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### **BCDI News**

hanks to the extremely generous support of you, our members and friends in the community, BCDI was able to award \$12,000 in grants during our second round of funding for our BCDI Covid-19 Community Response Grants! In just over one month, we awarded \$19,000 to folks in the Bowdoinham community whose work supports BCDI's core mission with a focus in increasing access to food, improving the health and safety, and/or otherwise meeting the basic needs of the Bowdoinham community.

Grant funding is not something BCDI has ever done before. Again, it is thanks to supporters like the Elmina B. Sewall Foundation, Abbagadassett Foundation, and other individuals in Bowdoinham and our surrounding communities that we have been able to offer this Community Response Grant Program. Here are the round two BCDI CO-VID-19 Community Response Grants recipients:

### Attention Bowdoinham Business Owners

Did you know that BCDI has a low-interest Loan Program just for Bowdoinham businesses?! BCDI's Neighbors Investing In Neighbors Loan Program offers low-cost loans to Bowdoinham small businesses, including those that may be unable to obtain loans from commercial lending institutions for reasons such as insufficient credit history. Loan amounts range from \$500 to \$20,000, offer a low interest rate, and are short-term with repayment expected within 1-3 years. Learn more at our website www.bcdimaine.org/loan-investment.



<u>Blue Bell Farm</u>: Blue Bell farm has seen an increase in demand at its farmstand. Grant funds will be used toward the purchase of another refrigerator as well as additional hand sanitizer and packaging to ensure customers can obtain food safely.

Bowdoinham Farmers' Market: The Bowdoinham Farmers' Market will use grant funds to implement best practices according to guidance from the Maine Federation of Farmers Markets. Grant funds will be used for signage, tables and coolers for preorders, hand sanitizer, and touch free screen readers, as well as to support a Veggie Valet position to manage traffic flow and deliver pre-orders to customers safely.

Bowdoinham Public Library: The Bowdoinham Public Library will use the grant funds to help facilitate access to books in the current climate. Funds will support four different StoryWalk book projects on the Bowdoinham waterfront trail throughout the summer. Funds will also be used to support an expanded summer

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reading program and to build the Bowdoinham Book Trailer, which will be used to increase access to books for people of all ages.

<u>Fairwinds Farm</u>: For almost twenty years, residents of Bowdoinham and surrounding communities have been able to pick fresh berries at Fairwinds Farm. Fairwinds Farm will use the grant funds to ensure that customers can continue to do this safely. Funds will be used toward tables, tents, contactless credit card machines, hand washing stations, masks, gloves and hand sanitizer.

<u>Harvest Tide Organics</u>: Harvest Tide has seen a significant increase in traffic at their farmstand and will use the funds to make

improvements to respond to the increased demand. Harvest Tide is also providing space for some other area farms and businesses to sell their products. Grant funds will be used to increase cold storage capacity to ensure that a wider selection of food is available in sufficient quantities to meet the increased demand.

<u>Maggie's Farm at Mulberry Creek</u>: Maggie's Farm has seen a significant increase in traffic to the farm. Grant funds will be used to make improvements to the farm stand and parking areas to ensure customers can access food safely.

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<u>Scape Goat Garlic Farm</u>: Scape Goat Garlic Farm will use the grant funds to help defray additional costs associated with providing culinary garlic and seed garlic to the community.

Funds will be used for bags, gloves, sanitizing supplies, and other increased costs associated with delivering garlic safely.

<u>Shearlings Salon</u>: Julie Booty has been a licensed cosmetologist for 30 years. She is responding to the current crisis by reopening a one chair salon in her home. Grant funds will be used to support this transition, to purchase necessary protective equipment, and to help with the additional cleaning and sanitation costs necessary to provide Bowdoinham residents of all ages a safe place to get a haircut.

Stonecipher Farm: The farmstand at Stonecipher Farm has seen significantly increased traffic and has become an outlet for multiple area farms and businesses to sell their products. Grant funds will be used to continue to improve the farm stand, specifically to increase cold storage capacity to respond to the increased demand.

<u>Whatley Farm</u>: Whatley Farm has seen a significant increase in traffic and an interest in on- farm purchases. Grant funds will be used to convert an existing woodshed to a small self-service farm stand. The finished farm stand will have a glass door, a refrigerator and freezer, and new signage to facilitate safe and contactless access to food.

