
Waterfront Redevelopment Project Update

With the wet summer, paving jobs were being pushed back which created scheduling conflicts for the Town's project. As of the end of September the boat launch was near complete except for the installation of the bollards. Further, this late into the season the ADA kayak launch will be pushed back for installation next year. The hydrant system, electrical conduits, and structures, and aggregate based have been laid. We expect the completion of the bollard, paving, loam, seeding, and mulching of the site before the end of the year.

During September we learned that the Town has been awarded a \$50,000 no-match Community Action Grant for Phase II of the new waterfront redevelopment project. Phase II includes earthwork including grubbing, filling, and grading, road and parking improvements, utility installation, stormwater management, landscaping including removal of invasive species, shoreline stabilization, and planting new native trees, and installation of pedestrian pathways. In addition, the Town is still anticipating an announcement from the State on our \$500,000 Land and Water Conservation Grant application which the town voted on at the June 2022 Town Meeting where it was approved to use TIF revenues as matching funds. Hopefully the grant request will be successful, and the large infusion of funding will help move the project forward into implementation in 2024.

Community Resilience Partnership

With the help from the Comprehensive Plan Committee, the Town enrolled in the Community Resilience Partnership (CRP) in July of 2022. The CRP is the State's program for implementing the State's Climate Action Plan. Benefits of this program include access to grant writing assistance and to the program's biannual no-match Climate Action Grants (CAG).



In the Fall of 2022, the Town was awarded \$37,991 CAG to replace 68 lighting fixtures with LEDs in the Town Office and upgrade our streetlights to LEDs. This Fall all interior lights were replaced, saving the Town an estimated \$1,041 a year in electricity savings. Additionally, more than half of the streetlights have been replaced. We are waiting to get power brought to a few new streetlight locations before that portion of the project is complete. LED upgrades to the Mailly Waterfront Park and the Recreation Fields lighting will also be forthcoming with this project. Once completed, the streetlight upgrade is estimated to save \$8,041 annually in electricity costs. Additional savings will also be realized as the Town will be acquiring these lights outright and no longer paying CMP to lease these lights.

Further, this Fall the Town was awarded a CAG for \$50,000 to supplement Phase II of the new Waterfront Park as mentioned above. To stay enrolled in the program the community must undergo a reapplication process every two years where the community designates new resiliency priorities for grant funding opportunities. 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Comprehensive Planning Committee

Thanks to All Who Chatted With us at Celebrate Bowdoinham.

Members of the Comprehensive Planning Committee and Housing Action Subcommittee, Dave Asmussen, Tracy Krueger, and Joanne Joy, shared progress on the Comprehensive Plan Goals and Recommendations and asked for your ideas on housing and land use at Celebrate Bowdoinham on September 17, 2023. We provided interactive opportunities. For instance, we used an old breadboard and a pound of dried lima beans to demonstrate various ideas for housing placement that could allow for open spaces for farms, recreation, beautiful views, water and animal protection like deer wintering yards, and more.

In addition, large sheets of paper were taped to the tables for people to add their input on two topics; 1) Give Us Your Land Use Ideas and 2) What are Your Housing Ideas. Here were your responses:

Land Use Ideas

- A balance of housing with land as well as multi-family units.
- People of all incomes deserve a place to live.
- Additional rules for sub-developments are okay but NOT OKAY to have additional rules for where we can build on our own properties.
- Expand the village districts.

Housing Ideas

- Cottage Community along with tiny or small house neighborhoods.
 - o Affordable, 1 or 2 bedrooms for both older community members and other families, front porches, and small
- Focus density in the village with more flexible options.
- Outside village: More housing while protecting access to natural resources and farmland.
- Try to find a way for community people to own and live in housing units, rent to neighbors, and avoid corporate or BnBs taking over.

Additionally, three sandwich boards asked for input from community members to inform future discussions.

o One had generic pictures of types of housing (duplex, triplex, fourplex, and cottage clusters) so community members could indicate their preferences by 'voting' with dots.

- o The second had actual photographs of homes, land, and roads/streets and asked for community members' opinions about which they liked the looks of better. This type of choice is called Visual Preference. One example of choice could be a duplex, triplex, or fourplex, could exist in a rehabbed older single family home rather than a newly constructed unit in a style not consistent with other buildings in the village.
- o The third sandwich board was very popular. It asked people to note and vote for their favorite RURAL things that they do in Bowdoinham. Some of the answers: enjoying the views, photography, hunting, walking the dog, people watching, snowmobiling, pickle ball, painting, farming, and hiking. Many others were related to the water ways including fishing and paddle boarding.

All of this input provides background for the Wednesday, October 11, 2023, Facilitated Community Forum on Land Use from 6:00-8:00 PM at the Bowdoinham Community School.



