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Darren and Kelly Carey • The Barn at Hatch Point

here is a new driveway off Route 24 just before Hatch Point Lane near the Richmond town line. It winds past open meadow, through new growth trees, and down towards a mature woods along the Kennebec River. This 32 acre parcel is where Darren and Kelly Carey are preparing the ground for their new business, The Barn at Hatch Point. This lovely location, looking east across the Kennebec to Swan Island, will provide the setting for an event facility designed to host weddings, meetings, and special events. "We are already getting inquiries for future events, so we hope to have the barn finished by late fall," Darren says.

Weddings will be the primary event for The Barn at Hatch Point. Kelly is an experienced wedding photographer having

done over 200 weddings in the last 10 years. Several years ago, she brought Darren in as a "second shooter" to serve as her back-up. As a result of this experience, they are both well acquainted with the wedding industry and have done extensive research on the type of venue that couples are looking for. "We want the barn to be elegant, private, and with full-service catering. Having the water views is a real asset," Kelly says.

Plans for the property have been approved by the Planning Board. Town Planner Jenn Curtis noted that the thoughtful plans minimize impacts to the natural and cultural resources on the property, and instead, treats them as assets. Features of the facility will include a dock, 2 patios (one covered), an auxiliary building, and a small cabin where a couple can conveniently stay before or after their wedding. An open house in late summer or early fall will give everyone a chance to

look over the property and to see the new developments.

Darren and Kelly have received lots of encouragement from colleagues in the wedding industry and from folks in Bowdoinham. "People who have heard about our plans have told us to go for it," says Darren, who has held various positions in the town over the years and is well-known locally. "We want this place to be an asset that will be embraced." Because the facility will be able to host gatherings of all types, it can serve as a draw for business meetings, reunions, picnics, and retreats. "We are grateful for the support we have received," says Kelly.

Assessor's Allev:

f you own a business in Bowdoinham, you must declare your personal property to the assessor by May 1st, 2022. The business may qualify for the BETR (Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement) or BETE(Business Equipment Tax Exemption) programs. If you did not receive a declaration form, visit the Assessor's page on the Town website.

ASSESSOR'S NOTICE April 1, 2022

Effective Tax Year 7/1/2021-6/30/2022

36 MRSA Sec. 706: TAXPAYERS TO LIST PROPERTY, NOTICE, PENALTY, VERIFICATION. Before making assessment, the Assessor shall give seasonable notice in writing to all persons liable to taxation, of which they were in possession of the first day of April of the same year. If any person after such notice does not furnish such list, that person is barred of the right to make application to the assessor of any appeal from any abatement of taxes, unless the taxpayer furnishes the required list with the application and satisfies the assessor that the list could not be provided at the appointed date and time. Deadline to furnish list is May 1, 2022.


Keep and Eye out for Clogged culverts

s we get into spring cleaning please keep your culverts in mind! Clogged culverts can result in flooding or even a road collapse! Please do not shovel snow or deposit yard trimmings and other debris that would disrupt the flow of water or otherwise obstruct the way.

When culverts are clogged water gets redirected, eroding the surrounding structures, like roads or driveways, eventually causing a collapse.

Ensuring culverts are clear of snow and debris will prevent flooding and enable Public Works to direct resources to the clearing of roadways and other priority maintenance activities during weather related operations.

Allen Acker • Acker's Acres

hen Allen Acker left the military at 21 years of age, he became so caught up in playing disc golf that it filled all his free time. After 3 years of talking with his parents about how perfect their 62 acre parcel in Bowdoinham was for a course, they took up his challenge and started creating what is now Acker's Acres. Over the next 20 years, the Ackers slowly improved, expanded, and built a reputation for their drop-in, self-serve course.

By April, 2021, Allen's mother was interested in turning the course over to him and his wife, Kate, to manage and run as a business. Since then, Allen has incorporated the business, obtained insurance, redesigned the logo, and has set out a plan for expansion. Acker's Acres recently received a loan from the Bowdoinham Community Development Initiative to forward these plans by upgrading the Pro Shop and building product inventory.

