## Bowdoinham Guild of Artisans


For 9 years, the Bowdoinham Guild of Artisans has showcased their high quality crafts at their annual Show & Sale at Town Hall. There are usually 10-11 vendors offering items such as pottery, fine art photog-



raphy, and other gift items. This year, their annual Show & Sale will be Friday, December 6<sup>th</sup>, 6-8pm and Saturday, December 7<sup>th</sup>, 10am-3pm at the Bowdoinham Town Hall.

## Martha Lentz

Martha Lentz is one of the organizers of the Bowdoinham Guild of Artisans Annual Show & Sale and is responsible for its promotion. Many in town know Martha from her years as a teacher in the Bowdoinham schools. Now that she is retired, she enjoys developing her skills as a photographer, something she's loved to do since she was a child. In her youth, she had an opportunity to work in a studio in Harvard Square and learned the whole process of taking and developing photos. After her children were grown, she took classes at the Maine College of Art, and then rode the new wave of digital technology. "Photography is a nice form of expression for me," she says. Not only do the sales benefit the women crafters with needed income and improvements to their living conditions, but Jessica is able to earn enough to supplement the household finances. As a busy mom and home schooler, she appreciates the flexibility of this enterprise and the way in which it makes a positive difference for women in Africa.

#### Kate Cutko

Our very busy town librarian, Kate Cutko, has added "business entrepreneur" to her long list of activities. It all started three years ago when she wanted to purchase e-readers for the library. Not wanting to put a burden on the town or library budget, Kate decided to raise money through the sale of items made by herself and local crafters.

Fortunately, there were lots of raw materials at hand. The library had recently gone to an electronic system and was no longer using the old check out cards. There was also a wealth of old books along with lots of interesting paper items. Thanks to the help of a huge crew of crafting volunteers, an intriguing inventory was created: spiral notebooks with writing paper, bookmarks, gift bows, bead-like bracelets and necklaces, tote bags, Christmas tree ornaments, and magnets. Kate was able to transform an old, ratty copy of Blueberries for Sal into artistic, framed montages. The Bowdoinham Guild of Artisans generously offered one of their tables at the holiday show that year and the grand experiment turned into a huge success.

After making enough at the first show to purchase the e-readers, Kate has continued to work with town volunteers to create appealing items. Their second year was even better than the first. "I feel good that our booth draws people to the Guild Show," comments Kate. The sales have even become a significant source of income for the library with all of the proceeds going directly to its budget. "I love that we have return customers," Kate says. People are even placing special orders for things they have seen at the show. "My

goal is that we continue to have more community involvement and build a group of volunteers who enjoy doing these kinds of crafts. It's a great way for people to contribute," according to Kate.

#### Laurel Waterman-Lopez

In the midst of raising a family and working 30 hours a week, Laurel has been steadily growing her business venture, Laurel's Line—all natural personal care products. It all started when her first child was born 12 years ago. A neighbor showed her the basics of how to make soap and Laurel went from there to grow her line of chemical-free body products including beeswax lotions, lip balm, soap, and deodorant.

Laurel's background includes two degrees in fine arts with a focus on photography. She loves to cook and garden, so mixing up ingredients for effective products and creating attractive labeling and displays is a natural outgrowth of her talents. Her job at Casco Bay Frames and Gallery, owned by Tony and Heather Cox of Bowdoinham, gives her a chance to be around fine art and photography and is

> one base of financial support for the family. Her business brings in welcome supplemental income with the possibility of growing to another level in the future.

Besides offering her products at the Bowdoinham Farmer's Market and four to five other craft shows each year, Laurel conducts classes at Long Branch School in town and Gardiner Adult Education. Teaching about the benefits and process of making natural products is a real

joy for Laurel. She has recently added more classes to her schedule.

"The truth is, I love the products I make and will never go back to commercial products," Laurel says. "I can't wait to use them as soon as they are made." There are number of people in Bowdoinham who have encouraged and inspired Laurel. "It is a nice energy to be around." Their requests have often spurred her to try new product lines.

Laurel also contributes significantly to the community through her service on the MSAD 75 School Board and the Bowdoinham Community Development Initiative Board. All her commitments mean that the business has remained at a plateau for a few years. "I have a decision to make," she says. "Do I want to go to the next level and grow the business as the children start to get older?" She can see the possibility of more time opening up as her two boys become more independent.

# **Delilah Pottery**

Sara has always been an artist and has explored many avenues of artistic expression including fashion design and fine art. For the last 10 years, however, her skills and talents have centered on pottery and her company, Delilah Pottery. This endeavor got a boost when she moved to Bowdoinham and converted her garage into a pottery studio. Her brother encouraged her to move from Portland to this more rural setting.

