Have you heard of the Town's Tax Club?

he Town of Bowdoinham now offers a "Tax Club Plan" that allows property owners to pay their annual property tax bill in monthly installments without incurring interest. This plan was first authorized by a vote at the Town Meeting in June of 2014 and is re-authorized each year.

To be eligible to participate in this plan, the property owner must be current with their property taxes, must enroll no later than July 31, 2019 and must abide by the requirements of the plan. Automatic electronic payments are not offered under this plan, but property owners can schedule payments online through the Town's online payment system. This is an easier way to pay your property taxes in smaller monthly payments without incurring any interest. We are pleased to be able to offer this payment option to our residents.

lbert D. Acker graduated from Sanford High School and retired from the U.S Navy VP 21 after 22 years with the rank of Senior Chief Aviation Machinists Mate. He was a Veteran of both the Korean Conflict and Vietnam war. Following retirement, he served as Treasurer/Manager of the Bowdoinham Federal Credit Union for 25 years and as a Selectman of Bowdoinham. He also graduated from New Hampshire College in 1979 with a degree in Business. Al Acker was a proud member at the Springvale Masonic Lodge #190 for 67 years, an Honorary member of Village Masonic Lodge #26 of Bowdoinham, a member of Post 132 American Legion of Richmond, Fleet Reserve Association and one of the founding members of the Snowbirds Snowmobile Club. He loved hunting and fishing and doting on his grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Al was never shy, always funny and a very caring man ready to lend a hand to anyone in need. His famous pointer finger wave could confuse a newcomer to town if you didn't know him as if you were being scolded.

He loved the Coffee Crew and his time spent at the Town Landing in retirement. He was known in some circles as The Town Crier and as The Rev. in others. His "Al'isms" from "not for publication" to "that move was dumber than a wheelbarrow full of hammers" were used a lot. There are many more with language not



suitable for this publication.

He was a human calculator and demanded his kids and grandkids be so as well. He would grill one of his grandson's on multiplication, division, and percentages; at 11 this grandson knew about compound interest.

Al could build anything needed functionally with wood. Never claiming to be a finish carpenter he was amazing to work with

Al could fix anything with a motor; 23 years a Naval Aviation Mechanic will do that for you.

While Chairman of the Board of Selectman the Town hired Calvin Temple, lifelong resident, to Calvin's first Law Enforcement position as Constable for the Town of Bowdoinham. He did love his adopted home town as do all generations of the Acker family.

He was absolutely one-of-a-kind; the community and his family will never be the same. In recognition of his service to the country and the town, The Bowdoinham Select Board dedicated this year's annual report to Albert D. Acker.

BCDI News

ince our advertisement and article about BCDI's relationship with the Town was published in the May-June newsletter, we have received some questions about how our organization began and about our unique Loan/Investment Program. What follows is a snapshot of BCDI's inception and some background on BCDI's cornerstone initiative, the "Neighbors Investing In Neighbors" Loan Program.

In 2011, a group of twenty-five Bowdoinham citizens, including farmers, local business owners, and current and former Selectboard members (in their personal capacities), got together to discuss how they might help the town build on existing assets - a burgeoning group of young farmers committed to sustainable agriculture, a vibrant arts scene, a long history of an eclectic population united by a strong sense of community, a location on Merrymeeting Bay midway between four key Maine cities - to make Bowdoinham an even better place to live and work. What emerged from these conversations is Bowdoinham Community Development Initiative (BCDI).

The plan for BCDI was to start small, based on the needs and interests of community members. In an incremental way, it established the capacity to provide capital, and to incubate and operate these mutual benefit enterprises. The starting point was food: farms and the farmers that run them, processing and distribution, and the land that supports them. Its first initiative was a community-based loan to support the expansion of a small farm through the purchase of a used tractor.

BCDI was officially founded in June of 2012, and then in October of 2013, BCDI became a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization and established the capacity to provide local capital to address local needs by creating a system for local investment - "Neighbors Investing In Neighbors". The amount of a BCDI loan may be a minimum of \$500 and a maximum of

\$20,000. Loans are very low interest (3%) and short term; repayment is expected between 12 and 36 months after disbursement. The repayment schedule is flexible and is tailored to meet the specific needs and capacities of the beneficiary (You must be a member of BCDI to apply for a loan. Membership begins at just \$10!). The BCDI Loan Program is designed to meet the needs of businesses that are unable to obtain a low-cost loan through traditional lending institutions for reasons such as an incomplete credit history.