Located on the Dingley Road in the northwest sliver of Bowdoinham, the disc course may seem a bit out of the way. In the world of disc golf, however, it is a brilliant star. The original course is now ranked #64 out of 11,000 courses in the world while

the newer "twisted" course is ranked #80 in the world. The City of Lewiston and its surrounding area is ranked as the #1 city in the United States for disc golf courses. Because Acker's Acres is located just a hop from the Richmond exit of I-295, their secluded area is really very accessible to the public.

Allen enjoys talking about the many benefits of this sport. "It is a great way for the whole family to get outdoors and enjoy a fun sport at a very reasonable cost. It is only \$7 for one game or \$10 for the whole day to use the course, so it is affordable for everyone. A new disc is only \$25 or someone can go ahead and borrow one of our used discs for free." While summer is the busiest season, many people show up every day throughout the winter to walk the 1.5 mile course, get some exercise, and enjoy the outdoors. "I have a group of seniors here every morning," Allen says, "and many like to drop in after work to get a round in before supper."

One of the ways Allen will be promoting the course will be by sponsoring top disc players in tournaments. The #1 female player in Maine, Jessica Beckett, is

> actively involved with maintaining Acker's Acres in the summer andwillbeparticipating in state and regional tournaments year. Allen also plans on sponsoring the #2 male player in Maine who lives in Topsham. There are disc golf network apps that carry tournament coverage, so anyone can tune in to see past tournaments and the huge crowds they attract. Today, top players can earn significant money on the tournament circuit.

Now that Allen and Kate are focused on improving the business, they have a lot of plans for future expansion. They are exploring possible cross country ski trails, mountain bike trails and races, expanded food service, a full schedule of tournaments, and making the property available for events. "We have a world-ranked course that we are striving to make better," Allen says. They would love to have more Bowdoinham neighbors come and join all their visitors from away.

"Disc golfers have to be the best people. Many regulars have turned into friends," Allen says.




business over the last twenty years, and hopes to make all who have been involved in the success of the business proud by continuing it's legacy.

Cold Water Paddle Craft Safety

he following January 2 Associated Press news story is a good reminder about the dangers of paddling in cold water: "The New Hampshire Marine Patrol says that a man is dead after the paddle craft he was in overturned on Lake Winnipesaukee. ... The investigation found that a two-person kayak and a canoe, both with two people in them, left the Wolfeboro shoreline attempting to reach Grant Island. None of the occupants were wearing life jackets. Both vessels capsized."

As Spring arrives, especially when we have that wonderful day when it's 60+ degrees, it's oh-so tempting to pull a kayak, canoe or rowboat out of the garage and go for a paddle on one of our local rivers or Merrymeeting Bay. This, however, can be very dangerous, particularly if you accidentally capsize. The water temperature may not be as cold as it was on Lake Winnipesaukee in January, but it can still kill. Cold shock, negatively impacting your cardio-respiratory system, can occur immediately after capsizing. Hypothermia can render you immobile and unconscious in a short period of time.

Area Coast Guard Auxiliary members, along with active duty personnel at Coast Guard Station Boothbay Harbor, would like to remind local paddlers about a number of ways to stay safe when paddling in cold water.

Dress for immersion, not air temperature. Jeans and a t-shirt are not protective clothing. Especially avoid clothing made from cotton. Wear a wetsuit or dry suit. Keep your extremities warm too—head, hands, and feet.

Wear a personal flotation device (life jacket). Many paddlers think that simply carrying a life jacket on board with them

will keep them safe. Capsizing, however, can result in not only your paddle craft but your life jacket floating away from you and quickly being out of reach. National statistics are quite sobering on this point. In 80% of drowning cases, boaters were not wearing life jackets. Always put on your life jacket before setting out in your kayak, canoe or rowboat.

Attach or carry a sound-producing device on your life jacket. This could be a whistle, attached to your life jacket by means of a lanyard, or a small air horn carried in a jacket pocket. No one onshore or elsewhere on the water may hear a yell for help, but they are more likely to hear a whistle or air horn.

