. To expand and promote services and supports to assist individuals to remain in Bowdoinham as they age.
2. To enhance the accessibility of services, buildings, events, and the physical environment.
3. To enhance programs to reduce social isolation and build social connections.
4. To develop accessible and affordable housing that promotes independent living.
5. To expand transportation options.
6. To develop, support, and promote recreational programs and facilities appropriate for all ages and abilities.

Public Health: Over the past 10 plus years there have been several public health/health-related events related to increasing extremes in weather, pest-borne diseases, and the Covid-19 pandemic. Emergency response services have also emerged as an issue. It is anticipated that between 2024 and 2034 additional health-related concerns will continue to emerge.

There are existing resources to inform community members and address these and other health-related issues that exist in Sagadahoc County, the Mid Coast Public Health District, and the State of Maine that are currently not readily available or known about among Bowdoinham community members. These resources include information about health care, mental health resources, prevention of disease, and other support services to help all to thrive.

The population of Bowdoinham residents reveals higher percentages of individuals ages 0-9 and over 60. Both age groups tend to require more prevention and treatment resources than other age cohorts.

The duties of the Local Health Officer (LHO) of Bowdoinham are to deal with environmental health protection and nuisance control, and other duties as needed. The needs stated above are beyond the scope of that position.

Goals

1. Maintain adequate access to reliable emergency response services.
2. Increase community member awareness and knowledge of available county, public health district, and state level health/public health resources.
3. Increase preparedness for emerging health and public health conditions.

Future newsletter articles will continue to include the sections and goals. You are always invited to comment and add your thoughts by coming to a meeting or letting Yvette know at planning@bowdoinham.com or share your thoughts with any CPC member.

Housing and Land Use will be the final sections that we address. Even though it may be early to think about September, the Comprehensive Planning Committee members are already planning ways to gain more input on those issues at Celebrate Bowdoinham and at one or more public forums.

There is still time to join the Comprehensive Planning Committee. You can sit in on a couple of meetings without making a long-term commitment, or just stop in when we are discussing topics to interest to you. We want to include more perspectives and voices.

Meetings are the second Tuesday of each month, 6:30-8:15 in the Graduates Room of the Coombs building. Yvette Meunier, Director of Planning and Development, staffs this process; her email is planning@bowdoinham.com. We can have up to 17 members and more perspectives are always welcome.

TAX CLUB PLAN – PROPERTY TAXES

Applications Available July 1, 2023

The Town of Bowdoinham is pleased to continue to offer our popular "Tax Club Plan" which allows property owners to pay their annual property tax bill in monthly installments without incurring interest. This plan was first authorized by a vote at the Town Meeting in June 2014 and is expected to be offered again this July after Town Meeting approval.

To be eligible to participate in this plan the property owner must be current with their property taxes, must complete and return an enrollment application no later

than July 31, 2023, and must abide by the requirements of the plan. Applications will be available beginning July 1st.

Automatic electronic payments are not offered under this plan, however, property owners can schedule payments online through the Town's online payment system (<https://bowdoinham.androgov.com>).

Getting Started with the Indoor Rower: You will find a flyer near the rower to help guide you with the physical technique as you move through the motions. To start, use a damper



setting of 1-3. As the wheel spins faster, the resistance will rise. Your first few workouts on the machine should be 3-5 minutes intervals keeping your strokes per minute displayed around 20-22 strokes per minute (SPM). Try using the rower within your continuous cardio workout, alternating with other equipment.

One suggestion is to do up to 4 of these short intervals if you feel good. Gradually increase your SPM to 22-24, then 24-26.

On Saturday, the library (together with the Merrymeeting Arts Center) is pleased to welcome Michael Albert, a collage artist from NYC. He will be spending a special



First pass, the twin gravestones of Galen & Sarah Gray look pretty much like a hundred other monuments in Bowdoinham's Ridge Cemetery. Both are soft graying marble, standing side by each and facing the street. One stands erect, the other bends at a near 45 degree angle. You need to drop to your knees to read the second one.