Energy Upgrades

Earlier this

Summer the Town installed two singlezone heat pump units for the Planning & Development offices. An additional seven single-zone units will be installed this Fall throughout the Town Office and Library to provide supplemental heating and replace the use of air conditioners. The Town took advantage of an Efficiency Maine rebate to bring the costs down by 50% for a total out of pocket cost of \$24,900 for all nine units installed. If you are interested in checking them out, come on by. Further, the NexAmp solar farm in Madison, Maine the Town subscribes to is now online and the Town has begun receiving energy billing credits. We should be seeing a 15% savings from this energy supply which will further help lower energy costs.

he snowmobile trail system in Bowdoinham is a by-product of its users...

I've often heard the phrase "it takes a village to raise a child." It wasn't until I had a daughter that I understood what that meant. A child is influenced by far more than her parents. She is equally influenced and sculpted by many more: her teachers, her friends, our friends, the list goes on. I may not want to admit it, but she likely spends about as much time with those other influencers as she does us. If I might change that phrase a little bit, it'd be "a child is raised by a village," but that doesn't have the same ring to it. Our trail system is much the same way.

The Bowdoinham Snowbirds snowmobile club might organize and maintain the trails. But its culture is a product of the entire community. It certainly wouldn't be there without the generous landowners who allow us to be guests on their property. Many of them also contribute to the maintenance of the trails. The trail system is also a product of the users, and their impact on the trails. This September, at Celebrate we heard countless encouraging stories of how the vast majority of riders are courteous to both other trail users and property owners. Unfortunately, that same morning we had an instance of the opposite damaging ruts caused by ATVs. Fortunately, these instances are rare. The positive stories we heard are a testimony to the great culture of our trail system that stakeholders have created over time. We are all stewards of the land; we owe this to ourselves. We hope that all individuals using the trail system will continue to be courteous guests, so we may all continue to be. One of the best ways to do this is to police ourselves, to teach our children to ride with respect, to hold our friends accountable, to treat trail use as a privilege not a right, and to realize anyone's actions can affect many.

Just like anything else, the trail systems evolve, and us all with it. Houses are built, the trails get adjusted. Storms do damage, the trails get repaired. A couple bad apples make a mess, we repair the damage and attempt to improve relationships. While extremely fulfilling, being a steward takes work. Consider volunteering if you use the trails. Club meetings are held at the fire station on the 3rd Wednesday of every month at 7:00pm. We also meet at the Mailly Waterfront Park every Sunday at 8:00am for trail work starting in October and through the start of the riding season.

We would also like to clear up some confusion about our local trail system. The club does not own the trails, the landowners do, use of the trails is not ours to give. Landowners have given permission to the trails for winter snowmobile use only. Other activities, especially during non-winter months, should be discussed directly with the individual owners of each property.

Please help us keep one of the features that makes Bowdoinham special.



Help - Clogged Culverts

As we prepare for winter, please keep your culverts in mind! Clogged culverts can result in flooding or even a road collapse! Please do not shovel snow or deposit yard trimmings and other debris that would disrupt the flow of water or otherwise obstruct the way. When culverts are clogged water gets redirected, eroding the surrounding structures, like roads or driveways, eventually causing a collapse. Ensuring culverts are clear of snow and debris will prevent flooding and enable Public Works to direct resources to the clearing of roadways and other priority maintenance activities during weather related operations. Cemetery News

ood news: We, the committee with about 30 community volunteers cleaned over 100 stones in the Village Burying Ground in July, August and September! The bad news: During a windy storm in late August, a huge tree limb fell, breaking two large marble stones that we had just cleaned! So sad to see them, all white and shiny, but broken. But that's the way it goes with cemetery work, an ongoing uphill job to care for them. And if it weren't for the steady involvement of volunteers and keepers, their willingness and cheeriness, and meeting new people all the time who care about this work as much as I do, I for one, might give up.

However, we did accomplish a lot in the Village Burying Ground. Again, we thank Tobey Frizzle and the Public Works crew for bringing us supplies, their help, for the quick removal of that tree limb, and the neat appearance of the cemetery. Nicole Briand, the Town Manager is already planning additional tree and limb removal with Tide Water Tree. We had hoped to do an October Cleanup in the Brown Cemetery, but due to time and health constraints, Susan Tuttle, the Keeper has decided to defer that to Spring.

Pine Tree Engineering has finished the Stage 1 plan for the V.B.G. drainage problem on the West (Ridge Road) end, to hopefully be completed by Fall. Stage 2 involves stabilizing the South bank toward the Sampson Brook. Nicole is pursuing a possible grant to help with the cost.

Linda Temple, Tobey Frizzle and Nicole Briand met with Jason Desrosier and completed the agreement to use his driveway and continue it as a Right of Way to the Temple Randall Cemetery. In exchange Public Works will improve his drive and continue the ROW to the Cemetery.

