Waterfront Project Update:


Preliminary Design Plans for the project were completed in late spring, and all federal, state, and local permits were received as of this summer.

In June the Select Board approved staff to apply for a Boating Facilities Fund Grant, with a 25% match for the application to come from the TIF district. The grant was subsequently awarded in August. In July, staff negotiated a 2022 start for use of MDOT SHIP grant funding.

Consultant Haley Ward conducted a limited Phase II Environmental Assessment to determine if there were any contaminants above the Recommended Action Guidelines at the identified areas of concern, based on the previous history of the site as fertilizer plant, and then public works facility. After follow-up testing at one area to determine the depth and extent of elevated contamination levels, it was determined that none of the areas of concern contained soil contaminants above the recommended levels for park use.

All of this work is in preparation to support the initial buildout of the ADA compliant non-motorized boat launch facility including the access road and associated parking and shoreline stabilization, which will take place in 2022. Later buildouts will include other elements of the park, such as pavilion, trails, and additional active recreation facilities, landscaping, and a natural play area.



Browntail Moth Management Tip:



Example of browntail moth winter nests.

Prowntail moths winter webs were identified in Bowdoinham during the 2021 survey. The new webs for 2022 can be removed and destroyed to prevent further infestation. The Maine Forest Service recommends learning to property identify browntail moth webs to avoid harming other non-invasive species. Winter webs can be pruned from the trees by an arborist or pest control specialist and destroyed by immersing them in a bucket of soapy water.

Whatbrowntailmothwinterwebslooklike:

- 2-5 in. (5-10 cm) long
- white silk tightly woven around a leaf or leaves
 - wrap of white silk tying leaf petiole o twig
- small brown hairy larvae within dense silk
- occur more commonly on twig ends of oak, apple, shadbush, cherry, beach plum, and rugosa rose

PFAS Investigation

n October 21, 2021 the Town received notification from Maine Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) that it had been identified as a high priority for investigation for impacts by PFAs chemicals. The letter said it was based on suspected PFAs contaminated materials that were applied at certain sites, and their proximity to drinking water.

PFAS chemicals are man-made chemicals that are used in household products and industrial settings. They breakdown very slowly and are referred to as "forever chemicals", and because of that they persist in the environment and may build up in the environment, animals, and people over time. Information provided by the State says that health agencies are working to understand more about a variety of potential health impacts.

DEP has also been working with the Department of Agriculture to identify sites currently being used for production of agricultural products.

DEP notified the town in early December that some sampling was taking place. The results were not available as of an update from DEP on December 17th, although some drinking water sampling had been already scheduled for January.

It will be good to know the extents of any water or soil contamination, that the community may start making future decisions by. DEP has already been working to install drinking water filtration systems in areas determined to be impacted elsewhere.

Progress continues at Merrymeeting Hall: Brett has finished beautifying (hiding the exposed plumbing with cabinetry) the Main floor bathroom. Now he and Tom are installing a special ceiling (wait until you see it!)

Tom is also working on the lighting in the the south side of the lower level. This is step one in getting that section ready for the Bowdoinham Public Library to inhabit while Coombs must be vacated for much needed renovations. If all goes well, the Library will join us for about a year, starting in August 2022.

Friday Ladies continue cleaning, preparing for events, sorting, organizing, painting, and deciding. We are also slowly setting the BHS Rideout Research Room to rights, so that folks can come and research questions about the town, their homes, genealogy, etc.

MMH has been hosting family parties at MMH since this summer. We ask that guests be vaccinated and that they wear masks, following Maine CDC guidelines to help keep us all as safe as possible. We charge \$100 for a one day event. (\$150 in winter) for Bowdoinham connected folks. Or \$200 for out of towners.

MMH Strongly prefers folks do NOT use plastic dishes or utensils

Paper plates are somewhat better as they can be washed and recycled or composted. What we REALLY like is for folks to use our equipment which comes with the rental.

We have: china: dinner plates, (at least 50) salad plates, butters, bowls, cups and saucers, mugs, and lots of serving dishes, both china and silver. We also have plenty of flatware: both stainless steel, and silver. Again this includes lots of serving utensils. Glassware: includes tumblers, wine glasses, champagne glasses, dessert dishes, several punch bowls, and plenty of punch cups (c 50+). We have an assortment of vases, too. We have an assortment of tablecloths and linen napkins.