While the Loan Program is coordinated by BCDI, the funds come directly from individual BCDI members who serve as "investors." Community members who are interested in helping to invest in the growth and development of local businesses can provide financial support toward the loan provided to the business (again, you must be a BCDI member to participate in one of these investment opportunities). BCDI's role is to coordinate and administer the process between the business seeking the loan and the numerous individual investors who help to fund a loan in full. When the loans are paid back, our investors receive their original contribution amount back with interest. To date, over \$100,000 has been invested into local businesses through our program. Our model truly is "neighbors investing in neighbors".

Going forward, BCDI loans and other

activities will continue to be aimed at supporting farmers and other local businesses. The focus of our efforts depends largely on the needs of the businesses in Bowdoinham – BCDI aims to be resource-ready and able to respond to the community needs.

And who's behind all this moving and shaking?! BCDI's Board of Directors is a "working board" comprised of volunteer residents and business owners of Bowdoinham. This group of volunteers provide the organization with new insights and energy, particularly from Board turnover. BCDI has term limits on all Board members, as well as the Chair, so we are continually cycling in new Board volunteers with new perspectives and experiences. We've strived to find a balance between retaining institutional memory and involving new Board members. With that, we are always looking for new Board volunteers! Age Friendly Approach to Aging in Place

ould you like to stay safely in your home as you age? Or do you have a loved one who lives alone that you worry about? Dr. Chip Teel has pioneered a service called Full Circle America that includes visits from volunteers, telephone check-ins, monitoring with web cams, and self monitoring with inexpensive pulse ox meters and pedometers. This means you can be seen - with your permission – by family members or care providers at a distance. Involving participants as volunteers is an essential part of the program so people feel that they are giving back, as well as receiving services. Full Circle America has an internet-based platform to help people keep an electronic log where needs and availability are monitored, important documents are kept handy, and medications can be refilled.

Dr. Teel is coming to Bowdoinham on existing technology while emphasizing the non-medical aspects of living.

Full Circle America's primary mission to provide a high quality of life at an affordable price for those who wish to live independently at home.



News from Merrymeeting Arts Center

OOM - A Weaving Show, featuring the work of Luke MacFadyen and Delaney Bullock had a very successful opening on May 5th, at the Merrymeeting Arts Gallery. The show features many of Luke's own designs of hand-woven vests, shawls and wall hangings, as well as blankets Luke wove for Brahms Mount Textiles, where he worked as a sample weaver for many years. Also included in the show are weavings by Delaney Bullock of Bowdoin College, class of 2022.

In addition to the beautiful and inspiring weavings of these two artists, there are looms on display, and the opportunity to sit down at a loom, see how it works, and try your hand at weaving.

The show will be on exhibit through August 17th, and can be seen during our regular gallery hours, Saturdays between 10am and 1pm.

The Heron - A Community Art Show

Bryce Muir's Local Myths sculpture collection was generously donated to MAC by Peggy and Seth Muir. There are twelve sculptures remaining in the collection (four others were sold to private owners years ago). MAC will be featuring one sculpture a year as a tribute to Bryce, and a celebration of this outstanding wood sculpture collection. The highlighted sculpture will be a focus of our programming throughout the year, and the subject of each year's Community Art Show.

This year's highlighted sculpture is The Heron, and the Community Art Show will feature art with The Heron as its theme. The



show is open to everyone, children and adults, amateurs and professional artists alike. All mediums - painting, drawing, sculpture, photography, stained glass, mixed media, etc. - are welcome. The only requirement is that the piece be related to The Heron, no matter how loosely interpreted.

Stop by the MAC gallery during normal Saturday hours (10am-1pm through August 17th) to be inspired by Bryce's Heron Sculpture, or pick up a copy of Bryce's "Local Myths" and read "Heron Returns the Gift" for additional inspiration. Artists wishing to purchase a copy of "Local Myths" in preparation for the show may do so for a special Community Art Show price of \$10.00.

The Community Art Show will open on September 14th, during Celebrate Bowdoinham, and remain on display through October 19, 2019, during MAC's regular gallery hours, 10am - 1pm on Saturdays. There is no fee to enter and everyone is invited to participate.