"Galen Gray, died Oct 18, 1832, aged 47." Your first thought may be sadness for Galen, until you read the word directly above his name: "United Above, United Below!" Look next to the stone of Sarah H. Gray, and you'll read: "Sarah H., Wife of Deacon Gray, died Feb. 1, 1875, age 79." We deduce Sarah died 43 years after her husband, never remarried, staying widowed on Bowdoinham Ridge.

A quick check of our Adams history tells us the Grays were of note locally. The pair were among only two dozen charter members of the Free Baptist Church on the Ridge. They were early advocates to build the little brick church that still stands today, Adams tells of the fledgling society meeting in the Ridge School, in private homes, even sharing space on occasion with Baptist groups in the Village. What a shame it is that Galen died six years before their church opened.



Look at these two stones, go find them and share their history. Two proud pioneers of our Town buried near their church, near their farm, near their friends.

Find the graves. Drive Ridge Road past the Community School. The Cemetery is on

your left, nearly four miles from town. Enter the Cemetery using the second lane, you'll see the two stones on your left. The Ridge is one of our Town's "best" Cemeteries, take time to wander. (Frank Connors, Cemetery Sexton. Photo credit to Silas A. Morin)

Recreation News

Update on Spring Activities – It was an exciting spring for Bowdoinham Recreation with the addition of two new youth activities to our traditional programs. First, Bowdoinham created their first youth cross country running team as part of the Coastal Running League. We had 20 runners this spring who competed in meets across southern coastal Maine throughout the month of May and ended with a Championship meet in Cumberland on June 3rd competing in front of 1,800+ runners and spectators! Plans are in the works for Bowdoinham to host one of the Fall session meets.

We also saw the introduction of Quickball, which replaced traditional T-ball. Quickball is 6U baseball training program owned by major league baseball that teaches the fundamentals of the game in a fast-paced but safe environment. This program utilizes specialty equipment designed for younger children to use safely and teaches in a fun

manner with entertaining accessories and exciting characters. Our season saw the Orioles, A's, Dodgers, and Pirates teams practice and compete in games on Saturdays throughout May and June. Thank you to all the coaches, parents, and siblings who made this a successful introduction of a new program that was exciting and is certain to grow in future years!

Our adult walking group, Silver Striders Walking Club, met each Wednesday from 4:30 – 7:00pm at the Community School through the end of the school year in mid-June. This group will re-convene in the fall when school is back in session.

Plans are in place (and construction is likely underway as you read this!) to repair both the tennis and basketball courts that the Town shares with the Community School. Groundwork includes repairing the "shoulders" of the courts as well as installing a new perimeter drainage system around both courts. This drainage system will connect to

new drainage systems on both Pertel softball and Middle baseball fields and everything will discharge to the gully on the northwest corner of the property. After the roundwork is completed, Beaverbrook Tennis, LLC will clean the courts, repair the large cracks on both courts, and install new paint surfaces. Also, the lines will be re-painted which will include lines for two pickleball courts on the basketball court and two on the tennis court as well. We are excited to get these courts back into great condition and even more excited to provide an area for a highly anticipated Pickleball program. We do ask for your patience this summer as the work is underway and the courts are temporarily unavailable.

Lastly, as we begin anticipating the fall recreation season, we will be looking for sponsors for our Fall Cross Country running team as well as the upcoming basketball teams. Please reach out anytime to recreation@bowdoinham.com!

You'll also find local artists Jane Page Conway, Mark Donovan, Howard Solomon, Wayne Sanford, and Bill Stanton's work at Cathance River Gallery. As well as Fiddlehead Leatherwork and others at the Merrymeeting Arts Center.

In the spirit of collaboration several farms will also be hosting artists including Allison McKeen, Connolly Wood & Craft, Inciardi, Merrymeeting Mittens, Molten Ceramics, Slow Grits Studio, Starrock Designs, and Windy Rose Studio along the way. Just Playing With Glass and Merrymeeting Stained Glass will be demonstrating their glass craft at Merrymeeting Hall. Bowdoinham Historical Society will also have the Meeting House and Jellerson School & Merrymeeting Bay Museum open for tours.

New for this year we are introducing a Passport Challenge. Get your passport initialed at participating farms and studios and win prizes! The first 20 passports turned into the town office between July 23-27 will receive a signed print of this year's brochure
