We offer a starter kit for purchase to go along with the classes. Each kit is \$10 and includes a felting pad, two needles, wool for the project and a step-by-step, illustrated instruction booklet. 

parked car to the outside box to deposit
outgoing mail when there is some ice.

This is an example of small changes in our world that can greatly benefit older people (in fact, everyone). Thank you, staff of the USPS Bowdoinham!

A subcommittee of Age-Friendly Bowdoinham is working on a pamphlet to enable people to assess and improve the safety of their homes. Assessments by other communities and organizations have been researched and incorporated. The pamphlet is laid out by areas of the house and surroundings and includes very specific equipment and ideas from entrance lighting to stoves and bathtubs. The pamphlet will be available to townspeople online and in paper form at many places in the village. For each town newsletter we hope to include one tip that is part of our home assessment.

TIP: Be sure that your stove cannot be turned on by mistake if you lean against the knobs!

Comprehensive Planning Committee Update

start this article by thanking the Comprehensive Planning Committee Members: David Asmussen, Peggy Christian, Tom Deforeest, Richard Morin, Patrick Thompson, Kevin Twine, Bill Stanton, Reeve Wood; this summer's intern, Rodger Heidgerken working on mapping; and of course Bowdoinham's Nicole Briand, Director of Planning and Development for their ongoing engagement in the committee's work. Switching to online Zoom meetings has been a relatively easy transition for some members, but not for everyone. And we are all missing the interactions that only happen in person.

In the past few months the committee has been looking at the overlaps between the historic nature of the village and beyond with Betsy Steen of our Historic Society, had a summary review of land use ordinances by Reeve Wood who serves on both the Planning and Comprehensive Planning Committees, a presentation of BCDI's Farm Land Inventory process, and mapping/photo presentations by Bill Stanton and Kevin Twine that identify views of significance to preserve. All of these presentations provided some form of mapping and location specific informa-


tion across Bowdoinham.

The committee voted to not meet during the month of August, so will be returning in September to integrate what we have learned from the presentations and mapping projects to update and add actionable details to recommendations of the 2014 Comprehensive Plan for 1) issues of cluster housing, 2) conservation of agricultural land/soils, and 3) view shed preservation primarily.

The Cathance Meadows has been bush hogged, the Gully Trail behind the school has shade, the Cathance River provides opportunities for both people-propelled and motorized boating, and there are many other locations around Bowdoinham that provide wonderful opportunities to be outside, social distanced, and safe. We look forward to the non-motorized boat launch at the Waterfront, which is in the advanced planning stages.

Looking to the future, watch in the spring for opportunities to provide input to update the Comprehensive Plan Vision Statement and hopefully to gather together to learn more about the topics the committee has been discussing.

Remember, the Comprehensive Planning Committee meetings are open to the public and continue to be held on the second Tuesday of each month, 6:30-8:00. The Zoom link is on the website.

Solid Waste Committee Update

he town has formed a Solid Waste Committee with the following members: Susan Brown, Michael Smith, Pat McDonough, Tessa Kingsly, Susan Drucker-secretary, Lisa Wesel-vice-chair and Cathy Curtis-chair.

We have been tasked with: a. Overseeing protocols for keeping the Recycling Barn open during the pandemic. b. Containing expenses for the recycling program and problem-solving curbside pick-up contamination. c. Addressing the condition of the barn after the Select Board has reviewed inspections and reports and discussed their findings with David Berry. The Committee has been meeting every two weeks, since June 30th. A schedule of meetings can be found on the Town Calendar with agendas. A Public Google folder with agendas, approved minutes and documents we are reviewing is linked on the Bowdoinham Town website under Town Government-Boards and Committees-Solid Waste Committee.

The Committee has adopted the following mission statement: "the goal of the Solid Waste Committee is to provide a resource for residents to reduce household solid waste, reuse and repurpose unwanted

materials, and facilitate recycling as current markets allow. The Committee strives to seek revenue sources and cost savings for the town by staying current with market trends, and to encourage environmental stewardship through innovative and proactive practices."

The Committee has toured the recycling barn and is in the process of gathering financial information for the past five years. We are working collaboratively with Bryan Benson, Director of Solid Waste & Recycling to understand the current state of affairs in order to make recommendations to the town. We welcome public participation at meetings. We are attempting to meet in person, outside, weather permitting or via ZOOM. Thank you to David Berry, Betsy Steen and Jeremey Cluchey for your public participation. A special thank you to Bryan Benson who serves as our liaison with the town, helps set-up meetings and gathers information for the committee in addition to his other duties as Director of Solid Waste & Recycling.

One thing residents can do now to lower costs for the town: there is not a market for glass right now so that can be put in your trash instead of mixed recyclables which will save the Town in weight costs.

Internet Project Update

f the 105 signed applications received from Bowdoinham residents, 73 will have been installed and fully activated as of this week. The remaining 32 will be installed between now and 9/30 (approx.4- 5 new installs each week).

locations are ones that require additional
customer action before we can hook
them up (i.e. installation of underground
conduit, special inside wiring needed, tree
trimming work need for aerial fiber drops,

charges for fiber beyond the first 250'of
drop fiber, etc.).

