In July we should have in place new leadership in the Town Office and in November Bowdoinham will go to a five member Board of Selectmen. Changes are coming and if we all work together we can ride out the economic bad times as well as the rising cost of oil and put Bowdoinham on a course for better days. In more ways than one things aren't all that bad in Bowdoinham. While nearly every town around us is facing a budget crisis, Bowdoinham's taxes are not going up. We have hard working department heads pinching pennies and a dynamite finance committee turning over every rock looking for spare cash. Over the past few years a major effort has been made to build Bowdoinham's fund balance to the highest level in history so financially we have never looked better.

Currently we are very fortunate to have so many volunteers serving on numerous committees. Dear Residents of Bowdoinham,

It is my great pleasure and honor to serve a second term as your State Senator during the 125th session of the Maine State Legislature. In January, the newly elected Legislature, along with a new chief executive, Governor Paul Lepage, began work on legislation across all areas of government, including the two-year budget that funds state government, as well as providing assistance to municipalities and schools.

This year elected officials and policy makers are overwhelming focused on working with the private sector to help our economy grow. Like the rest of the nation, Maine's economy is beginning to show signs of growth, however revenues continue to lag from the global recession, resulting in an estimated \$800 million shortfall at the state level. At the time of your town meeting the Legislature will have either completed or be nearly complete with the next two-year budget. In order to address this financial challenge, the Legislature has worked to seek additional efficiencies, while crafting solutions that minimize the impacts of cuts.

This Legislative session, I was reappointed to the Joint Select Committee on the Environment and Natural Resources, as well as being appointed to the Joint Select Committee on Regulatory Fairness and Reform. The Environment and Natural Resources Committee handles the majority of environmental legislation and regulation, while working to strike the right balance between the environment and the economy. In addition to the well being of our health and environment, this balance is extremely important to the Maine brand, tourism, and our natural resources, all of which employee hundreds of thousands across the state and help our economy thrive.

Dear Bowdoinham Neighbors:

It has been a great honor to serve for four years as your State Representative. As always, I welcome your comments and suggestions on the issues we address this session in Augusta. Like most states, Maine still faces the lingering effects of any major economic downturn. Even after incomes improve, sales and income tax revenue typically take a year or so to catch up. We must continue to focus state spending for positive economic impact. This means keeping money in the pockets of working families, maintaining the strong public services and infrastructure on which a strong private sector depends, and putting unemployed and underemployed Mainers back to work.

For Maine's long-term prosperity, our top fiscal and policy priorities must include working families, strong schools, energy independence, affordable health care and prevention, and infrastructure improvements to transportation, broadband connectivity, and research. Foundations of our economy such as our excellent workforce and environment must also be valued and protected.

As I write this in mid-March, I am working on the Legislature's Taxation Committee to evaluate the Governor's proposals for \$203 million in new tax spending. I am also sponsoring legislation to help young children get a better start, to create additional green jobs through small solar and wind installations, to increase transparency in elections spending, and to reduce health care costs and improve outcomes.

I continue to advocate for greater attention to the state roads in our area, and have invited the new Commissioner of Transportation to drive Route 24 with me. As you may know, the town is also working with the state to investigate longer-term, structural solutions for this road. I also continue to work for broadband connectivity in underserved areas. Fairpoint, the only state-regulated provider in our area, recently expanded DSL to hundreds in Bowdoinham, but many homes still remain underserved.

In my view good policy builds from the values of fairness, opportunity, and responsibility. Bowdoinham helped teach me these values, which I seek always to consider first as I represent you.

To help me bring your voice to Augusta, I do need to hear your questions, comments, and concerns. Please note my contact information below. Also, I send out an occasional e-mail newsletter to keep people up to date. If you would like to be added to that list, please send me an e-mail soon.

I'm proud to live in a state where individuals work so hard to sustain their communities.

We hold town meetings where neighbors can find compromise amid their disagreements, while still being able to say hello the next morning at the corner store. We help our neighbors through tough times by sending care packages to overseas troops, donating to local food pantries, and raising money for sick members of the community. And we work with each other to make the most out of bad situations.

There's no doubt that times are still hard for Maine's working families, but I'm optimistic about the future because all this hard work is starting to pay off. This year, Mainers have been able to turn bad news into good for Maine's economy. In Brunswick, Kestrel Aviation announced that it would start making airplanes with composite materials on the site of the closing naval base. In Biddeford, small businesses are thriving in the space once occupied by the now closed North Dam Mill. In Port Clyde, fishermen are starting to create jobs after forming a co-op in the wake of declining prices.

What's more, Maine communities are doing what's needed to take full advantage of these and other opportunities.

We're strengthening the infrastructure on which we do business by protecting Memorial Bridge in Kittery, bringing the Downeaster to the Midcoast, and expanding broadband Internet.

Local groups and businesses are working with me to fight for regulations that recognize the successful conservation efforts of our fishermen, don't overburden our small family farms, and protect our paper companies from Chinese trade practices meant to undercut them.

We're educating workers for new jobs, like in Kennebec Valley to train solar technicians, at SMCC for composite materials, and the University of Maine for other green jobs.

And we're taking care of our people by making sure veterans get the benefits they've earned, families aren't bankrupted by illness, and seniors don't lose their hard-earned savings to the excesses of Wall Street.

Dear Town of Bowdoinham:

As the new session of Congress began, I was honored to become the longest, currently serving member of the U.S. Senate to have never missed a roll call vote. As the 111th Congress ended, I cast my 4,563rd consecutive vote. It is a privilege to represent you in Washington, D.C. and I appreciate this opportunity to share some of my recent work as we look forward to the opportunities and challenges that lie ahead in the 112th Congress.

Creating jobs and strengthening our economy remain our nation's most pressing challenges. Far too many families and individuals throughout Maine and our nation are still suffering from a sluggish economy and high unemployment. That is why it was so vital for Congress to extend the 2001 and 2003 tax relief laws. I strongly supported a two-year extension because allowing these laws to expire would have resulted in one of the largest tax increases in our nation's history, and job killing tax hikes could well have plunged our economy deeper into recession.

