#### Trevor Brown

*Jupiter Farm*

Trevor Brown's love of baking has taken him down some interesting paths in the last several years. He has experimented with different recipes and has entered pies into Celebrate Bowdoinham's pie baking contest. He was even talking with Luke MacFadyen, Bowdoinham's baker extraordinaire, about apprenticing with him before Luke's untimely death this year. Camilla, Luke's sister, has stepped in to help out by sharing Luke's recipes and letting Trevor use Luke's licensed kitchen to prepare baked goods for sale.

All of these steps led to a full summer of selling baked goods at the Bowdo-

inham Farmer's Market on Saturdays at Maily Park. Trevor has been able to offer many of Luke's most

popular items and has been learning what buyers like best. All of his preparation for the market was done on Thursday or Friday at Luke's kitchen so the products could be fresh and appealing. "I have sold out a couple of times at the market and am getting a sense of how much product is enough," Trevor says.

One of the other things Trevor has been learning is the whole process of baking while maintaining strict food safety practices. He likes to continually improve his products and to gain new cooking knowledge.

When it comes to the "business" side of baking, Trevor says, "Baking is the easy part—the important part—of doing this business." He confesses that the hard part is the selling part. "I've always felt kind of shy," he says, "so putting myself out there is a bit of a challenge."



He has been keeping a weekly log of his sales and plans to look at the big picture of the business at the end of the season. "I feel like it has been successful," he says.

Doing the business has taught Trevor some great lessons and he has some advice for other young entrepreneurs based on his experience: "You have to be confident that you can pull it off.

Take feedback from your customers, and be willing to take advice." He is very grateful for the help he's received from his mom, Susan Brown, and from Luke's sister, Camilla. The Coordinator of the Farmer's Market, David Asmussen, also deserves a lot of credit for encouraging the young entrepreneurs at the Market.

While the Market is the only place Trevor offers his products right now, he is interested in exploring other possible venues through the winter. His schedule will be pretty busy during his Senior year in High School, but he is open to opportunities should they come up. ### Camilla Ciembroniewicz *Marigold Ink*

Camilla Ciembroniewicz's deep love for drawing has led her into a self-employment venture that makes use of her talents in a practical way. She translates her nature images onto clothing items, such as T-shirts, giving them a unique, individual look. She has found that her images work well on other items as well—note cards, napkins, dish cloths, and patches. "I really love to make art and to see my progress," she says.

The business has come a long way since Camilla started at the Holiday Sale at the Bowdoinham School in 2018. That experience encouraged her to try out the Bowdoinham Farmer's Market through 2019. From there, she would like to experiment with more sales outlets and has been talking with a family friend about selling some items at their store in Freeport. In the meantime, friends and family have been placing custom orders with her, and she enjoys working with them to choose images they would like. Through all of this, she has been expanding her line of products and has experimented with a lot of new techniques.

"I have been keeping a chart of my sales," Camilla says, "and I like what I have been making. So far, I have used the money for the business." She keeps her eye out for sales at Goodwill where she often finds quality, used items for her



images. "This keeps my costs down," Camilla says. "I'd like to look at my pricing to be sure I'm charging enough," she adds.

There have been a number of people who have helped Camilla along the way. Manon Whittlesey of Morphee Creative, taught Camilla the technique of carving linoleum blocks with her drawings, inking them, and then transferring the images onto different surfaces. Camilla's dad built her display table which works very well at the Bowdoinham Farmer's Market. Finally, David Asmussen, the Manager of the Market, has encouraged her and handled all the marketing for the Market through the 2019 season.

Because she has worked hard to keep her costs down and her prices in the right place, Camilla would recommend that any young entrepreneur make sure they pick a good price. "They should not be afraid to ask for help," she advises. Most importantly, she feels young entrepreneurs should really zero in on what they would like to pursue.

### Olena Cutko *Spice Girl*

Even though Olena Cutko is only in her Junior year of High School, she is already an experienced entrepreneur. She has been offering her special spice mix at



markets ever since she was in fourth grade. Her first

foray into selling was at the Holiday Fair at the Bowdoinham School, but in recent years, she has also had a day of selling at Bowdoinham's Farmer's Market at the Mailyly Park.