The Booker Road Plot GR 67, which was listed as TBF (to be found) has been located. Jack Ruby took his neighbor Clint Cote to the site recently. It is situated on a "path" to the North off the Booker Road, "near the foundations of the old house and barn." Clint says it consists of a low rock border, and standing unmarked field stones. He said he has passed near it many times while hunting, without recognizing what it was. Jack, a mushroom forager was aware that it was a burial plot. These two men live just over the line in Bowdoin, but in their

youth (pre I995) were all over that area. It is just east of northbound 295, definitely in Bowdoinham and on property owned by the Mendalls. Clint will be taking them there.

Another find! Remember that lonesome Nathaniel Millay stone, leaning against a tree in the woods off the Millay Road? Well, after the September Stone Cleaning, Linda insisted that we locate the Capt. Jeremiah Millay stone, which is on the V.B.G. map. We did and found a beautiful monument with Nathaniel Millay's name on it. There is plenty of room to place it there and after some repairs to the stone bottom, and making a base for it, Tobey and crew will be doing that.

Again, hunters, fishers, and foragers, please continue to keep a lookout for little burial plots in the woods and fields, as we have a few more to find, as follows: GR 66 the Hatch Stones. Two loose stones with Hatch names on them, probably no longer together, last seen on the east side of the Carding Machine Road, just north of the Maxwell Family Plot. GR 64 Methodist Church Burying Ground. Probably in the area behind the first house on the east side of the Carding Machine Road, just north of the junction with route 24. GR 61 Libby Plot. Might be on the East bank of the Abby River in the Densmore Falls area. And some other " known of or heard of" plots, which were also documented in some notes by Henry Lamoreau in the early 70's, recently found by Frank Connors. Gr 31 Hackett Plot. "In the woods behind Linwood Hackett's saw mill." GR 82 Goddard's Point Plot. On Goddard creek, just above where it enters the Cathance River. Forrest Douglass told Henry that that area was owned by Liz Gordon. He had no idea where the name Goddard came from, but that is the name of the Creek on the 1976 map. The creek is not named on the 1858 map, and there are no Goddards or Gordons listed as homeowners on that map which does list them at that time. The location is about due south of Brent Zachau's place on Brown's point Road and due west of Joanne Fearday's home on the Wildes Road. GR 83. Stones near the water in the State Wildlife preserve, end of Wildes Road. "An early site, possibly Indian." The story from Keith Wildes was that the site "was being dug into by several young men, when one of them had his leg broken ending that investigation." Several people have noticed those stones. It would be nice to get the site marked.

Where/when do I vote?

All Bowdoinham residents vote at the Bowdoinham Community School, 23 Cemetery Road. The polls are open at 8:00 AM and close at 8:00 PM.

If you choose to vote absentee, you may pick up your ballots at Town Office, up to 30 days before any election. The last day to pick up absentee ballots is always close of business on the 5th day before the election (per State law).

Absentee Voting

Absentee ballots are available approximately 30 days before each election (Title 21-A Sec. 753). There are three ways to request ballots:

- Stop by the Town Clerk's Office during regular business hours to pick up your ballots;
- Call the Town Clerk (666-5531) to requestthatballotsbemailedtoyou; or
- Use the following link to electronically request that ballots be mailed to you (only if there is a State of Maine election)
- https://apps.web.maine.gov/cgibin/online/absenteeballot/index.pl

Per State Statute (Tile 21-A Sec. 753-B.2), the <u>lastday</u> to request absente eballots is 5. days before any election. Absente ballots must be received by 8 *PM on election day* in order to be counted (Title 21-A Sec. 755). Please plan accordingly!

She has given so much to the community over the years in so many ways. She has served Bowdoinham from:


• Being a volunteer in the schools,




The Giving Tree

Dog Licenses

Do I need to register my dog?

Maine State law requires that any dog six (6) months of age or older that spends more than 10 days within the State must be licensed even if the dog is licensed in another state. Dog owners must obtain the annual license from the Town Clerk's office in the town where the dog is kept by between October 15th and December 31st of each year.

What are the fees?

The fee to license a dog is \$11.00 if the dog is capable of producing young, or \$6.00 if the dog has been spayed or neutered.

PLEASE NOTE: Dogs licensed after January 31st of any year are charged the annual fee PLUS an additional \$25.00 late fee. The late fee is mandated by State Law and may not be waived for any reason.

When licensing your dog, current rabies information must be presented if not already on file in the Town Clerk's Office. Please provide new rabies information if your dog has been immunized since the last time you registered him/her. If your dog has been spayed or neutered, please provide the Clerk with a veterinarian's certificate of surgery.