Last year, I spoke to small business owners throughout Maine who told me that a tax increase could result in a loss of jobs and threaten the viability of their businesses. It is good news that Congress passed the two-year extension of these tax relief laws before 2010 came to a close, providing more certainty to businesses and relief for all taxpayers.

After years of repeated but unsuccessful attempts by the Maine delegation to address the federal truck weights law, I authored a successful truck weights pilot program in 2009 that was in effect for one year. The pilot program permitted trucks weighing up to 100,000 pounds to travel on Maine's federal interstates, where these trucks belong, rather than being diverted to secondary roads, through small communities, downtown areas, and school zones. The benefits have been evident: improved safety, lower costs, reduced energy use, and reduced emissions. I was disappointed that the U.S. House of Representatives failed to take action either to extend the pilot program or to make it permanent. Making the truck weights program permanent will be one of my top priorities this year and will be the first bill I introduce in the new Congress.

The President signed into law a number of bills that I authored or coauthored. I was proud to join Senator Joe Lieberman in leading the effort to repeal the so-called "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" law that applied to our armed forces. This long-overdue repeal enables the U.S to join 35 of our closest allies in welcoming the military service of any qualified individual who is willing and capable of serving our country.

My efforts to counter the smuggling of illegal drugs across the Canadian border into Maine, and vice versa, were advanced when the President signed the "Northern Border Counternarcotics Strategy Act." I was the lead Republican sponsor of this law, which requires the Office of National Drug Control Policy to develop a counternarcotics strategy similar to that of the Southwestern border in collaboration with our Canadian partners. The Senate Homeland Security Committee also conducted an extensive investigation into the Fort Hood terrorist attack. We will soon release a report with recommendations on how to reduce the possibility of such an attack in the future.

Former Senator Evan Bayh and I authored a new law that establishes a new Advisory Council to develop a national plan for combating Alzheimer's disease. For the first time, this law charges federal agencies to develop a strategy to advance efforts to fight this devastating disease, at no additional cost to taxpayers. As far too many people know, Alzheimer's disease inflicts pain and hardship on families, and costs Medicare and Medicaid billions, yet our nation has been lacking a national strategy to focus on this disease.

Maine's natural resource industries are essential to our prosperity. Last October, along with other Delegation members, I testified at an International Trade Commission hearing that resulted in a ruling that Chinese and Indonesian paper companies had been engaging in illegal trade that is unfair to our domestic industry. During the debate on the Food Safety Modernization Act, I successfully advocated for an amendment, backed by Maine's small and organic farmers, to protect our small farms from excessive regulation.

In my ongoing efforts to save jobs in Maine, I succeeded in convincing the EPA to rework regulations known as "boiler MACT" in a manner that protects the environment and public health without jeopardizing jobs in the forest products industry. I also authored successful legislation to provide small contractors more time to comply with EPA lead-based paint regulations. The high fines for non-compliance would have put many small contractors in Maine out of business.

Working with the University of Maine, I helped advance the development of deep water, off-shore wind energy. Last summer, Energy Secretary Steven Chu visited UMaine at my request, which resulted in an announcement that the Department would dedicate \$20 million to develop and test deepwater offshore wind technologies. UMaine remains on the cutting edge of this work, which has the potential to create 15,000 jobs.

I secured funding for a number of important transportation projects in 2010. For example, following my request, U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood announced that the Department would award \$10.5 million for Maine's effort to save freight railroad service in Northern Maine, and \$20 million for the rehabilitation of the Memorial Bridge between Kittery and Portsmouth.

As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, I worked to ensure that our men and women in uniform have the resources and support they need to protect our freedom. In 2010, I supported efforts to improve health care and other services for our military personnel and veterans, and authored key provisions to strengthen our national defense by supporting the vital work at Bath Iron Works, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, Pratt & Whitney, the Maine Military Authority, and other Maine industries. Following my letter last year to the President's top budget official urging him to include increased funding for the DDG-51 program in next year's budget, Defense Secretary Gates recently announced that the Pentagon would seek an additional DDG-51 in its five-year budget.

The 112th Congress will bring extraordinary challenges as we work to improve the economy, lower the unemployment rate, seek ways to reduce federal spending to bring the federal debt under control, and debate a host of other important issues. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve the Town of Bowdoinham and Maine in the United States Senate. Dear Friends:

Thank you for the opportunity to offer my best wishes and warmest greetings to the people of the Town of Bowdoinham. With the New Year upon us, many of us have no doubt made resolutions that we will be striving to keep. For my part, I have renewed my pledge to tirelessly serve you as your Senior Senator in the United States Senate and to do so always with our great state of Maine at the forefront of every issue I consider and decision I make.

Undeniably, our economy remains the foremost challenge facing us today. We are confronted by an economic crisis that has already lasted for more than three years. There is still much to be done, with some Maine counties still experiencing an unemployment rate over 9 percent. The climate of economic uncertainty created by myriad new federal health care mandates and tax increases has created additional obstacles for our nation's small businesses and resulted in a consistently high unemployment rate. As Ranking Member of the Senate's Small Business Committee, it is unfortunate that several actions for which I have advocated that could have immediate and measurable effects on job creation nationwide have not been put into action.

At this very moment our nation's primary job creators – small businesses – are wrestling with the onerous reporting requirements that will force employers to file '1099' statements on all transactions over \$600. I will continue to fight alongside my colleagues from both sides of the aisle for decisive policies that simultaneously thwart tax increases and repeal the policies that devastate potential for job growth in the economy so that our nation's small businesses have an opportunity to expand, thrive, and put Mainers and all Americans back to work.