Art for the show must be submitted no later than August 24th. The gallery will be open on Monday, August19th, from 4-6pm, Wednesday, August 21st, from 4-6pm, and Saturday, August 24th, from 10am-12 noon for the purpose of submitting artwork for the show.

errymeeting Hall is changing!
With the help of the community,
Merrymeeting Hall is becoming a
beautiful community space for Bowdoinham. Downstairs Dudes, or the Gentlemen of the Lower Level as they are known
around the Hall, have been making huge
progress. Electrical work is about three
quarters finished and there is a new storage area behind the kitchen which will
hold tables and chairs when not in use.

Meanwhile, local Bowdoinham resident Bob Stetson is creating a beautiful handrail and Newell Post for the top of the staircase, which begins on the ground floor. It will match the ones on the staircase going up to the theater. Also hard at work, The Merrymeeting Monday Ladies have been busy repairing plastering, painting, cleaning, and sorting the Hall.

The Eva Palmer Memorial Theater has had an upgrade as well, the stairclimbing chairs to theater are now in working order. Eventually, the Historical Society hopes to have a wheel chair lift so that it may accommodate all visitors.

Recently, the Theater has been a local place for line dancing and hosted a Violin and Viola recital. It is a versatile space, and people are calling and making reservations for an assortment of meetings and




private parties in the months to come.

During the course of the summer, they hope to fill the front lawn area so that it is level with, or slightly higher than the sidewalk. This

will allow the restoration of a short ramp off the church side of the porch, enabling wheel chair access. The Historical Society is also working to get permission to cut the curb, and allow a small drive in near the end of the ramp. These renovations to the lawn are all part of an effort to make the Hall more assessible for its guests.

Historical Society News

e are continuing to raise money for the restoration of Merrymeeting Hall, a Community Center for Bowdoinham.

BHS members served a supper on June 30th at the Concert at the Landing and will be serving another Concert supper at the Landing on Sunday, July 21st, as well as serving their famous Bowdoinham Strawberry Shortcake at the Open Farm Day BBQ on Sunday July 28th.

On June 7th the Bowdoinham Historical Society joined the 4th graders at Bowdoinham Community School for a day of Bowdoinham History and Life in the Past. Leslie Anderson ran the station on One Room Schools, Nan Curtis led Needlework, Cathy Reynolds mentored students in Knot Tying (including things made from knots), Joanne Savoie helped students understand what daily life was like about 100 years ago, Betsy Steen discussed Bowdoinham Ship Building and Seafaring, and Lori Segar led students in old-Fashioned Games. Cemetery Committee News

he Cemetery Advisory Committee was unable to do the planned "clean-ups" in the Village Burying Ground during April and May due to very wet ground conditions. However, some of their volunteers, Jacinta Blodgett, Sam Tome and new committee member, Cassie Hensley, were out searching for some of Bowdoinham's lost cemeteries, and found the D. M. Plot in the discontinued Dingley Road area. They also looked at the Sedgley Plot in the State Wildlife Management Area at the end of Wildes Road. The Committee has been trying to locate a Booker Plot, which anecdotally was near the Booker Road, in the vicinity of I295. Does anyone know of this plot? If so, please don't hesitate to reach out!

Meanwhile, Elaine Diaz and Linda Temple assembled supply kits for keepers and regular volunteers, which may be picked up at Elaine's porch, located at 18 Sedgley Field Lane or at the Town Office. If needed the Committee may be able to deliver a kit to you. These kits include a spray bottle of D-2, the stone cleaning solution, an informational packet and a clipboard with survey sheets. Please, if you are a keeper, or find a cemetery, fill out this form as best you can, keep a copy for your file and send or take one copy to Pam at the Town Office or to Elaine Diaz. These are very important in giving the town a summary of the conditions and needs of the 65 plus burial grounds in

Bowdoinham.

Summer plans include clean-up at the Village Burying Ground on: July 13th, 14th and 27th, and August 10th, 11th, 24th, and 25th. Areas will be designated, and supplies and instructions will be available. Work starts at 9am and goes until 3pm, or until we are too tired to continue! At present we do not have someone who is trained in stone restoration. If you know of someone or are interested in learning this skill, please contact Pam Ross at the Town Office. If you are a Keeper, The Cemetery Advisory Committee wants to continue to support you in tending your cemeteries, please contact Elaine Diaz or Pam Ross if you are in need of additional supplies, assistance or support.