Don't paddle alone. Paddling with others in a group, and staying together, greatly increases the odds of survival following a capsize.

Locally, carry a cellphone in a waterproof phone case. Attach it to your life jacket or zip it in a jacket pocket. Use it to call for help if necessary. Recreational boaters in this area often have a marine band radio on board their vessels, but there are many radio "dead spots" in and around Bowdoinham. You are much better off having a cellphone with you rather than a hand-held radio.

Let others know when you're setting off, where you're going, and when you'll be back. In other words, "file a float plan" with a family member or friend. This is especially important if you have decided to paddle alone.

Free recreational boating safety literature, on this and other subjects, is available in Coast Guard plastic display cases located in the Bowdoinham Town Office, the Bowdoinham Library, the Bowdoinham Post Office, Long Branch School, and Top Tech Auto.

News from the Bowdoinham Food Pantry

reetings from the pantry! Pictured here is Board member and Volunteer Carol Lenna, expertly

maneuvering almost 900 pounds of produce donated from Harvest Tide Organics. Generosity from local farms like Harvest Tide comprises one piece of the BFP's food puzzle. Director Jenn Stonebreaker used part of her monthly "Shelf Notes" newsletter to address commonly asked questions about the BFP's food sources and costs, and I thought I'd share her super informational response: "Currently we acquire our food from five main sources: Good Shepherd Food Bank (GSFB) and their partner agency Midcoast Hunger Prevention Program (MCHPP), food drives/collection boxes, local farms, individual community members and the local grocery store."

Jenn continues with information about the cost: "We are able to purchase food from GSFB and MCHPP at very low cost; last week I ordered about 500lbs of food for \$181.00. The order included frozen fish, some meat, canned vegetables, soup, peanut butter, household items, etc. Donations from farms and community members are free to us, and then there's "The Shop". Each week



two volunteers pop over to the pantry early Wednesday morning and scan the shelves for holes, then hit the road and head to the local grocery store. An additional shopper "fills" the holes in our Backpack Program menu on Thursday mornings. "Providing healthy and sustaining food" is the cornerstone of our Mission. And we all know that healthy choices are often not the least expensive, nor most accessible. With these additional purchases we are able to provide nourishing food to our community, and when you break down the numbers, a little goes a long way. Currently we have 26 kiddos enrolled in our Backpack Program...that means we spend roughly \$7.70/ kiddo each week. And what do they get? Six meals and lots of snacks to see them through the

weekend! A small price to pay to fill a little tummy."

As you can see, a number of organizations, farms, and volunteers help the BFP keep purchasing costs low and shelves stocked. We are thankful to all of them.

The pantry is open every Wednesday from 4-6pm for in person shopping. ALL Bowdoin and Bowdoinham residents are welcome at the pantry, no income verification required! The pantry is located down by the waterfront, in the gray building.

Keep your nose to the grindstone. But cut yourself some slack too. Because you're only human! Turn over a new leaf as many times as you need to. As always, remember to breathe.



Bowdoinham Public Library Proposes New Entrance to Coombs Building

survey of Bowdoinham's older residents in 2016 informed the library leadership that many people were not visiting the due to accessibility issues with the library's current space. There is a wooden flight of stairs to enter the Coombs Building and another interior stairway to reach the library and public meeting rooms on the second floor. While improvements have been made since the survey was collected, the difficulty with stairs remains a barrier for many.

In 2018, library representatives met with Select Board Chair Tony Lewis and then Town Manager Bill Post and agreed to share the cost of an initial building assessment. The Town contracted with the architectural firm 44 North. A design was created for a ground level entrance that would be located in the northwest corner of the Coombs Building, where the current

wheelchair ramp exists. The proposed design creates a lobby, with interior doors to both the library and the Kendall Room, where many community meetings and activities take place. Library Board co-chair Joan Knight said, "This project is a great opportunity to make the Coombs Building more accessible not only for the library but for community events and public meetings." The library was not looking to expand. The motivation for this project was rooted in improving the building's accessibility.