"I was working for Kennebec Flower Farm and wanted a yard and garden of my own," Sara relates. "I found that after moving to Bowdoinham, my imagery took on naturalistic themes. It used to be about people when I was living in the city, but now I have lots of birds, berries, insects, and seasonal themes."

Sara creates many items such as bowls, cups, and buttons, as well as larger items that make wonderful wedding presents. She has been experimenting with red clay, and has been honing her skills with the pottery wheel. Over the years, she has built her sales outlets and can now be found at her Facebook business page (Delilah Pottery), the Brunswick Winter Market at Ft. Andross, the Center for Maine Craft at the Gardiner highway exit, Casco Bay Frames, the Common Ground Fair, and a few small galleries. The demand for her items has grown to the point where she has back orders.

Sara tried to do her business on a full-time basis starting in 2007. Unfortunately, the recession hit and it turned out to be poor timing. She now does her business on a part-time basis while working full-time at Spindleworks in Brunswick. Last year, the income from Delilah Pottery provided about 20% of the household income, and will continue to be an important contribution to Sara's financial support.

The fact that there are other potters in the Bowdoinham community is a real plus as far as Sara is concerned. Matt Ahlers,

who is also a member of the Bowdoinham Guild of Artisans, has been helping Sara with her pottery wheel throwing skills. "Another potter, Stephanie Austin, has

just moved to town, and I hope we can combine knowledge and talents," Sara adds. Matt's sister, Georgia, is also a collaborator who helps Sara with ideas and production.

# As We Grow

Carolyn Sweet has already had a busy professional career that involved a lot of travel and pressing responsibilities. When she started having children, however, everything changed. The demands of small children, including a special needs child, and a career just didn't mix. Fortunately, she and her husband were able to work it out so that she could stay at home to raise the children which she has been doing for the last 11 years.

As it turned out, she and a neighbormom found themselves constantly brainstorming about items that "they" (someone else) should make. They were inspired to experiment themselves with product ideas and started to focus on screen printing baby milestone sayings on onesies and t-shirts. While Carolyn's neighbor has gone back to work and is no longer involved, Carolyn has steadily grown the business.

As We Grow now has a website, an etsy sales site, a Facebook page, sells at 5 craft fairs, and takes custom orders. Carolyn

has developed a full line of onesies and t-shirts for children and will do adult sizes for custom orders and special events. She especially enjoys creating the sayings and graphics-everything from milestones such as "I found my toes" to "I took my first step" and "I give kisses" to future goals like "Future Hockey Player." She has also branched into colorful images like butterflies and dragon flies and other messages such as "Fishin' Buddy," "Locally

Grown," and "There's no Place Like Om." The children sizes start with newborn items to 18 months old and come in white, pink, and blue. Carolyn's sister is a talented knitter and her unique, whimsical hats have found a place at As We Grow's website and fair booths.

Carolyn's goal is to have a steady income from the business. She has already sold 600 items and is poised to expand her markets and increase her sales. As the children get a little older, there will more opportunities for Carolyn to concentrate on business goals.

Being in Bowdoinham is a real plus. Carolyn says, "I love it because people come up to me and talk about the business." She loves to see people who return to her booth, ready to buy the latest designs. She adds, "This business has honestly helped me keep my sanity for the last 11 years while I've been at home with the children. I had to be passionate about whatever I did. After 4 kids, how can you not be passionate about onesies?"

# **News from Arts Center**

here's a lot happening this year at Merrymeeting Arts Center.

### Fall Show

On October 4<sup>th</sup> we opened our major fall show "Lincoln and the Gettysburg Address" which celebrates the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Gettysburg Address. The show centers on eight portraits of Lincoln (one life size) by the late Bowdoinham artist Carlo Pittore. These black and white oil portraits capture some of the best known Lincoln photographs in Pittore's extremely strong style. Six other

area artists have contributed treatments of Lincoln and the Gettysburg Address: Stephen Petroff, Susan Drucker, Howard Solomon, Leonard

Meiselman, Emily Dobson, Mathew Pierce O'Donnell. The show will run until December 15<sup>th</sup>. Our hours are Saturdays 10am to 1pm or by appointment. We will be closed from December 15<sup>th</sup> to January 31<sup>st</sup>.

This show is the second to bring Pittore's works back to Bowdoinham, the town he loved. Works in the show range in price from \$25 to a Pittore portrait for \$15,000.

## **Gettsburg Address Recitation Contest**

The Arts Center with assistance from the Pejepscot Historical Society and the Bowdoinham Histroical Society is sponsoring a Gettsburg Address Recitation Contest, on to anyone 18 and under. The contest will take place on Sunday, November 3<sup>rd</sup>, 1-4pm at the Jellerson School on the Brown's Point Road. Contestants will perform the Address from memory in front of three judges. The winner of the Recitation Contest will received a \$100 check, a book from the Pejepscot Historical Society, and will be expected to perform at the November 11<sup>th</sup> Veterans Day Concert. Second prize is \$50.