Beginning in September, we will resume marketing to the remaining addresses in that project area that have not yet applied for LCI fiber service (our goal is to achieve 75% take rate by end of year). In September we will also be marketing our new live streaming video product, O.P.E.N. View TV™, to all of the 217 ConnectME project addresses in Bowdoinham.

CDI Loan Program Available For Bowdoinham Businesses Are you a small business owner? Do you need funding for growth? BCDI's Loan Program can help! We want to remind Bowdoinham residents that BCDI's Loan Program, Neighbors Investing In Neighbors, offers low-cost loans to Bowdoinham businesses, including those that may be unable to obtain loans from commercial lending institutions for reasons such as insufficient credit history. The aim of Neighbors Investing in Neighbors is to make funding available through local investment. Here's how it works: The Neighbors Investing in Neighbors loan program is coordinated by BCDI, but funded directly and exclusively by individual, BCDI member "investors," who wish to invest in the growth and development of our local, Bowdoinham businesses. When the loans are paid back, our member investors receive their original funding contribution amount back with interest. Our model truly is "neighbors investing in neighbors".

So, who can apply? While it's true that we have made several loans to farmers in town, these loans are available to ALL types of small businesses in Bowdoin-

ham. Since 2012, we have made well over \$100,000 of loan funding available to Bowdoinham businesses for a wide range of needs. Some of these needs include a loan to purchase a saw for a wood products business; a loan to purchase materials and equipment needed to launch two online businesses; a loan for partial financing for purchasing a business; and a loan to put a new roof on a business in town. Our loans have also helped finance the purchase of several greenhouses, lots and lots of farm fencing, a number of tractors, and even twenty breeding ewes! The Neighbors Investing in Neighbors Loan Program offers low interest, shortterm small business loans in amounts ranging from \$500 to \$20,000. Generally, repayment is expected within 1-3 years. Additionally, BCDI works to connect local business owners with resources that can help establish, sustain, and grow their businesses. For example, loan recipients have been connected with business counselors, accountants, legal resources, website developers, and other community or regional resources. Ready to apply for a loan? 2nd Baptist Church News





Historical Society News

ifty Years, and Counting! Two dozen people meeting in the Town Hall on a warm evening in April, 1970, formed what was soon to become our Bowdoinham Historical Society. Dr. Robert Cummins moderated that initial session, which produced a By-Laws and an officer nominating committee.

The purpose of the Historical Society is to collect and to preserve records and physical objects relating to the history of Bowdoinham. By-Laws as adopted on May 18, 1970, said the Society may establish and operate a local history museum, a library, and one or more historic sites in pursuit of its purpose... the Society may otherwise preserve, advance, and disseminate knowledge of the aforesaid locale [Bowdoinham] in any manner prescribed." The first slate of officers elected were Frank Connors, president; Linwood Rideout, vice president; Leslie Anderson, secretary; and Fred Temple, treasurer. Three trustees named were Priscilla Berry,



Zina Maxwell, and Howard Peckworth." Other names mentioned in this first Bowdoinham Advertiser by Frank Connors, included Thelma Pratt, Eva Palmer, Jane Connors, and Patti Blake. By the 3rd Annual Meeting held at the Merrymeeting Grange on May 10, 1972, BHS had 226 members and had raised \$1,165 to fund our goals.

And so it has gone. BHS has had lean years and years of great progress and

activity, we have had quiet times, and even times of hibernation, but all the time we have been saving and collecting and researching Bowdoinham's past as a gift to our future citizens.

Library News

he library reopened on June 2, with limited hours – Tuesdays 10-2 and Fridays 2-6. Things have been running smoothly with limited capacity and mask-wearing. There is an alternative for those not comfortable coming inside the building- patrons can use our curbside service, where they put a "Reserve hold" on an item through our website's online catalog and the book is left inside the "Little Germ Free Library" box outside the library entrance. This service runs daily, with a 24-hour lag time to fill the hold.

The library was awarded a COVID-Response grant from BCDI (Bowdoinham Community Development Initiative) to extend library offerings during the summer. Funds were used to purchase four "StoryWalks" which are picture book pages, waterproofed and mounted on stakes such that a child or adult can read the story while taking a short walk. The first Story walk was shared along the Cathance River Trail and now there is one allow the Gully Trail at the Red Rose Preserve. Two more are planned. In addition to the Storywalks, the BCDI grant funded the building of a cart to fill with used books and carry down to the

Farmer's Market on Saturday mornings throughout the summer. Please come see the "Story Dory" and help yourself to a free book. Special thanks to Steven Bunn for donating the small-scale dory that now rides – or should we say it floats- atop the book cart. Thanks also to Brian Staid who built the cart, and to Joan and Bruce Knight who have been storing it each week in their garage.

In response to the killing of George Floyd and the increased attention on systemic racial inequities in our country, the library has increased its resources in that subject area. Please call or come into the library to learn and see the growing collection. The list of titles can be found on the library's website: bowdoinhamlibrary.org.

If there are parents, educators or students who need help accessing educational resources or need a space to study with strong internet access, please contact Kate at the library to see what can be arranged. Need help accessing Zoom? Need to print something? Need to gather a small study group or tutoring session? Call and ask and we would love to help. The library has access to two meeting room, a public printer and several computers, not to mention string WiFi. The WiFi is available inside and outside the building 24-hours a day.