Olena went through an interesting process in creating her product. She developed a combination of spices that she thought went especially well with vegetables, and then had her family try it out. They found they could use it on a variety of food items including scrambled eggs. Once Olena had her mix of spices, she shared it with others and found she had a market. Now she buys all her spices in bulk, hand grinds the seeds, and does the mix herself. She sells it in 2 different sizes of glass jars. She is always looking for ways to do it better and faster.

Selling her spice mix enables Olena to make money for special trips or projects. She sets a financial goal for what she needs to earn and then finds ways to sell her mix so she can reach her goal. She is happy with what she has been earning so far. The next step she would like to take is to look at her costs and figure out if she is pricing her product at the right amount.

Olena enjoys all the aspects of doing her business. Her advice to other young entrepreneurs is to give their idea a try. "It's a good way to meet people, and it

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helps you to be less shy,” she says.

### Celeste Gray

*Poppy Co.: Breads and Threads*

Celeste Gray has been experimenting with an interesting array of products at the Bowdoinham Farmer’s Market through the 2019 season. She has been following what she loves—both baking and clothing—to offer unique items.

Her booth often includes brownies, lemon squares, and cookies along with hand embroidered clothing, jeans, and vintage treasures she has altered and improved. Doing this venture means that she gets to explore new recipes and to find interesting sources for clothing. Seeing what the customers buy helps her to expand her offerings.

“I really like making money at something I enjoy,” Celeste says. She looks at the net profit each week and has been happy with what she has made so far. The extra money helps her buy clothing and other extras. “It’s also nice to be at the market with a friend, Camilla Ciembroniewicz. We keep each other company and can catch up with each other in between customers.”

Besides Camilla, Celeste has appreciated getting help from her mom, Kate Gray. While Celeste does all the actual baking, Kate helps with some advice and getting the ingredients. Another big help has been David Asmussen, the Manager of the Farmer’s Market, who has encouraged all the young entrepreneurs. He handles most of the marketing for the Market. Having a central place with a number of vendors and a good flow of customers means that Celeste can concentrate on her booth and the selling.

Looking towards the future, Celeste would like to explore possibilities for her venture. The Farmer’s Market, Holiday Sale at the Bowdoinham School, and

individual orders are all things she might do in this year, her 8<sup>th</sup> grade year. She would also like to learn more about how the finances work and would like to find recipes and baked goods that people like to buy. All of this can build a good foundation for her next steps.

Her recommendation for other young entrepreneurs is to try out the Farmer’s Market as a place to sell what you make. “Don’t expect too much but have fun with it,” she says. “It really isn’t hard, you can make

money, and it is a lot of fun.

### Maggie Shourds

*Maggie’s Goats at Mulberry Creek*

Maggie’s family has a long history of farming. Their farm in Indiana, however, was getting surrounded by industrial farming operations and it was getting harder to do the sustainable agriculture approach they preferred. After making a couple of trips to Maine (where some family live), they were able to purchase the farm at 589 White Road, moved in August 2018, and have been transferring equipment and livestock ever since. They currently have cows, goats, chickens, and sheep and are working hard to bring the farm buildings and fencing into operating order.

Through this past year, Maggie has experimented with turning the milk they were getting from the cows and goats into cheese. Her father, Glenn, built a cheese room in the farmhouse basement, and it took two months for them to get a license. Starting with a basic chevre cheese, Maggie has now expanded into herbed chevre and a vache (cow) cheese. “I currently have 15 goats and would like to have twice as many,” Maggie says. They are milking 8 of the goats and two of the cows at the present time. The plan is

to eventually set up a larger cheese room in the barn.

Maggie has found a number of outlets for selling her cheese including the Bowdoinham Farmer’s Market, Celebrate Bowdoinham, and a farm stand at their home. In the future, she’d like to look into the Gardiner’s Farmer’s Market or any winter market that might develop in Bowdoinham.