Exploration of the systems and structure of the Coombs Building in 2019 exposed areas where the building doesn't meet current fire codes and would thus prohibit the library from moving forward with its project. The Select Board agreed to bring the entire Coombs Building up to code for the safety of its staff and the citizens who use the building. Those improvements have begun with the construction of new fire escapes to the library and town office. The library has received a financial bequest to support the construction of the new entrance, and plans a subsequent fundraising effort.

The town staff and Select Board are proposing that the Coombs Building have its building systems updated and office and public spaces be brought into compliance with accessibility standards and building codes as well as addressing the fire code issues. The library plans to use the same contractor and engineers as the Town, while drawing from its own funding sources for its portion of the project.

The voters of the town will have a chance to support this building upgrade in June at Town Meeting. If anyone would like to see the proposed design of the Coombs Building entrance, or ask questions about the library's intentions, please come to the library!

Interlibrary Loan

The library now can take advantage of the statewide Interlibrary loan service at no cost to its patrons. In the past we have needed to use the mail and ask for \$2 to offset the postage cost. Thanks to a recent grant from the Maine State Library we are now a stop on the weekly van delivery service. If there is a book that you would like to borrow from another library, please call or stop in and we will arrange to get it for you.

Creating a community-informed Vision for the 2024 Comprehensive Plan is a must to identify what the community members would like to see in their town over a 10-year period. The vision guides the strategies and goals for the town. I am pleased to report that the Visioning Process is making progress – If you are reading this before March 15, 2022, please plan to join the 2nd Community Listening Session at 6:30. Details of the meeting are on the Bowdoinham website; www.bowdoinham.com .

A recap of the process to date:

- Craig Freshley, of Good Group Decisions, is engaged to work with the Comprehensive Planning Committee to design the visioning process. Craig is the facilitator for public meetings and he served that role for the 2014 Comprehensive Plan.
- The first Community Listening Session was held in person on November 16, 2021 with excellent participation. Two questions guided the input and discussions.
- 1. What do you love about the community and want to keep?
- 2. What about the community would you like to change?
- Committee members and Craig reviewed the input and identified topic areas that needed more input. To reach more people for their input we developed a survey. The survey questions follow including the two from November's discussion:
- 1. What do you love about the community and want to keep?
- 2. What about the community would you like to change?
- 3. Measures you would support to improve traffic safety on our roads, recognizing that each would result in costs to the Town. Share your ideas.
- 4. Where traffic calming measures should be focused and the area(s) or description of intersections or road segments.
- 5. Strategies you would support to make housing more affordable to lower and moderate income families and individuals in

Town. Share your ideas.

- 6. Specific types of businesses you would like to see encouraged or discouraged in the community.
- 7. Parts of the community where commercial development should be especially encouraged or discouraged.
- 8. On a scale from 1 (min) to 10 (max) how much zoning and/or regulation should the Town have in order to deliberately preserve and develop the community that we envision.
- 9. Ways the community can engage more people to participate in volunteer and community efforts.
- Paper copies were available at several town locations (Library, Hardware Store, Country Store) and online. The link was shared in the Bowdoinham Newsletter, the Town website and on several Bowdoinham-related Facebook pages. The survey allowed many more community members to add their thoughts to the visioning process.

Other interesting discussions at recent meetings include:

- Ways to integrate solar installations, marijuana establishments, and PFAS issues into existing sections of the Comprehensive Plan format.
- Staying up-to-date on what is happening now with Land Use and other planning topics that are directly related to the current 2014 Comprehensive Plan still in effect until June of 2024. There are topics that the Land Use and CPC committees benefit by sharing information such as exceptions to Bowdoinham's shoreland zoning issues. The Bowdoinham plan considers Merrymeeting Bay differently than the State of Maine, which just considers it part of the Kennebec River. Another indepth discussion at several meetings is related to commercial development and well water safety.

Thanks for your interest in what is going on with the Comprehensive Plan - a challenging but interesting task of looking into the future and creating our best ideas of a future with a quality of life that continues to make Bowdoinham a great place to live.