Thank you to those of you who participated in our inaugural May Membership Month! We welcomed several new individual members and business members, and received many membership renewals. As a small nonprofit your membership support is critical to our work! ational and global events have really stirred up how we get our groceries. Pictures of bare shelves in some stores, while farmers on the other side of the country were plowing under crops made clear the fragile nature of overextended supply chains. Fortunately, our local food producers are nimble and our community is strong and supportive as we shifted to unique ways of getting food to our neighbors. The local food chain is robust, because YOU have been marvelous supporters of local agriculture in our farmers' markets, farmstands, CSAs, food stores, and restaurants. These events have shown us that buying local is not just a feel-good indulgence, it's an essential part of maintaining a strong, and resilient economy that provides critical supplies. We thank you for that support, and are proud to keep growing delicious and healthy food.

Down at the Bowdoinham Farmers' Market we are providing a convenient place to get local vegetables, dairy, meat, bread and tasty treats, even with a centerpiece of flowers to boot! We have a number of procedures in place to make it as convenient and safe as possible. This season you will see that: booths are spread out in the park; there is one way foot traffic; the first half hour (8:30-9:00) is reserved for higher risk customers; each vendor is taking extra steps to maintain social distance: vendors are able to take pre-orders to reduce lines; and we have a "veggie valet" providing curbside delivery of pre-orders.

Many of the adaptations the market made this year were possible thanks to a generous grant from BCDI, showing that investing in our local communities through organizations, infrastructure and commerce pays dividends in our own health and security. In Bowdoinham, and in Maine, we have so many diverse businesses, chances are, what you need is just around the corner. Even our hand sanitizer was made locally by Maine Craft Distilling. Here's to a great season!

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### **Internet Project Update**

Il the fiber is on the poles, splicing and drop wires are completed to many households, and LCI technicians are "lighting up" homes in Bowdoinham as quickly as they can. As of June 12<sup>th</sup> approximately 50 new Bowdoinham subscribers will be surfing the web, streaming video, participating in Zoom/ Skype video conferences, and generally downloading and uploading to their hearts content on their 50 Mbps or 100 Mbps fiber optic internet connection.

A lot of work has taken place to complete this 25 mile fiber optic network for these previously underserved areas of Bowdoinham. The ConnectME grant that was secured last year, combined with TIF funds from Bowdoinham and private capital investment from LCI made this new fiber optic network possible.

LCI can serve 217 homes on the new 25 mile Fiber Optic Network – but so far only 110 of the 217 homes have signed up. LCI will continue to take applications for this first wave of installs. But after that date you may have to wait till late summer or early fall for the second wave of installs in Bowdoinham.

Don't miss this first wave of installations! If you already have LCI's fiber, tell your neighbors to apply today. The roads that are include in the LCI Fiber Optic Network are all or portions of: Batchelder Rd., Cranberry Way, Hatch Point Lane, River Rd., Beechnut Ridge, Dingley Rd., Hunter Lane, S. Pleasant St., Carding Machine Rd., Eagle Wing Lane, Island View Lane, Wallace Way, Carlson Cross Rd., Fiddlehead Lane, Pioneer Rd., White Rd.

### Library News

e've heard so many references to "the new normal". With new routines, new ways of behaving, and new ways of maintaining our safety from COVID-19, I find myself asking each day, "Is THIS the new normal? ...Or is THIS? ...Or is THIS?"

I can only tell you what the "normal" is for today (written in early June) at the Bowdoinham Public Library. We are open for regular borrowing of books on Tuesdays from 10-2 and Fridays from 2-6. Capacity is 3 patrons in the Adult Room and one family in the children's room. For now, the library is not the "stay, relax and visit place" that it has always been, but more the "grab and go" sort of place. Masks are required and cleaning practices are vigorous. We are pleased that the State Library and other government agencies were able to provide guidelines for our safe reopening. Thank you to Max Zachau for building us a plexiglass shield for our counter.

We also have our own brand of "curbside" borrowing of books, using our online catalogue and the "Free Little Library" outside the Coombs Building. People who are not able or not comfortable coming into the library can safely borrow books 7 days a week through this borrowing system.

The library was pleased to receive a BCDI grant to support programming for both children and adults during this time of COVID-19. We wanted a way to bring books to patrons of all ages and do



it safely. With the craftsmanship of Brian Staid, and the inspiration of the oldfashioned book mobiles, we created a small utility trailer that can be filled with books and brought to locations such as the Farmers Market on Saturday mornings.

We're asking the public's help in naming it.

The BCDI grant also helped the Library purchase several "Story Walks" for families with younger children. You may see those pop up around town as well – a sequential series of posts displaying pages of a picture book. Families can take a walk and read as they go.

Lumber shipments provided capital for these isolated communities, allowing mill owners to diversify into grain-processing, wool-carding, tanning, and metal-forging, and edging these communities into the industrial Age.