There are a couple of things that the business has helped Maggie develop. “It really helps with time management,” she says. “I have to be up at 5:30 to care for the animals and then in the evening I spend time making the cheese.” Doing the selling has been fun and has helped her with her marketing skills.

“I love spending time with the animals,” Maggie says. “I can tell the goats by their voices and love their personalities.” She has seen how personable and friendly they can be so has developed a



unique idea for expanding her business to do “goat therapy.” This

year, her Junior year in High School, she hopes to develop a plan for this idea as a part of her Senior Capstone project. While Maine doesn’t currently have a way to license goats for official therapy visits, Maggie would like to see if that could be developed. “I’d like to take them to nursing homes, hospitals, and schools.” She has found an animal therapy place that is willing to work with her, and she hopes she can add this service.

Remarks delivered at Celebrate Bowdoinham.

This year's Citizen of the Year has had, and continues to have, a storied career in Bowdoinham. That's a pun you'll appreciate in a minute.

This person is a prominent, creative member of our community, always working to promote knowledge, art, and understanding. She is herself an artist, an organizer, a curator, a convener, a connector, and a booster of all things Bowdoinham.

In describing this year's Citizen of the Year, one person wrote that she "does her job as town librarian with grace and enthusiasm." They went on to tell of how, when she learned that another town resident no longer drives, she made a point to learn that person's taste in books, and often picks out selections to be delivered to them at home.

Others mentioned the wide and rich events and programs this year's recipient has hosted through the library -- from a hairstyling training for fathers, to a review of antisemitism through the ages. One of my personal favorites was her acquisition of a tree pruner for the library, which residents seeking to rid their branches of browntail moth nests can sign out along with the latest novel. And of course she holds the wildly popular Annual Luke MacFayden Edible Book competition, where people create dishes with names like "Mr. Pepper Popper's Penguins" and "Grape Expectations."

As one person wrote of the recipient,

"She has enlarged the meaning of what it is to be a librarian." A common theme focuses on how her dedication to Bowdoinham spills well beyond the walls of the library. Some comments include:

- "She shares her enthusiasm for making objects out of reclaimed items, teaching others to make flowers and wreaths out of the pages of discarded books and selling them at the Artist Guild's annual winter sale."

- "Her work building a traveling 'Welcoming Library' of books for children that address issues of the immigrant experience and belonging has served as a model for communities around the state."

- "Whether it's the waterfront park or an idea for a new business, she always has a creative angle that opens up new possibilities."

- "Her talent for just about any form of artistic or craft endeavor will get a new outlet when she finishes refurbishing an Airstream trailer into a traveling studio for art classes."

In appreciation of her many years of dedication to the people of our community, the Select Board of Bowdoinham recognizes Kate Cutko as the 2019 Bowdoinham Citizen of the Year!

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
## Food Pantry News

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## Got stress?

**S**tress: it's everywhere. From our personal lives to the world around us, we are relentlessly confronted with the challenge to maintain (or regain) a sense of balance, equanimity, inner peace, and even joy in the face of difficult situations and circumstances. Stress management is certainly a lot easier said than done! And talking about it won't really resolve your stress anyway; that's a little bit like discussing why your tooth hurts. And then, let all the air out of it (by breathing out slowly



through your mouth). Be sure to squeeze all of the air out of the balloon. And then do it again once or twice.

### For this one moment...

Have this be the only thing you are doing. Don't hurry. And don't worry. There's no right or wrong way to do it. If you do it at all, you're doing great! "Be a Balloon" three times in a row and see what you notice about how it felt. How did you feel before and after?


## Bowdoinham's Best Pie Contest

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## Cemetery Advisory Committee News

I am sorry we missed the September - October Bowdoinham News; this update covers July through October 2019. We did “cleanup” in the Village Burying Ground in July and August gaining new regular volunteers Joanne Snowdeal and Sam Tome and welcomed new committee members Cassie Hensley, Amanda Patterson and Sam Tome. Instead of scheduling additional clean-ups in the “Village” during September and October, we focused on supporting the keepers and volunteers of some of the smaller plots by delivering supply kits and providing, items such as paint and fence boards.