We continue our shameless pitch for more members! This is a great time to join the Comprehensive Planning Committee. You can sit in on a couple of meetings without making a long-term commitment. We want to include more perspectives and voices.

Meetings are the second Tuesday of each month, 6:30-8:15. We may be meeting in person or on line, a quick check of the www.bowdoinham.com website will provide more information. Jennifer Curtis, Director of Planning and Development staffs this process. We can have up to 17 members, and currently have 9 active participants, one application is pending.

OUR TOWN HALL

If you get a chance, borrow from the Library Frank Connors' Book Atop that Hill,



a Social History of Bowdoinham's School House Hill, a dandy revelation about one our treasured town centers.

The Town Hall was built in 1823 as a Union Church, to give the Baptists, The Methodist Episcopalians, and the Universalists a place of worship.

From the Union Church Record which BHS was able to purchase last year.

"Bowdoinham, March 13, 1823

The incorporated Religious Society in the Village of Bowdoinham for the purpose of building a House for Public Worship met according to the adjournment.

John Potter, Esq. Moderator, received the following named persons by vote as members of this Society.

Bowdoinham, March 15, 1823

The Religious Society for Building Village Meeting House met according to the Adjournment.

Voted John Potter, Esq. be released from the service of Moderator.

Chose Israel Millet Moderator.

Voted Reuben Blake, Samuel Gray, Esq.,
——Patten, John Fulton, Charles Curtis,
And David Storey be admitted members of
this Society.

Voted that the House shall be built with a Porch and a handsome Dome.over the belfry.

Voted that the windows shall be arched in elliptic form.

Voted that the business respecting the inside for of the House be adjourned until next meeting

Voted that the Committee be authorized to contract for a frame forty-two feet wide and fifty four feet long with twenty feet Porch.

Voted that Israel Millet, & Samuel Gray Esq. be added to the forms committee for building Said House.

Voted the Committee proceed forthwith to draw a draft for Said House & proceed immediately to procure the timber and materials to erect the frame.


Voted Samuel Gray, Esq. write Mr. Davis for the land to erect Said House on.

Voted this meeting be adjourned two weeks at 6 o'clock P.M. at this place.

religious groups continued until 1837, when Capt. William Purington declared that if his next ship came in with a good profit, he would build a church for the Baptists. It did, and he did: the Second Baptist Church. By 1849 the Methodist Episcopalians decided they wanted their own place of worship and built a lovely building on the corner of Main and Center Streets, where Margaret Temple lives. (It burned on Dec. 1935) The Universalists continued in the old church until about 1856, when they declared the building unfit for worship and moved to Brunswick. In 1882, the Town bought the old Union Church. They replaced the steeple, considered unsafe, with the 'onion dome' we know today. Unfortunately, no record has been found to explain this change. Perhaps it was an attempt to make the building look less like a church and more like the Town Hall it became.

Since then the Town Hall has served the town and its citizens in many ways. meetings, voting, dances, theatrical and musical productions, basketball court, assorted shows by the Historical Society and others, private parties, the Plant sale and the Rummage Sale, Guild of Artisans Sale, and more. In the late 1980s and early '90s a Town Hall Restoration Committee was formed and did much to restore the building. The original onion dome, in bad shape, was copied and

replaced the old dome. A modern bathroom was added, among other things.

After 30 years it is again time to care for this treasured building which crowns the highest place in Bowdoinham Village, watching over all. A new Town Hall Restoration and Preservation Committee has been formed and is at work discovering what needs to be done. All interested people are invited to attend the meetings of this committee. Meanwhile, we are working to raise money to help with this

project.. A calendar and note cards created with pictures of the Pandemic Quilt blocks are for sale. The Bowdoinham Historical Society has allotted \$5000 from our Rideout Fund to match the first \$5000 in donations. (Checks to Bowdoinham Historical Society (501 (c) 3) and clearly marked TOWN HALL Fund.

Lets all work to see that our Town Hall is looking (and feeling) fine for her 200th Birthday in 2023!