### **Fire & Recue News**

irst off, obviously COVID-19 has changed the way that everyday business is conducted. This change is quite evident to anybody that has a need for emergency services whether it is police, fire or EMS. When you call 911 the dispatcher's questions are designed to rapidly identify life safety issues and get the right help responding as quickly as possible. Since early March and at least for the foreseeable future there are a few extra questions dispatch is required to ask to help with responder safety. These additional questions do not delay response but they do help to identify situations that may involve a significantly higher risk of exposure to COVID-19 which in turn helps responders better prepare for what they may encounter on scene. Questions such as fever, chills, muscle pain, headache, and sore throat are now asked for every caller that would require some type of face to face interaction with and emergency responder. Please be patient with the dispatcher as they ask these questions. They are doing their part to make sure the caller and the responders are all as safe as possible.

As we roll into summer our concerns quickly shift from the snow storms of May to thunderstorm and hurricane season. The past four months has made us all experts in quarantine and creative home cooking but in doing so many of us may have tapped in to some of our emergency provisions. Take the time to double check and make sure your emergency kits are in order. Bottled water, flashlights with fresh batteries, light sticks, extra propane, car chargers for phones and other hand held devices, energy bars or similar foods with extended shelf life (don't forget pet food as well) are good items to start with. If the first half of 2020 has taught us anything it is that you can never be fully prepared but you can certainly minimize the immediate impact of an unexpected event. Be prepared, stay safe and stay healthy.

In a World Where You Can Be Anything, Be Kind.

*Compassion. For yourself. And for others too.* To feel compassion means to be aware of and moved to alleviate suffering. Though we typically think of it as otherfocused, self-compassion plays a strate-

gic role in regaining your emotional wellbeing in hard times.

Compassion and Acceptance: Two Sides of the Same Coin. There is no way around the fact that much of what must be accepted, from the personal to the political, is

painful. Thus the only way to do it is with compassion. Non-acceptance in all its forms (denying, withdrawing, tantruming, giving up) is strongly correlated with correspondingly higher levels of stress, unhappiness, and suffering. The more you beat yourself up - or beat up others - the more distracted you will be from accepting the plain and simple truth of whatever is right in front of you. Compassion, on the other hand, greases the wheels of whatever you need to do next: give yourself a break, give others a break, or just cope more effectively with how difficult it can be to do even that.

You're Only Human. With practice, compassion improves your ability to think more clearly, to be less caught up in your own emotions and reactions, and to rebound more quickly whenever you do find yourself in the grip of difficult thoughts and feelings. You will get better at bearing the unbearable, when that's how the truth feels to you. And from that place, you will move you forward with more more clarity and inner peace.

A Simple Self-Compassion Practice: "There, There." Once you've taken a few "balloon" breaths (see previous newsletters for refresher), try to hold an attitude of compassion in your heart as you practice acceptance of the current moment,

just as it is, right now. Feel the place within where you know some harshness toward yourself or toward others still resides. It might be in the form of thoughts (e.g., "It's all my/their fault!"); or body sensations (e.g., muscle tension). Allow yourself to embody compassion for your-

self, for others, and for the world, just as they are right now, just as you would soothe any suffering being."There, there." Place your hands, one on top of the other, on the left side of your chest where your heart is. Notice the sensation of warmth and the way that it grows after a moment or two. Speak to yourself gently, aloud or silently: "This pain is difficult for me to bear." "May I be a little kinder to myself and to everyone else right now." Remember the words and phrases of comfort you would offer to someone else and then offer them to yourself. With each in-breath, inhale the wish to be free of this suffering. With each out-breath, imagine a growing space inside yourself where you may more easily co-exist with it. Continue breathing in and out.

### **Town Manger's Report**

o the Citizens of Bowdoinham:

Thank you to the Town of Bowdoinham for welcoming me to the community. Having managed my home town of Boothbay Harbor for 13 years I embrace the challenges of change. The learning curve is steep in a new community. The support of the Board of Selectmen and the staff have helped me greatly with the transition.

The COVID19 health emergency has challenged us in ways we couldn't anticipate and changed the way we do business and live our lives. In spite of these challenges municipal services continue to be provided remotely electronically and through the mail. I thank the staff and Boards and Committees for adapting to these extraordinary changes and for continuing to dedicate their efforts to the community. We could not do this without you.

Here are some of the things I've addressed this year:

- revised the job descriptions and the personnel manual;
- restructured the Public Works Department;
- hired a Full Time Finance Administrator/Deputy Treasurer;
- made significant upgrades in network security, server and computers;
- improved maintenance and capital improvements to municipal facilities;

- exploring improving efficiency of online transactions;
- streamlined internal accounting processing and banking procedures;
- pursuing debt consolidation at lower interest rates;
- improved comprehensiveness of future Capital Improvement Project planning;
- improved budgeting process and participation;
- improved communication and participation with the staff; and

• renewed focus on training, education and cross-training of the staff.