The world is moving ahead with action on innovative technologies and it is past time that we set a new course for how we think about energy. Energy efficiency has emerged as one of the most effective and expeditious initiatives that can be taken to preserve valuable resources for producers and consumers. I believe we can build upon the success of past tax credits with critical energy efficiency tax incentives, which will spark innovation in our building and industrial sector and afford our constituents and businesses financial incentives to simultaneously reduce energy bills and invest in our economy. This is why I introduced and will work to pass a comprehensive package of advanced energy tax incentives that will create thousands of clean-energy and manufacturing jobs and increase U.S. energy security. Sheriff's Report

To the Residents of the Town of Bowdoinham:

On behalf of the members of the Sagadahoc County Sheriff's Office I want to thank the residents of Bowdoinham for their continued support. We are pleased to serve this wonderful community. Specific to the Town of Bowdoinham, the Sheriff's Office responded to or handled 815 incidents, which was a 14% decrease from 2009. The most common call for service was traffic related incidents which made up approximately 15% of the total calls for service. There were 48 motor vehicle accidents reported last year, a drop of nearly 20%. Of those reported, 12 involved personal injury and there was one fatal. The Patrol Division stopped 348 vehicles and issued 69 summonses and 38 warnings. There were 7 burglaries reported last year, a 50% drop compared to 2009.

The Sagadahoc County Sheriff's Office is also committed to a proactive approach in keeping our communities safe. We continue to work in partnership with various agencies throughout the County, believing that collaboration is the key to solving problems and achieving the goals that benefit our citizens. For example, the Sheriff's Office has continued to support and promote the proper and safe disposal of unwanted and unused medications. The benefits of this initiative are numerous, but notably it helps reduce the amount of drugs being diverted into the community for illegal use and it helps prevent accidental poisonings and other tragedies. It also benefits our ever important environment by keeping toxic medicines out of our surface waters, such as Merrymeeting Bay.

The Sheriff's Office continues to work with Merrymeeting Bay TRIAD to promote safe practices and awareness for elderly residents. Furthermore, we continue to work both ends of the age spectrum, working with seniors through such programs as the AARP Safe Driver's Course as well as partnering with the Bowdoinham Community School in teaching DARE to 5th graders.

The Sheriff's Office is pleased to maintain a public works program where inmates from Two Bridges Regional Jail can give back to the community. During the past year inmates toiled over 275 hours of community service to the Sagadahoc County Courthouse, which would be valued at approximately \$5,500 in taxpayer savings. Additional, inmates provided 60 hours of service to MSAD 75, for a savings of approximately \$1,200. We will continue to provide this valuable service through the coming years.

Regarding corrections, Sagadahoc County continues to see the benefit of the state's unified corrections system, which is completing its second year of existence. As a result, the cost of corrections is frozen at the 2008 level. This has resulted in a significant costs savings to the taxpayers of Sagadahoc County. However, we continue to benefit our county and inmates by utilizing alternative sentencing practices such as Adult Day Reporting, and Pre-Trail programs that saved the system over \$500,000 in direct costs in 2010.

The Sagadahoc County Sheriff's Office is committed to the prevention of crime, the protection of life and property, and the preservation of peace. By doing so, we can help make Bowdoinham a safe place in which to live, work, and raise a family.

M.S.A.D. 75 Report Rebekah Stimpson

chool year 2010-2011 has seen many changes in our district. Brad Smith has become our Assistant Superintendent of Schools and Darren Akerman became the part time principal at the Harpswell Islands School. Michael Estes returned to West Harpswell School as a teaching principal. The Bowdoinham Community School saw its enrollment remain above 200 students for the second year in a row. The teachers at the school have been very invested in two District initiatives to improve the literacy of all students. Shana Frazen, from the Teachers College of NYC is spending the year with teachers providing staff development in teaching reading and writing. At the same time the Bowdoinham Community School's Fundations pilot from last year is now being provided K-2 students across the schools to improve student word attack skills. The middle school has been implementing a standards-based assessment and grade reporting system and the high school has implemented a block schedule.

The District remains committed to making energy conservation improvements in our facilities. It also remains committed to improving the physical environment at the high school through its application to the state for funding to either renovate or build new. The District should know mid-spring whether it will qualify. The SAD 75/Brunswick Task Force continues to meet and find better ways to share resources. High school students, teachers and parents were recently surveyed to determine what that sharing could look like.



M.S.A.D. 75 Report Rebekah Stimpson

In February, the residents of the Town of Harpswell voted to close the West Harpswell School and to consolidate students in Harpswell at the Harpswell Islands Elementary School. The Board of Directors felt strongly that its capacity to provide for Harpswell students was compromised by the small student and staff populations. The Board had asked Harpswell residents the same question last year had voted to keep the West Harpswell School open. This year is the vote went the other way. The District will now work with Harpswell parents, staff and students to create a consolidated school of 169 students with an identity that reflects the coming together of Harpswell Neck with the Islands.

The larger SAD 75 community is getting involved with study circles – facilitated discussions of interested District community members, teachers and students around topics of significant interest to the District. This year participation has grown to about 50 individuals and the recent discussions have been about how to lift the high school Capstone Project. The Capstone Project asks seniors to provide an exhibition of what they have learned over their four years as an expression of the high school's goals for them. The school is piloting Capstone with some exhibitions this spring and anticipating full implementation for next year.

Budgetary issues continue to plague all public schools in Maine. SAD 75 issued a budget freeze in November in anticipation of further cuts in state funding. Currently we are looking at a loss of \$1.3 million in state subsidies and another \$350,000 in federal support. The budget process will continue through mid-April, when a final budget determination will be made. It will be a difficult process in these challenging economic times.

As our four communities continuing to work together, SAD 75 will meet the many challenges this economy presents us. We and the students of SAD 75 are fortunate to have dedicated leadership in administration, teachers, and support staff leading the way.

Citizens of Bowdoinham.

It has been my honor and pleasure this past year to serve the citizens of Bowdoinham as a Sagadahoc County Commissioner. Even after two years on the Board, I remain amazed at the County's broad scope of services and the complexities involved in overseeing them. I encourage interested persons to attend Board of Commissioners' meetings which are held the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 2:00 p.m. at the County Administrative Offices (behind the Courthouse) at 33 Court Street, Bath, Maine. (For details, call 443-8202.)

The Commissioners are always mindful of the impact the County tax assessment has on Sagadahoc municipalities. The Board is very pleased that, without impairing the quality of services provided, **the County has not increased the tax levy in four years.** As the Commissioners create the 2011-2012 budget, they remain committed to minimizing any increase in the levy.

