

# The Merrymeeting Trail

is a proposed 25-mile trail connecting the villages of Gardiner, Richmond, Bowdoinham, and Topsham. It would be built on top of the existing railroad corridor as a "trail until rail" – ready to be returned for train service if needed in the future.

## Key Facts

- In August 2023, a special Advisory Council voted to recommend that the Lower Road rail corridor be repurposed as a trail.
- The Merrymeeting Trail would connect to the Brunswick Bike Path in the south and the Kennebec River Rail Trail in the north.
- The last passenger train that traveled the rail corridor proposed for the Merrymeeting Trail did so in 1986. The removal of a train bridge in Richmond means rail service is not currently possible.
- The Merrymeeting Trail would be wide and level without steep sections – ideal for people of all ages and physical abilities. It would provide a safe, carbon-free alternative transportation route.



#### Where the Merrymeeting Trail Process Stands

- The Maine Department of Transportation (MaineDOT) owns the Lower Road rail line from Topsham to Gardiner and formed a "Rail Corridor Use Advisory Council" to consider using it as a trail.
- After nine months of fact-finding and discussion, including robust community comment, that Council recommended the rail corridor be repurposed as a trail on an interim basis.
- Now, the Commissioner of MaineDOT will decide whether to bring that recommendation to the Legislature.
- The Merrymeeting Trail Board of Supervisors is positioned to help facilitate local decisions as the project moves forward, including the potential for balancing different types of uses on the trail.
