2021 Citizen of the Year Speech

he Citizen of the Year award is to recognize an individual that goes above and beyond for the people of the community of Bowdoinham. Bowdoinham's Citizen of the Year is equally ready to lend a hand or lead the charge. Through many years of service to both the causes and citizens of Bowdoinham, they have never asked for, or sought, recognition.

Bowdoinham's Citizen of the Year for 2021 has volunteered for a variety of community organizations and projects over the last ten years and has helped usher meaningful positive changes into the community. This person has been active in the Merrymeeting Arts Center, Bowdoinham Guild of Artisans, Bowdoinham Public Library and the Community Development Advisory Committee.

As chairperson of the Community Development Committee, they went above and beyond to make the Skatepark a reality, even teaching skateboarding electives at Bowdoinham's Community School; and they personally surveyed the town roads to identify needs for high-speed internet in Bowdoinham, and then followed that up by trekking around gathering support for internet subscribers to the extent that they ended up with a broken foot from it!

Other highlights of their efforts over the years include running workshops for Bowdoinham Businesses and writing the Business Spotlight for The Bowdoinham News, When Bowdoinham couldn't have our annual Open Farm Day event in 2020 and 2021, they created the Guide to Bowdoinham Farmers' Market, Farms and Farm Stands for us. This person regularly writes articles for the Bowdoinham news and volunteers for fundraising events. Among the Library book sale crew, they are known as a "book-moving and sorting extraordinaire".

In appreciation of your many years of dedication to the people of our community, the Select Board of Bowdoinham thanks and recognizes Wendelyn (Wendy) Rose as our

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
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Merrymeeting Arts Center

The "Merrymeeting Take & Make" project, a partnership between the Merrymeeting Arts Center (MAC) and the Bowdoinham Public Library, is funded by The Anonimo Foundation. Each month, a new "Take & Make" kit is distributed, containing supplies and instructions for a single art project. Forty

kits are available, at no charge, to children in Kindergarten through the 5th grade.

Kits will continue to be distributed through

Local Myths

MAC was excited to be able to exhibit its 12 sculptures that are part of MAC's Local Myths collection (courtesy of the Muir family). This year we were fortunate, due to the generosity of a Maine collector, to be able to reunite 3 of the 4 sculptures that also belong to this series of Local Myths. These carvings are about two feet in height and composed of a variety of hardwoods. Each sculpture is a hybrid creature, part human and part animal, represents a month of the year, the solstices and the equinox.

After the sculptures were completed Bryce Muir wrote a story for each sculpture, described as a "different act of imagination" set in the same place: Merrymeeting Bay.

Merrymeeting Arts Center encourages art, education and community celebrating the cultural heritage and natural environment of Merrymeeting Bay. Inspired and guided by the eclectic values of the life and spirit of Bryce Muir, the Center joyfully promotes egalitarianism, whimsy, environmental consciousness, and diversity through its artists, programs and projects. Keep and Eye out for Clogged culverts


s we get into the Fall please keep your culverts in mind! Clogged culverts can result in flooding or even a road collapse! Please do not shovel snow or deposit yard trimmings and other debris that would disrupt the flow of water or otherwise obstruct the way.

When culverts are clogged water gets redirected, eroding the surrounding structures, like roads or driveways, eventually causing a collapse.

Ensuring culverts are clear of snow and debris will prevent

flooding and enable Public Works to direct resources to the clearing of roadways and other priority maintenance activities during weather related operations.

Reduced Exemption Value on Tax Bill

s you may have noticed the Homestead and Veteran exemptions have been reduced on your tax bill. Instead of receiving the full exemption amount, Bowdoinham can only offer 91% of the exemption amount. The highest the Board of Assessors could declare for the Town's FY2022 certified ratio was 91%. The certified ratio is determined by Maine Revenue Service through analysis of assessed values and sales data. Due to the increase property sales over the last year, we expect the Town's certified ratio to continue to decrease, which means the exemption amount will also decrease.