During 2010, the County's many activities and accomplishments included:

Administration - created a new website at www.sagcounty.com which is frequently updated and expanded to keep the public informed;

Probate Court - processed 620 filings and became one of the first in the State to offer Court Call service which allows attorneys to attend court hearings by phone at no cost to the County;

Emergency Management Agency – coordinated the public school pandemic flu shot program, planned and implemented regional emergency training and mass casualty exercises, assisted local EMA Directors in meeting federal emergency preparedness requirements, obtained Homeland Security and other public safety grants and worked closely with area emergency responder organizations, and public health agencies including the Sagadahoc County Board of Health.

Although the State has not yet made its final decisions about reducing the number of Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs), it appears that the Sagadahoc County Regional Communication Center's status as a PSAP may be secure. In 2010 and continuing into 2011, the Communications and EMA Directors worked diligently to improve radio transmission/reception for emergency responders by adding two additional communications transmission towers to Sagadahoc's two existing tower sites. The addition of the two tower sites is expected to eliminate many of the County's communication dead zones – an improvement that is crucial to the safety of Sagadahoc residents.

Last year an extra Sagadahoc County court session was added to the District Attorney's Office schedule and the DA staff handled an unprecedented number of court cases. As the end of 2010 approached, the Registrar of Deeds Office reported that deed and mortgage recordings were on an upward swing – a good sign of a recovering economy. Throughout the course of 2010, the Sheriff's Office Patrol was able to conduct focused OUI, underage drinking and seatbelt details with the cost of man power being funded by several State grants The Detective Division maintained an exceptionally high case solve rate while the Civil Division stepped up its pace by serving an unprecedented number of civil documents to Sagadahoc residents.. Despite the turmoil that continued to surround the State's consolidated corrections legislation, the County's Prisoner Transport Division performed in a stellar manner throughout the year.

Public Works Department Report Kevin Prout

The winter of 2010 -2011 proved to be very challenging. As of April 4 we had 37 events with a Total of 104 inches of snow. Also making this past winter so challenging was the Public Works adding over 16 miles to its plow routes. The Board of Selectmen approved the pilot program and in doing so it saved the town of Bowdoinham approximately \$40,000 dollars.

The summer construction season proved to be equally as busy with the reconstruction of Cemetery Street. The project consisted of major drainage improvements as well as a 4 foot gravel shoulder and the installation of a 4 foot paved shoulder for pedestrian traffic. Other paving projects that were completed, Preble Road, Lucas Lane, Browns Point Road and Dinsmore Cross Road. We also did minor short term repair work on Millay Road. Again this year we focused much of our resources on our Gravel road system. The Public works Department completed extensive ditch work on many gravel roads and placed approximately 4,000 yards of new gravel on these roads.

Recycling/Solid Waste Department Report

David Berry, Solid Waste Manager

Bowdoinham's Recycling and Solid Waste program has had a good year. Larger amounts of mixed paper and cardboard shipped, together with increasing prices for all recyclable materials, have brought us our best year in the past five years. After deducting revenues from Solid Waste tag sales, disposal fees, and recycling income, the net cost of the 2010 program to Town taxpayers was under \$70,000. Recycling income nearly doubled, from a low of under \$14,000 in 2009 to over \$25,000 in 2010. Recyclable materials are basically commodities and their prices are really controlled by the global market, but apart from the big drop in 2009, revenues for the past four years have exceeded \$25,000 annually.

The Barn continues to function as a community resource, not only as a location to bump into neighbors and friends for an unscheduled visit, but also as a kind of Crackerjack box, where you never know what kind of prize you might find in the Gift Shop or the library, or even in a magazine box (sometimes it takes a long time for a magazine box to fill up, because the magazines often go out as fast as they come in!). The availability of second-hand clothing, probably the most popular resource in the Gift Shop, has suffered since the bedbug scare of last fall, when we stopped stockpiling clothing and began moving it out for disposal every week.

We hope to be able to resume our practice of keeping 8 to 10 bins of clothing on the second floor of the Barn for residents to pick through for treasure at some point in the future. Once again, Bowdoinham's Community School has won State acclaim for its excellent work in promoting recycling practices. Most of the mixed paper generated in the school is collected in every classroom by the students, as well as cardboard from the office and kitchen, and delivered to the Barn weekly by the Public Works Department. One of only three schools in the state to win a top prize of \$500, the Community School's program continues to excel under the able leadership of Cathy Curtis. Early awareness and practice of responsible waste handling creates good habits for future recyclers, and sometimes kids can teach their parents how easy it is.

As always, my report will close by recognizing the two elements which make our program so successful - our staff at the Barn and the residents of Bowdoinham who use the facility. Ramona, Cathy, and Bryan keep things organized and smoothly flowing on the days when the Barn is open for business, and get the materials, which often seem to flood in, processed, stored and shipped in time for the next week's flood. And keep the floors swept! With few exceptions, residents who deliver recyclable materials to the Barn, or who place them by the road to be picked up by our curbside haulers (who deserve praise as well for the steady and courteous service they provide) take care to deliver clean and well-sorted materials. And many of them, together with residents who only come in to get rid of non-recyclable items like tires, furniture, appliances, waste oil and wood, and household hazardous waste, seem to find time to cruise around and find something to take home with them. Nothing really gets recycled until it leaves the Barn!

And special thanks to Kate Cutko, our Town Librarian, who has just brought the Recycling Barn into the 21st century with her recently established blog about Barn doings. Check it out! http://barnofopportunity.blogspot.com/

Town Planner Report

It has been another busy year with a lot of exciting things happening in Bowdoinham.

The process to bring sidewalks to Bowdoinham is underway since the voters of the Town of Bowdoinham approved spending \$133,750 to match a "sidewalk" grant of \$535,000 in Federal Enhancement Funds from the Maine Department of Transportation Quality Community Program, on November 3, 2009. The Town is carrying out this project as a Local Administered Project and has hired Pine Tree Engineering to do the project design and assist with the construction administration. We are working to move the project from the design phase to the construction phase. Our goal is to have the sidewalks constructed in time for Celebrate Bowdoinham 2012, Bowdoinham's 250th Anniversary Celebration.