### **Town Meeting**

The Bowdoinham Town Meeting has been rescheduled to coincide with the State Primary Election that is scheduled for Tuesday July 14, 2020. The Bowdoinham Town Meeting will be conducted through the secret ballot process due to the COVID19 State of Emergency. Absentee ballots will be available upon request for registered voters 30 days prior to the Town Meeting. The secret ballot process is the same format that the town uses for electing municipal officers. With social distancing and shelter in place directives public meetings of groups over 50 are not permitted.

### Municipal Budget Highlights

The proposed 2020/2021 municipal budget is up \$205,888 vs last year 2019/2020. The budget for last year 2019/2020 was an increase over the previous year 2018/2019 by \$268,937. Non-property tax revenues are expected to increase by \$92,614, or 6.7%, Municipal Revenue Sharing is expected to be significantly impacted by COVID19 lost state revenues and it was therefore budgeted conservatively this year. The Select Board and Finance Advisory Committee are recommending using \$140,000 from the unassigned fund balance which accounts for the majority of the \$92,614 increase.

The proposed budget reflects the hiring of a full-time employee last year and includes adding a part-time employee for the Public Works Department in 2020/2021. The total cost for the Public Works position is \$25,000. Offsetting some of that increase, the Administrative Assistant position has been decreased from 30 hours per week to 20 hours per week.

### Wages & Benefits

This budget reflects wage adjustments to be competitive with surrounding communities and similar municipalities. In the tight labor market, it has become difficult to attract and retain employees. The budget provides a cost of living adjustment (COLA) of 2.2% for employees, based on the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) in the Northeast Region which shows a 2.2% inflationary index for 2018. I have also budgeted a 2.0% allowance for wage increases based on performance evaluations for all employees in those departments that do not have wage adjustments. Primarily due to staffing changes, the overall increase in wages has been held to

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to \$30,026 vs. last year. Health insurance premiums have increased again this year but due to enrollment changes by staff members the overall

cost of benefits is down \$5,000 or 2.9%

### Undesignated Fund Balance

vs. last year.

The Undesignated Fund Balance as of June 30, 2019 is \$1,273,614, an increase from \$1,168,923 in FY18. The Select Board and Finance Advisory Committee are recommending that \$140,000 of undesignated fund balance be used to reduce property tax commitment.

### Personnel & Administration

The Personnel & Administration budgets show a combined increase of \$11,465, or 7.0%, which includes the wage adjustments for some office staff, and increasing risk management insurance costs. (liability, workers comp, vehicle and fire department insurance)

### Debt Services

The Debt Services Budget has decreased due to refinancing existing debt with lower interest rates.

### Fire & Rescue Departments

The Fire and Rescue Department budget shows a decrease of \$902, or .09%.

### Public Works

The Public Works budget shows an overall increase of \$31,799 or 6.7%. This includes the additional part-time employee, additional operating expenses for the new facility and wage adjustments.

### Solid Waste & Recycling

The Solid Waste and Recycling budget shows a proposed increase of \$44,709, or 23.4% due to large increases of disposal fees.

### Non-Municipal Organization Requests

Two budget requests from non-municipal organizations were received and accepted as meeting the Town's "Non-Municipal Organization Funding Request Policy". One request is for \$1,500 from Spectrum Generations and the other is from Waldo Community Action Partners for \$539. The Select Board recommends \$1,500 for Spectrum generations and \$539 for Waldo Community Action Partners. The Select Board also recommends \$2,182 for the Historical Society.

### Capital Reserves

The Capital Reserve budget has increased by \$122,839. This is mainly due to repurposing the cost savings from refinancing debt services of \$111,339. The remaining increase includes heating and electrical upgrades to the Town Hall building. It includes continuing funding for design and renovation work for the Town Office to include fire code upgrades and efficiency and security renovations. These renovations would occur in conjunction with an expansion project by the Bowdoinham Public Library. It also includes continuing to fund the Solid Waste & Recycling capital reserve and the building capital reserve at 8 River Road owned by the Town.

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### Town Board & Committee Meetings

For the time being, the Town of Bowdoinham will be conducting public meetings via video conferencing. This is in accordance with emergency legislation (PL 2019, c. 617) enacted by the Maine legislature on March 17, 2020, which temporarily authorizes remote participation at municipal board and committee meetings by board members and the public.