To address this the Select Board had contracted with RJD Appraisal in 2019 to update the Town's property cards over a four-year period, so that the Town could conduct a re-evaluation in year five to bring

the Town back to 100%. By State Law, the Town has to be between 70-110%. Given the accelerated price of home sales the Select Board is looking at accelerating the Town's re-evaluation process. To do this the Town would need to budget \$25,000 for two quarters of the property card updates for next year.

Additionally, the Board is considering budgeting for the re-evaluation next year (FY23) so that we can claim a certified ratio of 100%. Otherwise, we could be looking at a certified ratio around 80% for FY22-23 and budgeting for the re-evaluation the following year (FY23-24). See example below.

News from the Bowdoinham Food Pantry

ello, Bowdoinham! The Board was impressed by the number of strong applicants who submitted their formal interest for the Director position. This role requires someone to wear a lot of hats, from volunteer communications to food acquisition to understanding and facilitating all aspects of our operations.

In September, the Board landed with Bowdoinham's own Jennifer Stonebraker, and as of October, she is already putting on all of those hats! In fact, much of what I'm about to write to you comes from her first installment of "Shelf Notes," a newsletter with snazzy graphics (she has a rich background in the arts and art education) that she's creating for BFP volunteers. She introduces herself this way: "I am so pleased to be taking on the role of Director here at the Bowdoinham Food

Pantry--what an incredible place and amazing group of people! I live here in town with my family and our menagerie of animals--goats, ponies, chickens, pup, bunny, and gold fish. Community and service are a huge part of our lives."

Jennifer also uses "Shelf Notes" as a place to share monthly data about visits to the Pantry. She shares that in the month of September, "48 households were served, including 73 adults and 31 children, in 80 visits. 3908 pounds of food were collected, donated, and purchased." What does this tell us? That the Pantry is well stocked, well used, and well supported by our community.



Jennifer brings energy, vision, organization, and warmth to the job. Welcome, Jennifer! In Board news, Treasurer David Zellinger and Chair Sally Cluchey were both reappointed for their second three year terms. The Board will also be looking to add several new members over the course of the next few months.

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Opportunities to Get Involved in the Comprehensive Planning Process:

Participate in the November 16, 2021 community input meeting and/or join the committee

n an article in the spring, I wrote about the whole very involved process to fulfill the state's requirement for all municipalities to up date their Comprehensive Plan every 10 years. Bowdoinham's current Comprehensive Plan was accepted at Town Meeting in 2014 and continues to guide many community activities and informs land use planning and other decisions through 2024.

One of the most important steps in the plan is to gain broad community input into the vision for the future of Bowdoinham. Thanks to the people at Celebrate Bowdoinham who took the time to stop at our table, look at the map of Bowdoinham, think about our future, jot down a few thoughts, and spend time talking to committee members Peggy Christian and me, Joanne Joy. Your input is so valuable to the planning process.

Next steps for more community engagement and input include the following:

- · The Comprehensive Planning Committee in a time without COVID would have convened people in person during the spring of 2021. After lots of discussion at meetings, the decision was made to wait until fall of 2021 with the hopes of fewer cases of COVID and more safety for in-person meetings.
- · Then we started the search for a facilitator to help us with the process. Again, lots of discussion, requests for facilitators to submit their plan for gathering input, their

experience working with Comprehensive Planning processes, etc.

· Guess what – we decided that we really would prefer Craig Freshley of Good Group Decisions from Brunswick, who worked with Bowdoinham to identify and develop the Vision Statement for the 2014 plan. You can read the current vision on page 4 of the Plan found here https://www.bowdoinham.com/town-document/comprehensive-plan

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Bowdoinham Historical Society News

In September, we all watched the fascinating process of painting our "Green Bridge" also known as the "Brooklyn Bridge". I think of what it must have been like the last time it was painted. The inspector said they expect 25 - 30 years out of this paint job

The first Bridge across the Cathance River there at the landing was built in 1805. "It was to be 12 feet high above the water across the channel. It was a toll bridge: the tolls being a foot passenger - 2¢; a horse and rider - 6¢; a two wheel carriage for pleasure - 10¢; a four wheeled carriage with two horses - 25¢; sleigh or sled drawn by one beast - 6¢; sheep or swine, each - 1¢, etc." This bridge was replaced in 1826, and made a free bridge in 1828.


parts, 144 feet in length. It had been built in Troy, NY in 1866. By 1931 it was the only such bridge in New England.