Back in June of 2004 the Town approved the development of a Skate park and over the last year we have working to make the Skate park a reality. We have identified a new location for the Skate park next to Mailly Waterfront Park, at 6 Main Street. The preliminary engineering for the site has been completed and we have conceptual design for the park. The next step for this project is to get the Town's approval for the location of the park. Once the Town approves the new location we will move forward with permitting and fundraising. Our goal is to have the Skate park completed for Celebrate Bowdoinham 2012.

The Merrymeeting Trail Initiative is working to create a regional trail from Topsham to Gardiner, which connects: the Androscoggin River Pedestrian Bike Path in Topsham, the Village Area in Bowdoinham, the Village Area in Richmond, and the Kennebec River Rail Trail in Gardiner. Over the last year we have been working with VHB to create a Corridor Study for the Trail. The overall goal for creating a Corridor Study is to develop a comprehensive plan for implementing the creation of a regional rail-trail that will serve as a recreational and transportation linkage. The Corridor Study will allow us to identify possible alternatives for phasing the trail's construction and ultimately allow us to pursue funding for the construction of the Merrymeeting Trail.

I have been working with the Planning Board with reviewing applications and assisting applicants with putting together their application package for the Planning Board. This year was a relatively quiet year for the Planning Board, which allowed the Board time to review the new Land Use Ordinance.

Comprehensive Plan update is underway with the Town's newly formed Comprehensive Planning Committee. This sixteen person Committee wants to create a Comprehensive Plan that represents what the Townspeople of Bowdoinham really want. To accomplish this goal the Committee will be soliciting your input over the next two years, so please do not be shy. We look forward to hearing your thoughts.



Code Enforcement Officer/ Local Plumbing Inspector Report

This has been a busy year at the State level. The State's building and energy code refer to as the Maine Uniform Building & Energy Code (MUBEC) came into effect as of December 1, 2010. And the State has adopted new Subsurface Wastewater Disposal Rules and a new Plumbing Code, which includes an increase in the cost of permits. Under the new rules, plumbing fees have increased from \$6 to \$10 per fixture and the fee for a new septic system has increased from \$100 to \$250.

Health Officer Report Rebecca Miller, RN, MPH – Local Health Officer

In Sagadahoc County, there is a formal Sagadahoc Board of Health of which I am a member. These meetings are held every two months and the topics are based on the current public health concerns. Further, every two months, the Sagadahoc County Local Health Officers (LHO) also hold meetings. The area LHOs discuss local public health concerns and share many ideas. These meetings are sponsored by our Sagadahoc Emergency Management Agency.

At these meetings, ACCESS Health, a Healthy Maine Partnership, provides materials for each town office in Sagadahoc County. These materials are displayed in a kiosk and updated every two months as needed. The materials provide seasonal information such as brown tail moth and various public health issues such as mental health issues or carbon monoxide. Most importantly, these kiosks have information on services that are available in our area such as health clinics and free services. When you are at the town hall, please check out the information in the kiosk.

Maine received national recognition for the work that was done on the H1N1 flu from 2009. Last year, the Maine Center for Disease Control was well prepared for a possible flu outbreak. For more information on flu in the state, go to

Vaccines were in plenty supply and a local flu clinic was set up in the Bowdoinham/Bowdoin and Richmond areas. Many people were able to get flu shots from their health care providers.

The browntail moth is back again this year. The hairs of the brown tail moth caterpillar can cause a very irritating rash or irritate a person's respiratory tract. It is expected that the browntail moth will be bad again this year and Bowdoinham was specifically mentioned as an area expected to see a significant problem. There is a fact sheet available at the kiosk in the town hall.

The deer tick continues to be an area of concern. Lyme disease continues to receive much attention. It is expected that we will see a higher rate of ticks this year which increases the risk of Lyme's Disease. Brochures about Lyme Disease are available at the town office. For more information on Lyme's Disease in Maine, go to

Dogs are also very vulnerable to Lyme's Disease but cats seem to be resistant. I would encourage you to your vet about tick control for your pets.

Mold continues to be a problem in our state and our town. Mold can be a significant problem for people who may have asthma or other respiratory illnesses. Mold can also damage personal items. There is a guide that was designed for local health officers on mold that is downloadable for anyone. For information on mold please go to:

This past year, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency sponsored two medication collections in the United States. Maine was extremely successful in the one held last September 2010. Mid Coast Hospital continues to support the efforts of medication collection in our area. Getting expired and unused medications out of our homes helps reduce medicines in our landfills and water systems as well as reducing the risk of theft and home break-ins to get the medications. <u>Harbor Master Report</u> John McMullen, Harbor Master

uring the 2010 boating season vessel safety checks were conducted at random and by appointment at the town boat ramp. The most frequent deficiency was failure to carry current dated flares. This courtesy examination of boats verifies the presence and condition of safety equipment required by State and Federal regulations. Please contact me if you would like to schedule one for your boat. Many insurance companies give discounts for boats passing this inspection.

Channel markers, No Wake and Hazard markers are installed on the Cathance River and across the Bay to assist boaters in keeping in the channel. They are normally installed the last week of May and removed the end of September.

There was an increased use of the boat ramp during the 2010 season over the 2009 season. Noteworthy was the amount of kayaking. When paddling always assume that power boats don't see you. Help them by being obvious. Wear bright noticeable colors and even consider buying a canoe or kayak in a fun neon color. Use reflective tape on the paddle tips, carry a sound producing device, have a white light for use during darkness or fog. And always wear your PFD.


Unsafe boating activities observed during 2010 were:

- A. Vessels overloaded, carrying too many passengers
- B. Boaters not using navigation lights after sunset
- C. Persons bow riding while vessel underway
- D. Watercraft being operated at a speed greater than headway speed while within the Water Safety Zone. "Water Safety Zone" means the area of water within 200 feet of the shoreline (STATE LAW).

REMINDERS

- Always check the weather before going boating.
- File a float plan with family or friend who can report your delay/non-return.
- Wear your life jacket (mandatory age 10 and under in Maine).
- Check the Harbor Master web page for tides and other safety tips.