In July and August we welcomed keepers Darcy Thirlwall and Ray Hall of the Preble Plot on Pork Point Road and provided supplies to keepers of the Pratt Cemetery on the Wildes Road. In September, Sylvia Edmondson identified the unmarked grave of a Pratt ancestor also related to Sam Tome. Also in September, we received a request from Scout Carson Taylor to work on

a cemetery for his Eagle Badge. Pending permission, we hope to designate the Verrill-Small plot at the end of the Ridge Road for his work.

We now have a full committee of seven members as well as a dozen or so regular volunteers and keepers tending about 40 of our small plots. Keepers include couples and families. This is a slow, but effective and ongoing means of restoring and preserving the grave sites of those who have gone before us. Unfortunately, we no longer have a capable person to restore fallen and broken stones since Albert Stehle resigned from the committee in April. Volunteers, keepers and the broader community have been asking, “what are you going to do without Albert?” He is greatly missed not only as the “fixer” of stones, but for his vast knowledge of the burial grounds in Bowdoinham and for his leadership in developing community interest in their preservation.

To help fill this void, we are looking into options for training individuals and businesses interested in stone restoration. George Christopher has suggested that stone restoration might be a specialty for a lawn service company to develop. Those interested are encouraged to contact Elaine (666-8255) or Pam (666-5531).

The committee received a citizen’s concern that the bright orange maple sap buckets in the Village Burying Ground appeared “disrespectful”; the concern was referred to the Select Board.



The Bowdoinham Public Library invites residents to take part in a community read of "White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism" by Robin DiAngelo.

The book is a New York Times best seller, written for white people who wish to gain a more nuanced understanding of racism, their own racial identities, and how to be better allies (and neighbors, co-workers, etc.) to People of Color.



In White Fragility, DiAngelo points out that many white Americans do not want to acknowledge or speak about their whiteness and its advantages, or to examine their own racist behaviors and beliefs. As a result, many deny racism and its negative impacts. Following last winter's presentation on the History of anti-Semitism by Howard Solomon, there was interest in continuing discussions of oppression and racial justice issues.

In January, Library Director, Kate Cutko, together with Bowdoinham native John Engler and outside facilitators, will lead a discussion (or several discussions) about the book and create an opportunity where white people can learn collectively the language, ideologies, and conversations around race and becoming accountable to the racism in their everyday lives.

## Recycling Barn Reminders

By Bryan Benson, Solid Waste Director

Here is a reminder of the materials accepted at the Recycling Barn.

**Items picked up curbside or delivered to the Recycling Barn (must be clean, dry and separated into the following categories):**

- Corrugated Cardboard – includes brown kraft (grocery) bags. Please break down boxes.
- Newsprint – includes anything that comes with the newspaper
- Magazines – including catalogues and other similar glossy print
- Mixed paper – any and all clean paper not included in previous categories including cereal and soap boxes, pasteboard containers, tissues, toweling, window envelopes, paper plates, cups, etc.

### **NO PLASTIC PLEASE!**

- Comingled Containers – any clean household containers of glass or metal. Any plastic marked #1 - #7. #2 oil bottles must be completely drained. CAPS MUST BE REMOVED FROM ALL CONTAINERS.
- Styrofoam and packing peanuts are not picked up curbside but may be brought to the recycling barn (please bag peanuts separately).