By the early 1950s, as it was approaching 100 years of age, having lasted 55 years in its Bowdoinham location, and surviving two floods, it was declared unsafe. At that time it was the only cast iron bridge left in the Unites States. A temporary military pontoon bridge took its place. When the Cast Iron Bridge was taken down, bidders from around the country wanted it as "cast iron was worth its weight in gold."

The new bridge, Bowdoinham's present Green or Brooklyn Bridge, a 156 foot steel truss bridge, was finished in 1953. It cost \$145,000. The contractor was Herbert

Callahan of Auburn.

Talking with the inspector at the current painting site, I learned that our Green Bridge would again be green; the gray and white coats having been different primers. They expect the paint to last from 25 to 30 years. David and I remember one previous paint job since we arrived in Bowdoinham in



1973.

When millwright James Madison Kendall arrived in Bowdoinham in 1865, he put into operation a unique tide mill, under the Cathance Bridge, a wooden king post span, which he built to replace the previous bridge. This mill provided the power for the Kendall Plaster and Grain Mills and Sagadahoc Fertilizer Company for well over 40 years

These bridges over the Cathance were all wooden structures. By 1890 a better bridge was needed, and the town began to look for one. Berlin, Connecticut, aspiring to a more modern bridge, advertised one for sale. John Rideout, master ship builder, was charged with inspecting and negotiating for the bridge. An agreement was made, for \$3885.52 and the bridge taken apart, loaded on a flatbed train car, and shipped to Bowdoinham, where John Rideout was instrumental in helping to erect it. It was a cast iron bridge with some wrought iron












The Green Bridge: 1968 Bowdoinham Barbecue Parade

Cemetery News

orry to say we've had no major cleanups the past few months. However, smaller endeavors continue. Sam Tome with family, friends, and neighbors has upgraded the fencing at the Pratt Cemetery on the Wildes Road and installed a flat stone marker for Thomas Reed Pratt (1835-1904) and his wife Judith (1838-1916).

We have not had luck finding any burial plots on the East side of the Abagadasset River yet. However, Susan Tuttle with Ian Jerolmack and his son Hugo were able to walk from Stonecipher Farm on the River Road to the Abby River and cross it and find the McFadden Yard! This could be more easily reached by going down the Old Dump Road from the Carding Machine Road, which ends a little before this cemetery. We are looking into developing a ROW. This plot, though known, has never been surveyed, and being in the Dinsmore Falls area where there was a mill is quite historic. The stones are mostly slate, which remain very clean and readable over time. Following a some of them: Love, wife of Stephen Weston Esq., July 8, 1848, age 58. Martha Preble and Joseph Preble 1850. Elias Robbins August 18, 1894, age 91. Lucinda, wife of Elias Robbins, May 1860, age 59. Charlotte McFadden, December 26, 1879, age 54. Rebecca, daughter of William and

Betsy Dinsmore, May 10, 1848, age 5 years, "Adieu, adieu dear child. I give thee up to God. Susan says the old bridge foundation is visible nearby. Some of the stones are down. A great project for next summer!

We have two new members on the committee. Linda Williams rejoined us at the October meeting and is willing to be the secretary. She has long been involved with the cemeteries via the Bowdoinham Historical Society. Also, Patrick O'Hanlon is joining us in November.

We recently heard from Wendy Scully who visited the Mustard Cemetery last month. She had not seen it for twenty years and wanted to tell us how impressed she is with the improvements in the cemetery's condition. She is a descendant of the Cornish family and would like more information on that family and the Mustard Tavern, where they worked. I'll be sending her anything I can find. If anyone reading this has any information on either, I would love to hear it

It's now deer hunting season, so we won't be out in the woods. We will be working on documentation, upgrading policies, and contacting volunteers and keepers over the winter months. Happy Holidays, All! See you in the Spring.