The Bowdoinham Public Library continues to be an active place at that ripe old age of 101. The library has made a smooth transition to an automated circulation system which has saved the library staff time, insures more detailed reporting and allows library patrons to view the library catalog on their home computers.

Three monthly book groups are going strong. A combination knitting and book discussion group calling themselves "Stitch and Pitch" picks a theme and not one particular title each month. Their Thursday evening meetings are a lively review of many titles. Themes in the past year have included memoirs, travel books, and scary stories. The daytime "Loose Ladies" book group meets on the first Thursday of the month and reads a specific title for discussion. A Parent/Child book group meets on the first Thursday of the month. Rotating pairs of parents and kids pick a title and lead a discussion of that book, along with a yummy snack. The feedback was so enthusiastic that we may make this an annual event. Plan for this year's Plant Sale on May 21st and the Book Sale on November 12. Volunteers for these ventures are always welcomed. This town's support of our annual fundraisers ensures a strong fiscal base for the library and allows us to keep new books coming in to the library each month. We are forever grateful for your support.



Energy Committee Report

Margaret Patterson, Chair

n the fall of 2009, the Bowdoinham Energy Committee (BEC) submitted an Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG planning grant) in order to complete a baseline study of energy use, a carbon footprint study and an implementation plan for the town. One goal of the study was to use the results of the planning grant to request funds for an energy project from the Second Round Energy Grant.

The purpose of the baseline study was to find ways to reduce energy use and resulting emissions from greenhouse gasses and other pollutants at three town facilities:

The Coombs Building (Town Office and Library).

The Public Works Garage.

The Fire Station.

The \$10,000 EECBG planning grant was used to fund energy audits of the Town Office and Fire Station and the engineering studies of the Town Office and the Public Works Garage. The BEC looked carefully at the energy consumption in the three town buildings and concluded that concentrating the grant money on the Town Office and Library would be the best use of the grant funds. The Fire Station is relatively new, with fewer energy issues and the Public Works Building will not support the type of energy improvements appropriate for the grant. Based on the energy audits and the engineering studies, the committee concluded that insulating the Town Office would provide the most benefit towards reducing the town's energy use.

The town was awarded \$36,225 for an energy project from the Second Round Energy Grant. The proposed project in the Town Office includes insulating the attic and stairwell to the attic and insulating the exterior walls and the foundation walls. The project includes addressing moisture on the west side of the building in order to protect both the air quality in the building and the integrity of the new insulation.

Planning Board Report

n terms of applications before the Planning Board, this was another quiet year. The Planning Board granted two subdivision amendments, waiving the requirement for underground utilities; dissolved a subdivision; and granted site permits for a car auction and auto repair shop. Also under the site law, we classified two commercial properties for multiple use, for multiple businesses; and amended a permit to the Shoreland Zone to repair rip rapping.

In February the Board began review of the Central Maine Power application for the construction of transmission towers and poles, as part of the Maine Power Reliability Project.

The lighter schedule allowed the Board to devote time to make recommendations to continue improving the Town Ordinances. The recommended changes clarify items and language that were previously confusing to the Board and applicants and standardize permit requirements whenever possible. The Town will be voting on these changes at Town Meeting.

Bradley Means resigned in January from his position as alternate. We miss him.

After serving on the Planning Board for 39 years, Wilhelmine "Billie" D. Oakes, stepped down on February 21. Possibly the longest tenure of any Planning Board member in the history of the Town (1972-2011), Billie provided an amazing institutional memory of past decisions and kept (and could locate) records going back nearly 40 years. A staunch advocate for Bowdoinham's natural resources, she was particularly attentive to applying our ordinances to protect wetlands, drinking water and streams. In the early 1970s, the Town was working on its first Comprehensive Plan, considering zoning, and weighing the benefits and problems associated with cluster housing. When looking at those issues, suddenly 40 years doesn't seem quite so long. Billie is moving on to new and other ventures, but promises to be available to fill in memory lapses. We thank Billie heartily for her generosity of time, thoughtfulness and thoroughness and hope she enjoys the freedom of having the fourth Thursday of every month to herself.

Finance Advisory Report

Jennifer Foley, Chair

t is the role of the Finance Advisory Committee to assist the Selectmen and Treasurer with financial decisions regarding development and administration of the municipal budget and the investment program for the Town of Bowdoinham, Inc. Per the bylaws, it is the mission of the Committee to share their collective expertise in financial matters for the health and well being of the corporation.

The SAD 75 assessment to Bowdoinham is increasing by 2.4% and the Sagadahoc County assessment is increasing by 3%. Combined, they are adding \$66,190 to Bowdoinham's assessments. On the revenue side, the components that comprise the Non-Property Tax Revenues are almost flat to last year's budget with a .4% increase or \$3,873.

As a result of this situation, the Finance Advisory Committee's advice to the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Legislative body is to reduce the municipal budget to offset the increases in assessments. This will result in establishing a projected mil rate of \$14.80 which will maintain the same rate for four years running. It also presents a budget that is lower than the one we passed in June 2004 without a serious reduction of services and includes a 2% increase for staff after salaries and stipends were kept flat last year. We propose borrowing for three important capital needs: Road Improvements, a replacement Public Works Plow Truck, and a replacement Fire Department Pumper Truck. Failure to invest in our town assets have proven to only increase costs later and the Finance Advisory Committee places a priority on these projects in the aforementioned order.