Merrymeeting Hall has a fully equipped kitchen with a refrigerator; two stoves with ovens; microwave; a 3 bay sink (sorry, no dishwasher); coffee makers, big and small; crock pots; mixers; kitchen pots and pans; baking pans; kitchen utensils; and aprons.

Merrymeeting Hall can seat about 50, perhaps a few more. We have six 36" round tables, four 36" square tables, and six or more 8-foot folding tables. We have plenty of chairs.

We do expect you to clean up and return the hall to the condition in which you found it. However, you

can also hire us to do the cleaning for another \$50 to \$100.

In short, we have just about everything you need to put on quite a party, splendid or casual.

The main floor is ADA accessible and has an ADA bathroom. Then we have the beautiful theater upstairs, with excellent acoustics and plenty of seating. It is accessible via stairs and a stair chairlift. It also has an ADA bathroom. If you'd like to come take a look, we are generally there Fridays from 9-12, or call Betsy to make an appointment.


Merrymeeting Hall is also available at no charge for Town-of-Bowdoinham related, non-profit, and community groups such as yoga.

appy New Year! As I write, the first snow is barely covering the ground, and you may be working to rebound from a turkey and pie stupor, as I am. The Pantry, which saw a near all-time record of 39 visits on a recent Wednesday, had a busy Thanksgiving season and distributed many turkeys and fixings to local families last week. Thank you to everyone who donated during the busy holiday season!

Director Jenn Stonebreaker shared that a client called right before Thanksgiving with the news that unfortunately, her husband had contracted COVID; she wondered if a volunteer could deliver the turkey that she'd requested the prior week. Jenn writes, "We said, OF COURSE! We set her up with additional food needs, as well as cleaning supplies and antibacterial soap. We are grateful for her consideration for the community, and I am thankful for our volunteers who are so willing to pull together to get our neighbors what they

Jenn has introduced a popular new program called Cooking with Neighbors in which volunteers prepare delicious soups using surplus produce and freeze them in family-sized portions. enthusiastic visitor said the soups were so delicious that she was sorry she couldn't warm it up for that night's dinner. (The portions take a little while to thaw.) The Pantry purchased a Food Saver vacuum sealer so that the soups can be stored using as little freezer space as possible. If you're interested in making a big batch of soup for the Pantry, please get in touch. If you'd like to pick up some soup and other items such as fresh, seasonal produce, pantry staples, personal hygiene & household items, come visit the Pantry. If by chance you know of someone who could benefit from our support but is hesitant to come themselves, feel free to come and shop for them. All are welcome!

The Food Pantry continues to invite clients inside for in-person shopping. To provide the safest possible experience for visitors and volunteers, the Pantry requires masks and has purchased and installed two UV air purifiers.

Rides Update

ides Neighbors Cars with the idea helping increase the independence of people who can no longer drive by matching people who need a ride with people willing to give a ride. Rides are provided to Bowdoinham and Bowdoin residents age 60+ and those with a disability that prevent them from driving safely. A ride can be scheduled for a non-emergency medical appointment or to go shopping or do an errand. The program can be used to get a ride to church, use the Bowdoinham Food Pantry or Library or even to help get a pet to a vet appointment.

Over the years, RIDES has grown. In 2019, volunteer drivers provided 251 trips that took 627

hours and encompassed 10,332 miles. When the pandemic began and many appointments were canceled, we dropped to 3-4 drivers that served several clients. As we move into 2022, we are back to a dozen clients, but unfortunately, we have lost some drivers.

If you have just a little bit of extra time in your week and could volunteer to offer a ride, we welcome you to join our group of volunteers. You might choose to help someone get to a regularly scheduled weekly appointment or you might only be able to offer rides every now and then. You can choose your availability monthly and typically drivers take 1 to 5 trips per month. Please call 207-837-9577 for information on how to get started with us.

UPDATE: Committee for Age Friendly Bowdoinham

e have a new name but the same mission-to improve the lives of all residents with special focus on older adults and those living with disabilities. Formerly known as the Advisory Committee on Aging or ACOA, we recently changed our name to the Committee for Age Friendly Bowdoinham both to reinforce our broader mission and to connect our efforts to the network of age friendly communities in Maine and throughout the country,

We are delighted to announce that Mary Kelley, Karen Mayo and George Oliver recently have joined the Committee that also includes Barbara Cree, Deb Smith, Peggy Muir and Maureen Booth. As of September, Chris Whitney serves as our Age Friendly Town Coordinator in addition to his responsibilities as Recreation Director.