**Items that can be delivered to Barn only (no curbside pickup):**

- Food waste – all kitchen and sink waste, including bones, and meat scraps. Please deliver food waste in your pail or bucket which can be dumped and taken home. Please do not bring food waste in plastic bags (NO PLASTIC).
- Oversize Bulky Waste (OBW) – mattresses, chairs, couches, TV sets, etc. A disposal fee based on item's size and weight is required.
- Waste Oil and Antifreeze – deliver in 1 or 2 gallon capped containers. No oil filters or quart containers please.
- Waste Wood – used to heat Recycling

Barn. Please deliver in lengths 48" or less, under 15" width. *No chipboard or pressure treated lumber.*

- Leaves and Grass Clippings – may be left on pile next to Post Road. No brush please.
- Tires – car tires 16" or smaller \$3.00 each; Pro rata fees for larger tires.
- Scrap Metal and White Goods – (appliances, etc.) \$14.00 processing fee for appliances utilizing Freon coolant. 20# propane tanks (valve must be removed). No charge for scrap metal.
- Household Hazardous Waste -Architectural paints and stains at no charge. lawn and garden chemicals, insecticides, pesticides, marine and automotive paints and other household chemicals have a fee.
- Asphalt shingles – small amounts of asphalt shingles (less than a 5 gallon bucket load) can be received at the Barn. For larger amounts, please call 666-3228 for further information.

## Curbside Pick-up Reminders

- Trash and recyclable material are picked up at curbside on Thursdays.
- Trash must be in securely tied bags no larger than 30 gallon capacity, weighing no more than 25 pounds and must have a trash tag attached.
- Recyclable materials, **properly separated and bagged**, are picked up at no extra charge.
- Corrugated cardboard must be securely tied in bundles no larger than 2' x 3'.
- Recyclable materials must be in clear plastic bags for curbside pickup. Bags must be securely tied and set out by 6am Thursday mornings.
- Tags and recycling bags are available at the Town Office, the Bowdoinham Hardware Store and the Recycling Barn.

## Thanksgiving - Change of Schedule

The Recycling Barn will not be open on Thanksgiving, but we will be open on Saturday. Curbside pick-up will happen on Saturday after Thanksgiving (instead of Thursday) as well.

## Sand Bucket Brigade

**A**ge-Friendly Bowdoinham in conjunction with Bowdoinham Fire and Rescue Department will be distributing 5-gallon buckets of winter sand this winter. This program is designed for those residents that cannot pick up their own winter sand from the Town's courtesy sand pile located at the entrance to the old Public Works property at the waterfront.

If you would like a bucket of sand dropped at your residence, please contact Missy Halsey at the Town Office, 666-5531, or assistant-clerk@bowdoinham.com. Missy will then forward your information to the Fire & Rescue Department.



After you have received your first bucket, please contact the Fire & Rescue Department for a refill at 666-3505 and leave a message.

Special thanks to Bowdoinham Hardware for providing the 5-gallon buckets to the Town for this program.

## Winter Tips

**A**lthough the month of October provided some nice weather, the inevitable will happen and we will soon have freezing temperatures and snow. Here are a few winter tips for you to consider:


### Who plows what roads?

The Town is responsible for plowing, sanding and treating most streets and roads in Bowdoinham. The exceptions are Main Street (from Fisher Road to Bowdoin) and Post Road. These two roads are NOT plowed, sanded or treated by the Town – in fact, Main Street from Fisher Road to the Bowdoin town line and the entire length of Post Road are plowed, sanded and treated by the Maine Department of Transportation (MDOT) or their contractor.

### Snow in your Driveway

The Town's crew is not done clearing the roads of snow, slush and ice until well after storms have stopped. In order to get to clear pavement, the plow trucks scrape the roads after the storm. This results in snow and slush being pushed back into

driveways after they have been cleared. One way to help eliminate this issue for your driveway is to clear an area on the right side of your driveway (the right side if you are entering your driveway). If this is done, the snow and slush being scraped off the road will be deposited in this area



and not into your driveway entrance. See the illustration below:

### Courtesy sand pile

The Town maintains a courtesy sand pile for residents at the entrance to the old Public Works property at the waterfront. Please keep to the two five-gallon bucket limit per visit. It is very important that we stay within this limit to assure there is sand for everyone. No pickup truck loads or commercial haulers.