I would like to thank the committee members for their many hours of volunteer service to this oversight work over the past year. Chris Jackson, Darragh Ferranti, Stewart Burrell and Tom Walling are returning members. Matt Ross joined the committee this year as an alternate member. Dan Billings is the Board of Selectman member assigned as the point person to the Finance Advisory Committee and we appreciate his time, expertise and input. Kathy Durgin Leighton is owed a great deal of thanks for pulling most of this budget together in an organized and thoughtful process. And finally, we'd like to thank Janet Smith who worked long hours improving the quality of the town's financial records throughout the year and assisting the Finance Advisory Committee in the last weeks of finalization.

plans District to raise rates approximately 5%, effective July of 2011, in order to compensate for 5 years of inflation. This will be the first rate increase since 2006 and amounts to approximately 1% per year during times when inflation was more than twice that. The District was able to accomplish this by utilizing new technologies in leak detection, moving to a more targeted employee health benefit plan and paying off higher interest rate loans first. Additionally, a zero interest loan, available as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, covered approximately 2/3 of the cost of construction of a backup well supply.

remaining 1/3 of the money was forgiven by a grant. While the savings from each action was small, together they have allowed the District to maintain the amount spent on aging infrastructure and to invest in a few machinery upgrades for greater efficiencies, while minimizing the impact on user rates.

We would like to remind everyone to please report unusually wet areas to the District for investigation as potential leaks. Successful leak detection and pipe repair reduces the treatment and pumping costs associated with lost water and postpones the need to develop additional water sources of supply. The cost savings benefit not only all ratepayers, but all citizens through lower water costs for fire fighting.

The District is a quasi municipal agency that has provided water for Bowdoin and Bowdoinham since 1959. The Board has 5 trustees appointed by the Selectmen of Bowdoinham (currently 4 from Bowdoinham and 1 from Bowdoin). No Trustee has ever drawn pay for his or her service on the Board. Monthly business meetings are open to the public and are held on the third Thursday of every month in the Bowdoinham Town Office building at 6:30 p.m. (7:00 p.m. during haying months). The District Superintendent and the Business Manager also attend each meeting.

Thank you for the privilege of my serving the Board for these last 15 years.

These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's Management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

We were unable to obtain sufficient evidential source documentation to support the permanent funds because the relevant legal indentures could not be located. The prior audit reports did not distinguish between expendable and nonexpendable trust funds.

In our opinion, except for the permanent funds, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, major funds, and remaining fund information of the Town of Bowdoinham and the changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, of those activities and funds and the budgetary comparison for the general fund for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The budgetary comparison information is not a required part of the financial statements, but is supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

The Town of Bowdoinham, Maine has not presented Management Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States has determined is necessary to supplement, although not required to be part of, the financial statements.

NOTE 9 – OVERLAPPING DEBT

Special Revenues

The Town's proportionate share of Sagadahoc County's debt is not recorded in the financial statements of the Town of Bowdoinham. At June 30, 2010, the Town's share was 5.69% (or \$592,715) of the County's outstanding debt of \$10,416,791.

The Town's proportionate share of Maine School Administrative District No. 75's debt is not recorded in the financial statements of the Town of Bowdoinham. At June 30, 2010, the Town's share was 11.74% (or \$1,527,620) of the District's outstanding debt of \$13,008,773.

NOTE 10 - TAX INCREMENT FINANCING/DEVELOPMENT DISTRICTS

During 2002, the Town of Bowdoinham was given approval for the creation of the Natural Gas Pipeline Pipeline Municipal Development Tax Increment Financing District ("the District").

The designation of the District and pursuit of the Development Program will generate substantial economic benefits for the Town and its residents, including employment opportunities, broadened and improved tax base and economic stimulus and therefore, constitutes a good and valid public purpose.

The expenditures from this development project will be recouped in future years via an incremental tax levied upon the District's captured assessed value over a twenty year period.

GREETINGS: In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Bowdoinham, in said County, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the **Bowdoinham Community School on Wednesday, June 15, 2011 at 7:00 p.m.** then and there to act upon Articles 1 through Article B23 of this warrant.

ARTICLE 1: To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ORDINANCES

ARTICLE 01: Shall an ordinance entitled "June 2011 Amendments to the Town of Bowdoinham Land Use Ordinance" be enacted?

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board and Planning Board recommend the article to pass.

TAX INCREMENT FINANCING

ARTICLE T1: To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$67,454 from the Tax Increment Financing District (TIF) for Economic and Community Development.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board and Finance Advisory Committee recommend the article to pass.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT, RESERVE ACCOUNT & FUND BALANCE ARTICLES

ARTICLE C1: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to transfer up to \$25,000 from the **Undesignated Fund Balance** to the FY2012 budget revenues and appropriate the same for emergency/contingency use purposes only; and furthermore, to require that the Select Board submit to the Town at the following Annual Town Meeting a report on the use of such funds.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board and Finance Advisory Committee recommend the article to pass.

ARTICLE C2: To see if the Town will authorize the issuance of general obligation securities in an amount not to exceed \$900,000 to be used for the paving, reconstruction and maintenance of town roads, the purchase of a public works plow truck, and the purchase of a fire department truck with the dates, maturities, denominations, interest rates, place of payment, form and other details of securities and of providing the sale of the securities to be determined by the Selectmen in the best interest of the Town.

TREASURER'S CERTIFICATE

The undersigned Treasurer of the Town of Bowdoinham hereby certifies that:

- 1. The total amount of the general obligation bonded indebtedness of the Town of Bowdoinham currently outstanding as of May 10, 2011 is \$628,344.00
- 2. The total amount of general obligation bonds of the Town of Bowdoinham authorized, but un-issued, is \$0.
- 3. The total amount of general obligation bonds of the Town of Bowdoinham contemplated to be issued if the Article is ratified is not in excess of \$900,000.
- 4. Total of Paragraphs 1-3: \$1,528,344.
- 5. The anticipated interest rate on the bond is 3.00% to 4.25%. Assuming the issuance of \$325,000 of bond with level principal payments over a 20 year term and \$575,000 of bond with level principal payments over a 10 year term and an estimated adjustable interest rate of 3.0% 4.25%, the interest cost associated with the borrowing would be \$256,983, which would result in a total cost of principal and interest to be paid of \$1,156,983.

The foregoing represents an estimate of costs associated with the financing and such estimates will change due to market conditions. The validity of the bonds and of the voters' ratification of the bonds may not be affected by any errors in the estimates made in Paragraph 5 above. If the actual amount of the total debt service for the bond issue varies from these estimates, the ratification by the electors is nevertheless conclusive and the validity of the bond issue is not affected by reason of the variance. BUSINESS ARTICLES

ARTICLE B1: To see if the town will vote to fix two dates when taxes on real estate and personal property shall be due and payable and after which interest shall accrue.

