Bob Temple Well Drilling

Bob Temple

Bob Temple started out well drilling by working with his uncle and has built his business so he could include his own family—his son, daughter, and wife—in the operations. “I love working with my family,” Bob says. This summer, his 16-year-old grandson will lend a hand during the busy season and will start to learn the work just as Bob’s son, Hollis, did when he was a boy. Christine, Bob’s daughter, took on the office duties six years ago and his wife, Wilhelmina was finally able to recently retire from her duties. “The nice thing is we all get along together,” Christine adds.

Bob had been working at a marina when his uncle encouraged him to work with him on drilling. By 1984, Bob was ready to strike out on his own. Over the years, he has been able to add more sophisticated equipment in order to offer a full range of services. These include well drilling, filter work to help remove iron and other minerals, pump repair, and repairing broken water lines.

The business works primarily within a 30-mile radius and may find very different conditions for drilling even within that relatively small area. “We might find water at 200 feet or 800 feet,” Bob comments. “We plan to upgrade our drill so we can go as deep as 1,200 feet.” Drilling comprises about 80% of the business, with service taking up the

other 20%. “Our big thing is service,” Hollis adds. “If someone calls without water, they go to the top of our list. Every day brings new problems, so you have to be super flexible to solve things each day.”

A key strategy for Bob has been to

grow slowly and add new equipment only as the business can afford it.



His aim has been to earn a paycheck and to keep the debt load as low as possible. His current goal is to continue to get new equipment so that it will be easier to do more of the jobs they are called on to do. “We work hard for seven months to make a 12 month salary,” he says, “so it’s important to make the best use of the season with efficient turnover.”

Because Bob was born in Bowdoinham and has remained within 5 miles of his birthplace, he has developed wide-ranging contacts thus word-of-mouth

“The great thing about being self-employed is that I don’t have to retire,” Bob says. “I’ll keep going as long as I can.”

Emerald Builders

Reggie Lebel

Reggie Lebel, President of Emerald Builders, has two top goals for his company: to construct quality, high performance homes and to do renovations that bring greater energy savings to home owners. He acquired the skills for reaching these goals by working in his dad’s construction business as a young man. Further

experience also gave him a deep desire to use the latest techniques for projects that are high quality, energy efficient, and have minimum waste.

Building “net zero ready” homes is Reggie’s favorite work. These homes consume as little energy as possible and essentially create as much energy as they use.

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To achieve this, the homes have 12 inches of insulation in the walls, 16 plus inches in the roof, use triple glazed windows, have low energy appliances, and use a mechanical venting system that actually recovers energy. "When I started the business in 2006, people were interested in energy savings, but now in 2016, customers have a fair amount of knowledge and want the full package," Reggie says. He notes that the initial cost of building a net zero ready home may be about 15% higher than other construction, but the energy savings significantly reduces the yearly costs and makes the initial investment worth it. For instance, a 1700-square-foot house may only cost \$750-\$1,000 a year for heating, cooling, and hot water.

Reggie oversees the projects for his crew of four while his wife, Rachel, handles much of the office responsibilities. "It excites me to provide our workforce with good benefits," he says. By paying close attention to the numbers and working year around, he is able to offer steady employment with benefits.

While Emerald Builders currently sub-contracts the solar panel installation on their projects, in the future Reggie would like to do more of this work in-house. He also aims to be a company where people want to work and where they will have an opportunity to contribute to continual improvements.

The new headquarters at 43 Main Street will soon have a new addition to accommodate offices, workshop, and storage. Temple Well Drilling Bert Temple

Temple Well Drilling is taking a new direction under Bert Temple's management. As the company phases out its drilling service, Bert will be fully engaged in servicing and replacing well pumps, providing filtration, working to increase water flow, and using their mobile camera to scout out well problems so they can correct them. With two box trucks, they are able to cover a large area within an hour's drive. In the coming weeks, Bert plans to change the name of the company to "Temple Well Service."

While Bert is active throughout the year, there is often an increase in calls when seasonal people return for the summer. As they turn on the systems in their summer homes, problems crop up. "The work keeps me busy more than full-time," Bert says, "especially this time of year. I love what I do. My real passion is to race out and fix a dead pump. When people are desperate to get their water back, it makes you feel good to help out. They are so relieved."

A special service the business offers is looking at water flow rate. Because 99% of wells don't stamp the flow rate on the well cap, Bert uses special tools to determine the rate and can make recom-



mendations to increase the flow if necessary. One thing that might affect the flow rate this year is lower-than-usual water levels. Because the winter didn't bring a lot of snow, the spring melt was not as great as usual. Bert cautions that folks should watch upcoming rainfall amounts and perhaps cut back on water usage if we don't get regular, soaking rains.