## Veterans Day Concert

On Monday, November 11<sup>th</sup> the Arts Center will host its second Veterans Day Concert at the Town Hall. Admission will be \$10 for adults, \$5 for childran under 12, and children under 5 are free. Skits, songs, dances and recitations will have the same exciting cast as last year. A full fun program to please any age!

#### 2013 Achievements

2013 was an exciting year with four major shows: Bryce's Winter Views, Vernal Pools, Every Maine Light House, and Lincoln and the Gettysburg Address. We ran a Summer Drop-In Art Program as well as Lego Robotics, photography, pottery

classes and the Place-Based Pre-School. We hosted the  $2^{nd}$  Annual Ice & Smelt Festival, a Wonderland Tea Party, a talk by light house artist Ernest Deraps,

an auction of Light House Lawn Ornaments, a Hub Cap Art workshop and had art activities for Celebrate Bowdoinham!

# Plans for 2014

Our year starts again with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Ice & Smelt Festival on Saturday, February 1<sup>st</sup>. If you have ideas for this year's festival let us know.

In March, we will open our Vernal Pools Show. This year we focus on a key resident of the vernal pools: fairy shrimp. Artists 18 and under are encouraged to create works of art in any medium for this show. We're also planning workshops for fairy shrimp houses as well!



games. A great time was had by all. Thank you Leslie Anderson for spearheading this fun event.



# News from Committee on Aging

w that Fall is here, the activities sponsored and led by the members of the Committee on Aging are in full swing. Since the goal of the Committee is to provide activities you'd like, your feedback and suggestions are always welcome.

#### The Senior Center

Last January the Committee on Aging (formed in November of 2012) opened a Senior Center. Originally envisioned as a drop-in socializing opportunity, the Center is now evolving to more regularly structured activities. To do this, we need residents to volunteer their time and talents. So if you have a skill or a talent that you would like to share, don't be shy, we need you!

The Senior Center is open on Thursdays from 10am to 3pm (except the 4th Thursday of the month when the Center opens immediately following the Village Seniors luncheon). The Center is in the basement of the Second Baptist Church, which the Church generously donates for this purpose.

### Walking Group

The Monday morning group began in mid-April. It meets at 9:00am at the Fire Station for walks of various lengths and paces. There have been about 10 to 12 residents participating overall with weekly numbers varying. If you would like to join in, just park in back of the Fire Station on Monday morning (weather permitting) and enjoy!!

#### **Exercise Plus**

This program also started in mid-April. It meets on Tuesday and Thursday morning at the Fire Station. The program begins at 9:00am and ends by 10:00am. All levels of fitness can be accommodated in this program, so if you haven't yet participated, come and check it out! Each class has anywhere from 9 to 13 participants. In fact, to date, there have been approximately 25 different people who've participated.

#### Resources

One of the tasks for the Committee on Aging is to obtain resources to assist older residents. To that end, there are several items available from the Bowdoinham Public Library. These resources include a home self-assessment tool to help reduce hazards in the home, exercise dvds designed specifically for seniors, and books such as "The Driving Dilemma" (issues for elders and family members in evaluating driving ability) and "Alone and Invisible No More" (community action and assistive technology assistance for helping elders remain at home and healthy).

Each month the Committee publishes an Activity and Resource listing. These are available through e-mail, at the Town Office and at the Town Landing. Activities are also posted on the Town's on-line calendar (www.bowdoinham.com/calendar).

#### Volunteer Transportation Program

A fledgling program is under consideration. When elders need to get to appointments and errands but are unable to drive, we hope to have a volunteer network that can help meet some of these needs. Many who are unable to drive find family or friends to help but sometimes there is a need that friends, relatives, or neighbors can't meet. The Committee continues to consider options to assist.

# **Proposed TIF District**

he Town is working to create a new TIF District, along part of CMP's corridor along Browns Point Road. As part of CMP's Maine Relibility Project they will separating the two 345 transmission lines onto separate towers, therefore constructing a second set of towers (or poles). CMP is planning on starting construction this winter and construction is expected to take a year.

To assist the Town in creating this TIF District the Town has hired Midcoast Council of Governments. Scott Benson, their Senior Program Director has been working with TIF Districts for over 20 years. The proposed TIF District will be brought before voters at Town Meeting 2014.

So what is a TIF District? A Tax Increment Financing (TIF) is a public economic development financing program, funded by the property taxes generated by the incremental new value from a development project, in this case CMP's project. The TIF only applies to the new value added as a result of the project, also known as the Increased Assessed Value. The tax revenues from the TIF district can be used for: Town economic development programs, Town events, marketing, creating a revolving loan fund, and skills development and training.