The next Cemetery Advisory Committee meetings are on July 8th and August 5th at 4pm, but it may be subject to change. Check the Town calendar located on the "Calendar" page of the Town's website or check with Pam at the Town Office as this time might change to accommodate new committee members. (We still have 2 vacancies.)

How to Start a New Business

owdoinham is such an entrepreneurial town! New businesses are starting up all the time. If you are on fire with a self-employment idea, whether it is a modest home-based enterprise or a larger venture that will employ several people, the Town of Bowdoinham wants to smooth your path forward so you can succeed. Here are some helpful tips for how to take your first steps:

- 1. Work on a written business plan whether your idea is small or large. Even if you don't know a lot of details yet, writing down what you do know will help you to see the things you need to research. It will also you help you answer the key questions. Is this idea feasible (can I get it underway)? Is it viable (can it grow to the point where it will meet my financial goals)? Is it desirable (will the demands of the business fit into my life and be something I want to spend my time on)? There are free services that can help you write your plan including one-on-one help or workshops. See the footnote.
- 2. Decide if you want to operate as a sole proprietorship, partnership, or corporation. Forming an LLC has become more popular in recent years (rather than

- a corporation). A business counselor or lawyer can help you decide which form is best for you.
- 3. If you decide to incorporate, you can obtain incorporation papers from the Maine Secretary of State, Bureau of Corporations, State House Station #29, Augusta, Maine 04333.
- 4. A federal employer identification number is required if you intend to have employees. It is also helpful on some federal forms even if you are a sole proprietor with no employees. You can obtain the needed form from the nearest Internal Revenue Service Office (Form SS-4, EIN) or you can download it from the IRS website, www.irs.gov. Use the search bar to get to the form you need.
- 5. Obtain a State Sales Tax Number if you plan to sell a taxable product. You can get this from the Maine Department of Finance, Bureau of Taxation, State House Station #78, Augusta, Maine 04333. (207) 287-2336. They can give you guidance about the current sales tax rate and on how often you need to file your sales tax forms and revenue given the volume of sales you think you may have.
- 6. Talk with the Bowdoinham Town Office about the permitting process. This process is also outlined on the Town's Website.
- 7. If your business is operated in your home, check in with the Town's Code Enforcement Officer on whether or not

you will need a Site Plan Review Permit from the Town.

8. If you plan to have employees, there are a couple of other things you will need. One is an unemployment insurance identification number from the Unemployment Compensation Division, Maine Department of Labor. Also, make sure you are in necessary compliance with the Workers Compensation Act by contacting the Maine Workers Compensation Commission. Finally, contact the Maine Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Standards to determine compliance with the Occupational Safety and Health Act. The Maine State website can help give you information on all of this. Simply go to www.maine.gov.



Dear Bowdoinham Residents,

Thank you for the honor of serving as your State Representative once again. I have been working hard on your behalf to provide responsive constituent services, be your advocate in Augusta and advance legislation that improves life in our district and in our state.

Over the past several months, we considered close to 2,000 pieces of legislation covering several topics. We expanded health care coverage, passed measures to provide relief from the opioid crisis, expanded access to solar power and high-speed broadband internet, set the stage to build a more resilient power grid, increased protections for both workers and consumers, expanded access to prescription medicines, expanded voting rights and took steps to improve public health.

I'm especially proud that we passed a state budget that begins restoring revenue sharing money for our town, increases education funding and support for teachers, increases the homestead exemption and expands the Property Tax Fairness credit for low- and fixed-income Maine families. The budget will ensure we do a better job protecting the independence of seniors and caring for our neighbors with disabilities. It also pays for roads and other key infrastructure services across the entire state.

I was glad to return this year as House chair of the Legislature's Energy, Utilities and Technology Committee. We knocked down barriers holding back solar power and broadband. We also passed measures to hold CMP accountable for the way they have treated Maine's electricity customers for at least the last two years, and there are still more measures on the table to keep offshore investors from profiting from inflated electricity bills.

Whether we are dealing with the above issues or any other topic, I will continue to work with all of my colleagues, regardless of party affiliation, to make sure we're doing the best work we can for the people of our district and all the people of Maine.