Another thing Bert suggests is that homeowners be alert to any sudden decrease or increase in water flow rate or any slight dimming of electric lights since that can be a precursor to a pump's failure. While a failing pump won't always give a warning, these signs can be a clue. Failures can be caused by a nearby lightning strike, old age, or a mechanical breakdown. Newer pumps tend to last 10-15 years with some pumps lasting as long as 40 years. Bert has loved working with his brother, Scott, to continue the business their father started. Now that Scott is going in a different career direction, Bert is pleased to continue the family tradition. Being out on job sites doing hands-on work is his favorite part of the business. "I am happy to have the business stay small and to be out doing the work myself," Bert says. You can reach Bert by calling 666-3026, which is an answering service. Have you heard of the Town's Tax Club?

The Town of Bowdoinham offers a "Tax Club Plan" that allows property owners to pay their annual property tax bill in monthly installments without incurring interest. This plan was first authorized by a vote at the annual town meeting in June 2014 and was reauthorized at Town Meeting on June 15, 2016.

To be eligible to participate in this plan, the property owner must be current with their property taxes, must enroll no later than July 31, 2016 and must abide by the requirements of the plan. Automatic electronic payments are not offered under this plan, but property owners can schedule payments online through the Town's online payment system. Public Works' Summer Project

At the Town Meeting on June 15th, voters approved borrowing for two projects for this summer. The first project is to purchase a new Public Works dump truck equipped with a plow, wing and sander for winter and summer work. This new truck will replace a 2002 truck. This replacement continues the Town's capital plan for vehicle and equipment replacement and is expected to serve the Town for 12 to 14 years.

The second project is the reconstruction and paving of the Pork Point Road. The Pork Point Road project will include reconstructing approximately 2.2 miles of roadway from Browns Point Road to Route 24. Reconstruction includes drainage improvements, tree trimming and removal, culvert replacement (both under the road and at driveway entrances), removing the existing pavement by grinding, excavating the road base to remove any clay or other undesirable material, adding gravel to the road base, and adding gravel to correct the grade and crown of the road. Then the road will be fine-graded and a 2-inch layer of pavement will be placed.

After this road project is completed, there are two more roads that will need reconstruction: Carding Machine Road (paved portions) and Wildes Road. Then the Town will be in a position to only have to resurface the pavement with a shim and overlay pavement layer at a much reduced cost.

Debbie uses the reconstructed segments of multi-pieced fabrics adding additional fabric as she moves through the design process to create a final composition. Debbie uses freehand machine or hand quilting to complete the surface texture of each piece.

Jane has been making and altering photographic images for over 30 years. She's an inquisitive experimenter, exploring both traditional wet darkroom & alternative photographic processes such as: infrared film, Polaroid manipulations and emulsion transfers, hand-tinting black and white photographs, cyanotype & kallitype. Jane has learned to restructure her thinking in the digital age, blending the old with the new. And now she practices the ancient painting medium of encaustic wax with her photography. "Encaustic" means to burn in. Beeswax is mixed with damar resin and heated so that it becomes liquid. The hot wax medium is tinted with a powdered pigment and applied in layers. Each layer is fused with heat. Jane adds or subtracts the wax, using dental tools to scribe or make texture on the surface. Fiber, paper, or various objects can be embedded into the wax creating surface texture, luminosity and meaning.

Laurel started making soaps 13 years ago. Since then she has expanded her body care product line to include lotion, chapstick, deodorant, bath fizzies, and salt scrubs. Recently she started creating healing salves for arthritis and psoriasis. She uses natural ingredients and colors with no preservatives. She enjoys experimenting with new herbs, spices, flowers and scents.

News from Merrymeeting Arts Center

The summer long project of the Merrymeeting Arts Center began in June with the opening of an art exhibit and a wonderful original play. More events will take place in July and August.

The art exhibit, "Hallowed Ground, Forgotten Voices: Cemeteries and Memorials", opened on Friday, June 17th and will run through Celebrate Bowdoinham in September. Over 15 area artists have created works using a variety of media from photography to drawings to oil and watercolor paintings. The arts center's gallery at 9 Main Street (grey building with red roof down by the river in the village) is now open for summer hours: Saturdays from 10am to 1pm and Sundays from 1pm to 4pm and also by appointment.

Then we had the magical production "Merrymeeting Monologues" on June 18th. The original play written by Stephen Legawiec was based on research-epitaphs

of Mount Ararat English students who each studied a Bowdoinhamer of the past. Locals of all ages took part.

June 18th was also the opening of the related Bowdoinham Historical Society exhibit "Digging up the Past". The exhibit will open periodically throughout the rest of the summer, including Open Farm Day on July 17th.

Jay Robbins of Richmond will give a talk on July 10th at 2pm on "Gravestones as Historical Artifacts." Gravestones – because they are dated artifacts – have been extremely useful to historical archaeologists. They are also rich sources of information on kinship, life expectancy and views of death. Jay Robbins is an active historical archaeologist who has been involved with many projects in the area.

Cemetery Weekend (August 20-21) is offered in collaboration with the Bowdoinham Historical Society. There will be guided tours of three graveyards on Saturday, August 20th at 1pm at Ridge Cemetery (way up Ridge Rd. almost to Richmond), 2:30pm at Village Cemetery (across from Bowdoinham Community School) and 4pm at Bay View Cemetery

(on Rte 24 about 1.5 miles south of the village). Betsy Steen, Albert Stehle, and Sexton Frank Connors will lead the tours.

The Bowdoinham Historical Society is developing maps of the cemeteries and is completing a database with information about the graves with funding through the project. Future researches and visitors to Bowdoinham will find this information invaluable. During Cemetery Weekend visitors will be able to view the Bowdoinham Historical Society's archives.

On Sunday August 21st the weekend's activities will culminate with a talk at 2pm by Franklin Burroughs - the project scholar - on "A Sense of Place."

BCDI News

BCDI is very pleased to announce that it has received two grants to help support its operations and to strengthen the organization. Having already received a Bowdoin College Common Good Grant in March, The New England Grassroots Environment Fund has awarded BCDI a “Grow Grant” of \$2,000, the third time that BCDI has received NEGEF support. In addition, The Maine Community Foundation has provided BCDI \$8,000 to build capacity of the organization to work strategically with the Town in the revitalization of the village in accordance with the Comprehensive Plan. These two grants will help provide the wherewithal to broaden our Membership, maintain the Community Development loan/Investment program - Neighbors Investing in Neighbors - and further engage the community in shaping a future rooted in our past.

With regard to Community Development Loans, the BCDI Board addressed a loan request on June 13th to allow Bob Kane Wood Products to make several improvements to its operations: improved access to its wood lot, a replacement chainsaw and repairs to its wood delivery vehicle. At this writing we are in the process of vetting the application and preparing the investment offering for presentation to the BCDI Membership, and hopefully the loan will be disbursed before publication! Several new loans to some of the burgeoning farms in town are in preliminary discussion and will likely be offered in the Fall.

In order to participate in the Neighbors Investing in Neighbors program, either as a loan seeker or as an investor, you must be a Member of BCDI. This is a requirement of the State Securities Administration and allows us to maintain the program in compliance with State law. 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Plumbing Tip *Does your toilet tank sweat?*

Water colder than the surrounding air in your bathroom can cause a porcelain toilet to sweat, possibly ruining your floor during hot humid summers. A running toilet will sweat worse, so first determine if that is the problem by putting food coloring in the tank and see if the color shows up in the bowl. If that is not the problem you can either install a tempering valve that can be regulated to deliver warm water to your toilet, purchase a new toilet with a lined tank or purchase a kit to retrofit your existing toilet with a liner.

Summer brings lots of opportunities to meet with friends and family, to go on short trips or to enjoy a hike. It also brings an increase in the number of people trying to scam you. Here are a few tips for avoiding the wiles of a scam artist or thief.

- Don't post Facebook photos that indicate you aren't at home. We all have heard of people who have been targeted for a home evasion because they are attending a well-publicized event. Another way for thieves to learn that you are not home is to watch your social media postings. Wait

and post those great vacation pictures when you get home. It will be fun (and bring back some great memories!) when you through to decide which ones you want to share.

- If someone offering a home repair service comes to your door and you have not called to request an estimate, send them packing. If the deal they are offering sounds too good to be true, it probably is!

- When a phone or email scammer tells you that you owe money to the IRS, that a grandchild needs money, that you need to pay a fine because you didn't show up for jury duty, or any host of other scams, the best advice is to stop engaging. Hang up the phone, delete the email, and shut the door!

Scammers play on fear and emotion to

get you to fall for their scheme. Your best weapon is time. If you are worried that the scammer may be telling you the truth, tell them that you will call the business directly after you investigate. Take time to think about and investigate what they are saying. Don't be pressured into making fast decisions or give personal information to an unsolicited caller or email. Don't click on links in an unsolicited email or text message. Never send money by wire transfer or prepaid debit card to someone you don't know. If you are unsure about a call, call the business directly.

There are many fun things to do in summer—picnics, visits to the beach, hikes... Don't waste your time and your money on a scammer.