Why create a TIF District? Creating a TIF District provides funding that is dedicated to economic development. The increated assessed value within the TIF District is "sheltered" from the Town's overall valuation, which is how the Town's share of county taxes, state revenue sharing and school budget are determined. Creating a TIF District allows the Town to capture up to 100% of the tax revenue on the increased assessed value. Whereas, if a TIF District wasn't created the Town would loss about 40% of that tax revenue to higher county and school bills and lower state revenue sharing.

So what could we use these proposed TIF funds for? So far the following has been discussed:

• Village Development – public infrastructure improvements (e.g. sidewalks)

• Operating budget of the Town's Economic and Community Development Department

• Events & Marketing

• Merrymeeting Trail - design, development and maintenance

• Village wastewater system feasibility study, system design

• Revolving loan program

# **Merrymeeting Trail News**

here's lots underway in the development of the Merrymeeting Trail. Over the summer, Kennebec Estuary

Land Trust hosted the first bike ride of the interim (on-road) route of the Merrymeeting Trail. The process for developing signage for this interim route is ongoing. The goal is to develop



the signage over the winter so that the signage can be placed along the interim route in the spring.

Kennebec Estuary Land Trust is working on several outreach projects with the money they received from the Sewall Foundation. These projests include the development of kioks and a brochure, as well as the purchase of Merrymeeting Trail sport water bottles.

Richmond was approved for funding from Maine Department of Transportation's Transportation Enhancement Grant Program for the design and construction of the two Ricmond village sections of the trail. This project is expected to receive its funding in 2015/2016, so we'll have the first segment of Merrymeeting Trail constructed in 2017.

The development of the governmental structure for the planning, contruction and maintenance of the trail is also underway. The goal is to have this decision making organization in place late spring/ early summer 2014.

# **The Five Bond Questions**

wanted to take this opportunity to tell you about the five bond proposals on the ballot this November 5th. These bonds were placed on the ballot by the Legislature and Governor Paul LePage. They relate to transportation, to Maine's three public institutions of higher education, and to our state National Guard armories.

The largest of these, the transportation bond, would invest \$100 million in our roads, bridges, rails, harbors and ports. Despite the importance of our state's highways to Maine businesses and economic growth, 33 percent of Maine's major roads are in poor or mediocre conditions, costing Mainers \$296 per driver each year in extra vehicle repairs and operating costs, for a total of \$301 million annually. Another 33 percent of Maine's bridges are considered structurally deficient or functionally obsolete. A safe and strong transportation network is essential to Maine's economy.

Equally important to our economy are our public institutions of higher education, to develop our future leaders and workforce. In Maine, these include the University, the Community Colleges, and the Maine Maritime Academy.

One higher ed bond would invest \$15.5 million to improve the University of Maine system, particularly in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math, or STEM disciplines. The high-demand, high-wage jobs these fields produce not only lead to new opportunities for our young people, but also help Maine as a whole to compete.

# **Polar Bear Dip**

Seth Berry will be taking the Dip again this year to raise money for the construction of the Bowdoinham Community Skatepark. Please make his shivers worthwhile and help us build skatepark for youth in the Bowdoinham area by supporting his dip through a pledge! A similar higher ed bond would invest the same amount, \$15.5 million, in Maine's Community College System to add more classroom space, better science labs and to make buildings more energy efficient. This funding will give the schools more space to teach and train skilled workers and help alleviate the backlog of people on the waiting list.

The third higher ed bond would put \$4.5 million into a new science lab at Maine Maritime Academy. This school routinely trains some of our best and brightest students and places them in top paying jobs.

Last but not least, another bond question asks for \$14 million to renovate Maine's armories, where the men and women of Maine's National Guard train. Many of these facilities are in need of basic upgrades. Critical improvements are needed to update the ventilation, heating and air conditioning systems, remove asbestos, repair electrical systems and lighting, repair leaky roofs, drafty windows and update fire alarms and sprinklers.

I voted in favor of sending these five bonds out to you because I believe they will grow our economy, create new construction jobs, keep our roads and bridges safe, help more Maine students find goodpaying jobs and make sure the National Guard can properly train, since we depend on them to help us during major natural disasters.

When considering these and other bond proposals in August, Maine's Legislature and Governor were urged to bond "more and sooner" by prominent economist Charles Colgan. Dr. Colgan called this moment a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to put Mainers back to work and to invest in our future. The state currently carries an extremely low debt service as compared to other states or to a typical household or business, and bond interest rates are at an historic low. In addition, there is high unemployment in the trades and contractors are working hard to get a bid accepted.

Whichever way you decide to vote on these issues, I do hope to see you at Town Hall on Election Day, November 5th! As always, voting absentee is also an option.