Many residents are familiar with the Committee's sponsorship of luncheons, games, activities, speakers and field trips. Although the pandemic curtailed many of these opportunities for social interaction, we are pleased that some

are returning. We encourage everyone to check out the Town calendar for information on bridge, cribbage, gentle yoga and other age friendly activities. In early October over 40 residents came together on a drizzly windy day to enjoy lunch under a tent. Now that winter is forcing us inside again, the Committee is looking for safe ways to hold other group events. As plans develop, we will post information at the Town Office, Library, Merrymeeting Hall, and local businesses. Those interested in being notified of upcoming events via email should call the Town Office to be included on the Committee's mailing list.

This Fall the Bowdoinham Public Library, in coordination with the Committee, launched its Hometown Helpers initiative. Funded by the Maine Humanities Council, the program offers assistance to residents wanting to trouble shoot problems they may have in using their laptops, mobile phones or other digital devices. Others may want to expand existing knowledge. If you are interested in working with

a volunteer on a one-on-one basis to improve your skills, please contact the Town Library for more information.

Over the next few months, you will be hearing more about the Committee's work to update the Town's Age-Friendly Action Plan - a public process to foster a physical, social and support environment to make Bowdoinham an inclusive, safe and enjoyable place to live for people of all ages and abilities. We also will be announcing a revitalization of the Town's lending program of medical equipment, tools and devices to residents. Finally, the Committee is in early discussion on how we can learn from residents about their experiences during the pandemic and apply those lessons to better support and respond in the future.

I'm not ignoring you

And I'm not being rude.

And I haven't developed dementia. And I'm not spacing out. And I haven't forgotten what you told me.

I have hearing loss. It means that I have challenges. I can't hear things from other rooms or around corners or in crowded noisy spaces. I miss bits of conversation so I sometimes miss facts and bits of stories which leads to, "I told you that!" or "Why don't you listen to me!"

Hearing loss means there are odd lapses in my knowledge that people don't understand. I feel as though I know bits of things and not others. Sometimes I think I learn things by osmosis, as I am not conscious of hearing them. People get irritated and frustrated and downright mad at me. It's difficult. Unlike many disabilities, hearing loss is not visible. Sometimes I wish we still had those huge old ear trumpets to cue people in. As it is, I will sometimes

cup my hand around my ear and turn my head in a very public in "I -am -partially -deaf" move. Or make that motion for turning things up. Which can be embarrassing.

Strangely enough, hearing loss was an asset of a kind in high school teaching. If a student got pissy when I asked for a repetition of a comment - "I TOLD you that already! "- I would say "I have a disability," and then the student would be all apologetic. It meant a definite improvement in attitude.

But it's also very very frustrating to know I miss things, from friends and my young grandsons. It can be dangerous to miss the sound of a speeding car.

I think most people with hearing loss become lip readers of sorts. It's much harder on a telephone and I am very grateful for Facetime and Zoom and closed caption TV. There are many new tools like fire alarms that have strobe lights.

Hearing aids help a lot but they have their own challenges. Some

aids have tiny (expensive) batteries which fumbling fingers drop. The aids themselves have to be carefully inserted in ears-- again tough with arthritic hands. You have to remember not to shower or swim with them in (and where do you stow them at the beach?). Ironically the Covid masks with ear loops can flip them out. I had to buy a new set. At night time I remove them and will not hear someone calling.

Hearing aids increase sound. All sound. There are programs that help in noisy situations but hearing aids do not magically make you 100%.

I know now to start many conversation – especially to people I don't know on the phone- by saying, "I have hearing loss so I may have to ask you to speak up! "People are kind.
Just be careful in making assumptions about elders and others. They MAY be inattentive or sleepy or rude. They may forget what you say or have incipient dementia.

Or they may just have hearing loss.

Hello Bowdoinham residents,

Spectrum Generations is incredibly thankful for the contribution your town made to our nonprofit last year to help us provide services to older and disabled residents in your community and beyond. Your town's donation of \$3,000 made a real impact, helping us leverage \$9,973 in benefits for your community. Here's a breakdown of the services we provided to 40 members of your community last year:
