

When Kate Cutko saw a photograph of an airstream trailer that had been converted into, "The Creative Capsule," she thought, "That is magical!" She imagined the potential of an airstream's interior space as an inspiring place to offer artistic workshops. Kate had conducted many

classes on such things as shadow boxing and collages in the past, but she had never

had her own place in which to do it. An airstream trailer presented a great option.

Because the seed had been planted, Kate was alert when she saw an airstream parked at Bill and Kate Gray's house. Fortunately, they were willing to sell it. For the next three years, Kate went on a renovation journey. Many people helped her with things like electrical wiring, dealing with extensive rust, and refurbishing the interior. She has replaced just about everything and adapted the interior into an art classroom. "Everyone has been so kind and generous in helping me," Kate says. "I am not shy to ask for help," and she is able to list an army of people who have stepped up.

During the renovation phase, Kate took a class on business development with New Ventures, Maine. She learned how to set up her financial record-keeping, develop a marketing plan, and write a complete business plan. This gave her a boost in her business knowledge. "The group that took the class really jelled," she says. They have stayed in touch and supported each



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other as each one has launched their businesses.

About a year ago, the airstream had come far enough for Kate to begin to offer classes. Even with the Covid-19 outbreak, she has been able to design her classes to meet strict guidelines. Because the airstream can be towed to different locations, Kate has driven to the site of a birthday party and set up a fun activity for the children. She decides on the focus of the workshops in consultation with her customers and can do anything from canvas floor cloths to paper lanterns to jewelry items using recycled materials. Under regular conditions, she can fit 5-6 people inside the trailer. By using the outdoors, she can do groups of 8. Her classes have appealed to groups of children having a birthday party to women friends who want to do something fun on a "girls' night out."

Kate's plans for the future are accelerating now that she has done several events. She hopes to have her website up in a month or so and will begin to market her service more broadly. Through the winter, while hosting occasional gatherings, she will develop her inventory, decide on workshop topics, and work on a plan for regular events. "I would love to have a recurring gig at a Farmer's Market next summer," Kate says. "I'm also hoping to take the Atomic Classroom to campsites so groups can have something fun to do on a rainy day when they are camping out."

Other than the huge renovation challenges Kate has faced, she cites the difficulty of balancing this activity with her responsibilities at the Bowdoinham Public Library, her job as an adoption consultant, and family demands. "The Atomic Classroom has been lower on my list of priorities—that's why it has taken 3 years," she says. "It is, however, very rewarding when I look at the before and after. To know it has a new life as something useful is lots of fun."

Joanie Mitchell Wool Mittens

It was a beloved sweater of Joanie

Mitchell's husband, Henry, that inspired her to start on her path of creating unique mittens. Henry's sister had knitted the sweater for him, and he wore it until holes began to appear. When Henry's sister died suddenly, Joanie wanted to find

a way to preserve that labor of love. Fortunately, one of Joanie's friends had a pattern for mittens. By felting the sweater wool, Joanie was able to cut out the mitten shapes, add a lining, and sew it up into a newly useful item. "Henry treasures and wears those mittens with pride to this day," Joanie says.

The idea of taking a nearly used-up item and repurposing it into something useful really appealed to Joanie. Friends started giving her their old sweaters, and she scouted out places like Goodwill for sweaters with interesting patterns. The lively designs can be configured into a unique look and the felt or cashmere linings make a snuggly interior. Joanie will often add an interesting button on the cuff.

It is a little ironic that working with wool and sewing mittens has become an important activity for Joanie. She grew up in Solon, Maine with a brother and two sisters—one of whom won a state sewing championship. Her mother was a 4-H leader and really encouraged the girls to learn hand crafts. Joanie, however, loved being outdoors. All she wanted to do was to spend her time being out in nature with the family's animals. Even today, after a career in the health care field, Joanie has created a haven near Merrymeeting Bay that has 2 horses, riding trails and an agility course for her two Labrador dogs.

When the leaves start to blaze color and fall, however, Joanie's thoughts turn to building her mitten inventory for her primary market of the year—the Bowdoinham Guild of Artisans show on the first weekend of December. Other than selling to some family and friends, it is her chief sales outlet. She tried the market out

for the first time in 2011 and sold 26 out of 28 pairs of mittens. Each year since then, the inventory Joanie has built throughout the year flies off her tables and onto grateful hands for the coming winter.

This year, the Covid-19 crisis has changed the Guild's December sale to an outdoor market in October. Joanie will be there. "People really need to try the mittens on," Joanie says, "so I may need to consider having hand sanitizer or another method to allow them to do that safely."

Joanie finds it very satisfying to work with natural fiber and to create new life for an old sweater. "I like taking something that is nearly used up and making a useful item," Joanie says. "It is really rewarding when I see how much people like my mittens,"

Recycling Update

ffective November 1st, the Town's recycling operations will be closed at the Recycling Barn. We are working to re-open our recycling operations at a temporary location by December 1st. We will provide information about our temporary location as soon as we have the necessary details. Our curbside recycling pick-up will also be suspended as of November 1st until further notice.

The Select Board approved moving our recycling operations to our Public Works Facility at 121 Pond Road at their October 19th Meeting. While we are working on obtaining the necessary permits for this change, we are also working with the Town of Richmond on a partnership for our recycling operations. As currently at the Recycling Barn, the Town's recycling operations will consist of recycling dumpsters and a metal dumpster. We are also evaluating what other services we may be able to offer at either location.

How long will we be at a temporary location? That will depend on the time needed for either of the following options:

- Return to Barn The repairs outlined in Calderwood Engineering's Recommendation Letter, dated September 11, 2020 must be completed for the Town of safely operate on the 1st floor of the Barn. Additional repairs and/or upgrades may be needed for the Town to operate on the 2nd and 3rd floors.
- Construct a New Facility. Either option may require Town Meeting approval in June.

Citizen of the Year

ach year, the Select Board recognizes a member of our community as Bowdoinham's "Citizen of the Year." This award is traditionally given to a person who has made a meaningful impact on the lives of Bowdoinham citizens, in recognition of their "dedication and spirit beyond what is considered regular duty."

Past recipients of the Bowdoinham Citizen of the Year include: Kate Cutko, Betsy Steen, Doug Tourtelotte, Nancy Curtis, Lynn Spiro, Leslie Anderson, and Susie Uhle.

This year is different in so many ways. The onset of the current public health crisis has disrupted and reshaped so much of life in Bowdoinham, as it has communities around the world. We have all had to find new ways to do just about everything, from school and work to the simple act of getting food for ourselves and our families.

At the beginning of this pandemic, as Maine restaurants were closing their doors, a group of Bowdoinham farmers met at Mailly Waterfront Park. Standing six feet apart, they discussed what this new reality would mean for their businesses -- many of which rely on restaurant sales, and some of which hire seasonal employees.

Together, they discussed approaches for operating safely, managing farm crews, and selling directly to consumers. They stayed connected, sharing ideas and

collaborating to set up farm stands that have been open daily or weekly since the spring, and publicized guidelines for how customers could use the farm stands safely. Several farmers also created a thoughtful plan for the Bowdoinham Farmers Market, which ran smoothly all summer and was a refreshing piece of normalcy for the community.

One resident observed that, even before the pandemic, Bowdoinham's farmers "worked together as a community rather than competing with each other. On many occasions, I've asked one farmer for a particular item, and when they either don't produce it, or more remarkably they do but simply don't have any at the moment, they always point me to another farm." Many farms have also been loyal contributors to the Bowdoinham Food Pantry, which has proved especially vital this year.

Farms have long been at the heart of Bowdoinham. This year, we were especially lucky to have that be the case. Having safe, regular access to local, healthy food has been critical for Bowdoinham residents and our neighbors in surrounding towns. In the face of a global pandemic, the town's farmers stepped up, collaborated, and found creative solutions to support their community and feed their neighbors.

The Bowdoinham Select Board is proud to recognize Bowdoinham's Farmers as the 2020 Citizens of the Year.

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
Food Pantry News

t has been a whirlwind of a summer and fall. Since our last update, we've made some significant changes at the pantry. For starters, we transitioned to a drive-up system where we hand out prepacked bags. Each client that comes is given one big bag of shelf-stable items, and another (typically overflowing) of fresh eggs, milk, butter, cheese, meat, fruits, and veggies (usually beautiful organic produce grown right here in Bowdoinham). We are so grateful to the members of this community for their ongoing generosity toward their neighbors.

Increased demand, increased donations, and the need to pre-pack bags created an interesting set of tetris-related challenges in our small space. When the opportunity came to move the pantry into a new, larger space in the same building, we jumped at it. We are still at 9 Main Street, but our entrance is now at the end of the parking lot closest to the stream. This transition has been so important to the Food Pantry, and there are several wonderful people who made it possible:

- Fred Haer: for his endless generosity in donating/leasing us space to run the pantry, and for financing the beautiful renovation of our new space.
- Mark Favreau: for donating many

- Linda Jariz: for donating her stellar project management skills, which resulted in getting us into the new space very quickly.
- Dean Beckwith: for graciously agreeing to move his pottery studio (Clayworks) so that the Food Pantry could have the space we needed to operate in this new and challenging time.

While many clients have reported that they're enjoying our new drive through pre-packed bag system, some have expressed a desire to return to shopping. While we're going to continue offering pre-packed bags, after a successful test run in early October we're very pleased to announce that we're now offering clients an opportunity to return to shopping by appointment. Winter Tips

Ithough the month of October provided some nice weather, the inevitable will happen and we will soon have freezing temperatures and snow.

Here are a few winter tips for you to consider:

Who plows what roads?


The Town is responsible for plowing, sanding and treating most streets and roads in Bowdoinham. The exceptions are Main Street (from Fisher Road to Bowdoin) and Post Road. These two roads are NOT plowed, sanded or treated by the Town – in fact, Main Street

from Fisher Road to the Bowdoin town line and the entire length of Post Road are plowed, sanded and treated by the Maine Department of Transportation (MDOT) or their contractor.

Snow in your Driveway

The Town's crew is not done clearing the roads of snow, slush and ice until well after storms have stopped. In order to get to clear pavement, the plow trucks scrape the roads after the storm. This results in snow and slush being pushed back into

driveways after they have been cleared. One way to help eliminate this issue for your driveway is to clear an area on the right side of your driveway (the right side if you are entering your driveway). If this is done, the snow and slush being scraped off the road will be deposited in this area



and not into your driveway entrance. See the illustration below:


Courtesy sand pile

The Town maintains a courtesy sand pile for residents at the entrance to the old Public Works property at the waterfront. Please keep to the two five-gallon bucket limit per visit. It is very important that we stay within this limit to assure there is sand for everyone. No pickup truck loads or commercial haulers.

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Comprehensive Planning Committee News

he committee met in September after taking August off. We briefly returned to the Waterfront Plan as the next phase of the Waterfront Plan needs oversight. Bowdoinham has released an RFP for the next phase of the Waterfront plan to be submitted by mid-October and a joint committee of members from the Comprehensive Planning Committee (CPC) and the Community Development Advisory Committee (CDAC) will provide oversight.

The topic of vehicles increasingly going very fast on Main Street was again brought to the attention of this group. The options for slowing traffic, however, are primarily in the hands of the Maine Department of Transportation (MDOT). However, by our raising the question of ways to slow traffic, the issue will be sent along to MDOT.

The CPC schedule continues to be: -Regular CPC meetings the second Tuesday of each month, 6:30-8:00. The Zoom link is on the town website.

- -Review issues related to cluster housing on-going fall 2020
- -Ongoing updates of comprehensive plan on conservation of agricultural land/soils as well as view shed preservation.
- -Spring watch for dates and opportunities to provide input/update the Comprehensive Plan Vision Statement and hopefully to gather together to learn more about the topics the committee has been discussing.

The vision statement is part of the Comprehensive Plan that was adopted in 2014. A copy can be found under the Document Library tab at the top. It is toward the bottom of the list of documents. The Vision Statement (shown here) is on page 4 of the Comprehensive Plan.

Cemetery Committee News

ur last B.C.A.C. report was in the March-April News and was submitted in early February. As we all know, much has changed since then. We did not have another meeting from March until September 21st this year (and that was on-line). We also did not post cemetery clean-up days at the Village Burying Ground, across from the school due to social distancing issues. No one signed up for the M.O.C.A. 4-day Cemetery Training Workshop in Lubec this summer. There will be two sites for this event next summer, I will keep you posted regarding sites.

We, that is, the keepers and volunteers have been busy in the smaller cemeteries and family plots. Susan Tuttle has become the keeper for the Browne Cemetery, and has done much with other volunteers to clean it up. She is concerned that the stone for Bainbridge Porter Browne has fallen, and we still have no one to do the work of stone raising and repairing.

Gordon Curtis has been clearing brush and trees at the Curtis-Jennnings-Aderton Cemetery on the Dingley Road. He says that there is a need for professional (licensed arborist) removal of additional trees. This is also needed in the Village Burying Ground. Tony Lewis, Linda Temple, and I recently visited the Thomas and Siegars Plots on the North end of the Carding Machine Road. We found the Siegars Plot cared for by John Murphy and family to be in great condition. Unfortunately, the Thomas plot is a wreck with the 4 visible stones down and one broken in two. With probing, there seemed to be several more underground. This plot will require very careful professional restoration to avoid further destruction of stones. A death date on one of the visible stones was 1870, which qualifies this plot for protection and access under the state statute for Historic Family Burial Grounds. There are four more small plots within about a mile or less of these two, they are: the Elliot, Hunter, Brooks, and McFadden Plots, and possibly a couple more to be searched for on the East side of the Abagadasset Stream. Several people in that neighborhood, Dave Asmussen, Matt Kegerreis, Will Zell, and John Murphy have expressed interest in volunteering and looking after these plots. Great!

I know more is going on, all over town, but this report has become long, so I will try to catch-up with the rest of them next time. The meetings continue to be online on the 1st Monday of each month at 4:30pm, please visit the calendar on the website for meeting details. re you feeling stressed? Fatigued, frustrated, fearful? You're not

As we enter the ninth month of Covid-related disruption in almost every aspect of daily life, there is a cumulative build-up of hard-to-bear feelings for everyone I know. And on top of it all, here come the holidays.

"We practice social distancing so that when we return to the table, no one is missing."

The summer months made it easier to visit with our friends and families. We're so grateful for the beautiful surround of our Maine community, aren't we? But now, the added isolation of winter is looming. As long as we cannot gather safely, how shall we handle the holidays? Feelings can often cloud good decision-making.

Feelings are not good or bad, right or wrong.

Feelings are hard-wired into our brains

to give us information. If you boil down the countless words we use to describe them, they're really pretty basic: happy, sad, mad, scared. Once you simplify what you're feeling, it becomes a little easier to know what you need. But to do that, you have to take a moment to slow down, settle down, and just breathe.

Don't just do something, stand there.

We are trained from an early age to do rather than to be. And while there is nothing wrong with doing, the truth is that we will be more effective with whatever course of action we choose if we act from a place of clarity. All that's called for is some inner calm. And to get there, all that's required is the breath.

Just breathe.

Try this: stop whatever you're doing right now and imagine a balloon, uninflated, lying flat upon your table. Pretend, for just a moment, that you are the balloon, Now, fill it up with air (by breathing in slowly through your nose). When it's full, hold your breath momentarily. And then, let all the air out of it (by breathing out slowly through your mouth). Squeeze all

of the air out of the balloon. And then do it again once or twice.

"Feelings come and go like clouds in a windy sky. Conscious breathing is my anchor." Thich Naht Hanh.

As you do this, allow thoughts and feelings to pass through your mind. Resist the temptation to follow them and instead keep returning your focus to your breath, to the rhythm and the sensation of it, just as it is, with no need and no effort to change it. After a moment or two, see if you notice a shift in your state of mind.

Necessity is the Mother of Invention