First Installment: Monday, October 17, 2011

Second Installment: Tuesday, April 17, 2012

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B2: To see if the Town will set a rate of interest to be paid after the due dates on delinquent taxes.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the interest Rate: 7.0% - The maximum allowed pursuant to 36 M.R.S. §505(4).

ARTICLE B3: To see if the Town will vote to establish the interest rate of 3% per year on the amount of <u>overpayment</u> to be paid to a taxpayer who is determined to have paid an amount of real estate or personal property taxes in excess of amount finally assessed pursuant to 36 M.R.S. §506-A.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B4: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept tax payments prior to the commitment of taxes.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B5: To see if the Town will vote to close all Fiscal Year 2010/2011 overdrafts to surplus.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B6: To see if the Town will authorize the Select Board and Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of taxes pursuant to 30-A M.R.S. §5771.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B7: To see if the Town will authorize the Select Board and Treasurer to accept on behalf of the Town, monetary gifts, and to appropriate said gifts to supplement the accounts specified by the benefactor.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B8: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board: (a) to accept the transfer of a certificate of deposit ("CD") in the amount of approximately \$23,000, currently held by the Bowdoinham Ridge Cemetery Association (the "Association"), for perpetual care maintenance of the Bowdoinham Ridge Cemetery; (b) if and only if said CD is transferred by the Association to the Town, to accept ownership and management responsibility for the care, maintenance, improvement, and any future expansion of the Bowdoinham Ridge Cemetery, the cost of which will be funded by the interest from said CD; and (c) to take any such action to execute any such documents necessary to effectuate these ends.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

Article B9: To see if the Town will authorize the following actions on behalf of the town: (1) to authorize the Selectpersons and Treasurer to rent, lease, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable and execute Municipal Quit Claim deeds for same; (2) to authorize the Selectpersons to keep any real estate acquired for non-payment of taxes or portion thereof for the use of the town when they deem it to be in the town's best interests; and (3) to authorize the Selectpersons to rent or lease town-owned real estate that was not acquired for non-payment of taxes when they deem it to be in the town's best interest and on such terms as they deem advisable.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B10: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectpersons, or their duly authorized agent, to enter into a lease with the Maine Department of Transportation ("MDOT") on such terms as they deem advisable so long as the yearly rent does not exceed \$1.00, for the use of a parcel of land in Bowdoinham in conjunction with a municipal skateboard park, said parcel being part of MDOT's Lower Road rail line and more particularly described as Property Tax Map U01, Lot 002 and recorded in the Sagadahoc Registry of Deeds at Book 1649 and Page 157, and to take such additional action necessary to effectuate said lease.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B11: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectpersons, or their duly authorized agent, to enter into a lease with Frederick C. Haer and Jill S. Haer on such terms as they deem advisable so long as the yearly rent does not exceed \$1.00, for the use of a parcel of land in Bowdoinham in conjunction with a municipal skateboard park, said parcel being more particularly described as Property Tax Map U01, Lot 071 and recorded in the Sagadahoc Registry of Deeds at Book 1506 and Page 321, and to take such additional action necessary to effectuate said lease.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, or their duly authorized agent, to obtain various easements from Marc Carlson of 21 River Road, said parcel being more particularly described as Property Tax Map U01, Lot 073 and recorded in the Sagadahoc Registry of Deeds at Book 2220 and Page 268, for the purposes of the development of the Skatepark, on such terms and conditions as they deem advisable, and to take such additional actions that they deem necessary to obtain and effectuate said easements.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B13: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept donations to the Skateboard Fund and to appropriate and expend up to the fund balance of said account to fund the establishment and construction of a municipal skatepark.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B14: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, or their duly authorized agent, to obtain a drainage agreement and/or easement from the Maine Department of Transportation ("MDOT") with respect to MDOT's Route 24 and Lower Road rail line property, said parcel being more particularly described as Property Tax Map U01, Lot 002 and recorded in the Sagadahoc Registry of Deeds at Book 1649 and Page 157, for the purposes of drainage to/from the proposed municipal Skatepark, on such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem advisable, and to take such additional actions that they deem necessary to obtain and effectuate said drainage agreement."

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B15 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the municipal Treasurer to waive the foreclosure of a tax lien mortgage by recording a Waiver of Foreclosure at the Registry of Deeds in which the Tax Lien Certificate is recorded, prior to the right of redemption expiring, pursuant to 36 M.R.S. § 944.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board and Treasurer, on behalf of the Town to sell or dispose of obsolete Town equipment, material and commodities on such terms as they deem proper.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to accept any donations, gifts or grants of money for the Heating Assistance Program reserve account and to expend available funds from the account for the designated purpose.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B18: To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Select Board and Treasurer to enter into multi-year contracts necessary to provide services to the Town.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass. Services for the town include but are not limited to assessing, ambulance service, banking, road maintenance, snow removal, curbside recycling and rubbish disposal.

ARTICLE B19: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board and Treasurer to accept and expend Community Development Block Grant Funds and other federal, state or private grants on behalf of the Town.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B20: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to annually set fees for returned checks, copies of Town ordinances and other documents, and notary services.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B21: To see if the Town will authorize the Select Board to collect Solid Waste Management User Fees for FY 2011/2012 at the rate of \$2.50 per bag.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B22: To see if the Town will vote to approve the recommendations of the Selectmen to set the annual permit fee, pursuant to the provisions of 7.1.1 of the Solid Waste Management Ordinance, for commercial haulers operating within the Town of Bowdoinham. The Selectmen's recommendation is for a \$150.00 per year per truck fee for trucks with up to six (6) wheels; a fee of \$250.00 per year per truck for trucks with more than six (6) wheels.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.

ARTICLE B23: To see if the Town will authorize the Select Board to close any road or roads or portions thereof for winter maintenance and to annul, alter, or modify such decisions, pursuant to 23 M.R.S. §2953, and that such orders made by the Select Board shall be a final determination.

RECOMMENDATION: Select Board recommends the article to pass.