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## BCDI News

**T**hank you to those that made it to our Bowdoinham Landowner Meeting earlier this fall. After a welcome and introduction to the new community center, Merrymeeting Hall attendees heard from Carrie Kinne, Executive Director of Kennebec Estuary Land Trust about the multitude of reasons for keeping Bowdoinham's working land in agriculture. Abby Sadauckas, Land For Good's Maine field agent presented on the practical steps that landowners can take as they consider making their land available for agriculture. This included examples of the types of farming enterprises, aspects of land use agreements, and considerations for good communication for landowners and farmers. The evening concluded with a panel discussion moderated by BCDI board member and owner of Left Field Farm, Sean Hagan. The panelists, Tony Cox, and Eric Ferguson of Harvest Tide Organics talked from their perspectives as landowner and farmer respectively. Both emphasized the need for good communication, shared values, and understanding to make a relationship work.

BCDI continues to follow-up on the "Action Items" generated from our 2017 Community Conversations. One of the final items attendees requested was the hope to see the installation of "more benches/seating in the Village in public places". In an effort to shepherd this important idea along, BCDI has purchased two benches, custom-made by Bowdoinham contractor Mark Favreau, to be placed on the Village walking loop. The



first bench has found a home under the maple tree near the sidewalk at Merrymeeting Hall. The second bench was placed on the outskirts of the Village sidewalk, by the Fire Station on Center Street, with the idea that placing a bench here will increase the

walkability of the Village loop. BCDI feels this aligns with the Town's mission to be an "Age-Friendly Bowdoinham", as well as to support all residents and visitors to push yourselves a bit further on your next walk knowing there is a nice place to sit and rest on the outskirts of the Village!

A lot has happened over the summer and fall. The public works department is happily in their new location, the Waterfront Master Site Plan was accepted at Town Meeting, MaineDEP completed testing and found no contaminants that need to be cleaned up, and our consultants held the first workshop on the non-motorized boat put-in and shoreline stabilization; all moving Bowdoinham closer to the first stages of making the improvements at the waterfront.

The focus of the Comprehensive Planning Committee has turned to two other issues, supporting the creation of Merry-meeting Trail that would use the existing railroad corridor owned by the Maine Department of Transportation to create a 25-mile regional rail-with-trail from Topsham through Bowdoinham and Rich-

And moving back to the Comprehensive Plan; the CPC members determined at the September regular meeting that they will begin the review and updating of the Land Use section of the Comprehensive Plan. The Land Use Goal in the 2014 plan was to encourage orderly growth and development in appropriate areas, while protecting the towns' rural character, and making efficient use of public services.

We will again be doing a Gardens Aglow bus trip to Boothbay Botanical Gardens for friends and families of Bowdoinham residents, more information to come.



## Internet Project Update

**L**incolnville Communications, Inc. (LCI) is in the process of securing all pole permits (over 700 poles!) and completing their final fiber build out design. They are planning on completing the fiber build out by the end of this year. LCI Customer Service Unit will begin contacting applicants in December to go over all details, discuss any additional cost (i.e., if fiber drop from pole to house is beyond the first 250 ft included in the \$100 install fee) – and start setting up installs for January, February and March. We've not heard which roads they are planning on starting with, but understand that they will start where the sign-ups are. Of course, all fiber construction and individual home installs are subject to winter weather constraints. They do install all year round – but severe winter weather conditions may require some rescheduling.

## Waterfront Project Update

**W**e had our first Design Workshop for the Non-Motorized Boat Launch and Shoreline Stabilization with our consultants, Richardson & Associates and Baker Design Consultants on September 17<sup>th</sup>. At that meeting, our consultants presented design options for both elements. For the non-motorized boat launch (aka paddle put-in), the public was in agreement, that they wanted a launch similar to the boat launch at Mailly Waterfront Park: a hard bottom access ramp, floats with the rail and ADA float access. For the Shoreline Stabilization, the public was in agreement of which treatment options should be placed along the different areas of the shoreline and where overlooks and pathways should be located.

Our next Design Workshop is scheduled for Wednesday, November 20<sup>th</sup> at 7pm at the Coombs Municipal Building, 13 School St. At this meeting, attendees will have the opportunity to view and provide feedback on these designs, so please be sure to attend! After this meeting the consultants will finalize the design to begin the permitting process.