Merrymeeting Dance Alinement

Stone that Tell Stories: Monument in the Woods

T's startling, that seven-foot tall, graying marble obelisk, alone in the woods on a bluff overlooking Merrymeeting Bay. Surrounded in part by a stone rubble wall and the remains of an ornate, castiron fence, this 24-square foot lot is one of Bowdoinham more remote cemeteries. There are the remains of several slate stones visible on the lot.

John Patten was one of Bowdoinham's earlier settlers, her first ship builder, and a civic leader. This surviving stone, with its remarkable epitaph, tells its own story. "Here lays the remains of John Patten," it says, "born in the County of Derry, Ireland, in 1717...came to America with his father Hector in 1727... landing in Boston and removing to Falmouth (now Portland),,, in 1742 he met and married Mary Means, a pious and exemplary lady..." They soon moved to what is now Bowdoinham's Cathance Neck (a part of Topsham in those days) and raised 14 children. He died in 1795 after a fall from a horse.



Patten was a petitioner to the Massachusetts Bay Colony to organize the Town of Topsham in 1764. He was an accomplished farmer, blacksmith, lumberman and part owner of the original Cathance mills. In 1768, he launched a 90-ton sloop, the Merrymeeting, which was the second vessel built above Bath on the Kennebec River. He was the patriarch of one of Bath's most famous ship-building families.

Find the grave. Leave Bowdoinham on Route 24 (Bay Road), pass Bay View Cemetery on your right. Atop the next hill, on your left, see a dirt road named Muddy River Lane. Drive slowly, almost to the end, you'll see the Bay and camps on the shore through the trees. The Patten Cemetery is nearly 100 yards to your left, through the woods, you will NOT see it from the road. Note the Cemetery is surrounded by private property. DO NOT leave your vehicle on the road, DO NOT search without permission. DO NOT visit during hunting season.

Who plows what roads?

The Town is responsible for plowing, sanding, and treating most streets and roads in Bowdoinham. The exceptions are Main Street (from Fisher Road to Bowdoin) and Post Road. These two roads are NOT plowed, sanded, or treated by the Town – in fact, Main Street from Fisher Road to the Bowdoin town line and the entire length of Post Road are plowed, sanded and treated by the Maine Department of Transportation (MDOT).

Snow in your Driveway

The Town's crew is not done clearing the roads of snow, slush, and ice until well after storms have stopped. To get to clear pavement, the plow trucks scrape the roads after the storm. This results in snow and slush being pushed back into driveways after they have been cleared. One way to help eliminate this issue for your driveway



Courtesy sand pile

The Town maintains a courtesy sand pile for residents at the Mailly Waterfront Park, next to the bathroom. Please keep to the two five-gallon bucket limit per visit. It is very important that we stay within this limit to assure there is sand for everyone. No pickup truck loads or commercial haulers.

**The Town would greatly appreciate donations for the Heat Assistance Fund so that we can continue to provide this vital resource to our residents in need. **

The Town has two options for residents who need emergency assistance with their heat bills.

- General Assistance (GA) is a program administered by the Town in coordination with Maine DHHS. Applicants must qualify financially and show that they are in need of assistance.
- Heat Assistance Fund the Town of Bowdoinham has a donation-based program for heat assistance. This is usually used in emergency situations for anyone who does not qualify for General Assistance.
- If you are in need and have not already applied for LIHEAP heating assistance, you may do so by contacting KVCAP at 800-542-8227
- Please contact CMP to set up a payment plan if you are unable to make your winter payments. You should make a plan and pay each month toward your electric bill to avoid shutoff in the Spring. GA may provide limited assistance with CMP bills in the Spring.
- You can find additional resources at 211maine.org, dial 211, or text your zip code to 898-211.

You can use the General Assistance application to apply for GA and the Town Heat Assistance Fund. The applications can be found in the office and in the green mailbox by the front door to the Town Office. Please call the office for an appointment with GA.


etc.); over 50 older books on sale for unbeatable prices; and 6 colorful mosaics made out of book covers and pages which will be available through a silent auction.

Tax Year 2024 Property Tax Bills

2024 Real Estate and Personal Property Tax Bills were mailed September 20th. Please contact the Town Office if you have not received your tax bill or have any questions.

Your tax bill is due in two payments – Nov. 1st and May 1st. At the bottom of your bill are two payment coupons. You will NOT receive a bill for the second half due in May. For anyone whose taxes are not paid through escrow, please mark your calendar now for both due dates.

Tax Club coupon books were mailed out on September 21st. Please contact our office if you signed up for Tax Club but have not received your payment booklet. Your payments are due on the 15th of each month.

If you owe back taxes, your payment will be applied to the oldest first. Should you make either payment late, you will incur interest. If you are unsure of how much you owe, you may contact our office at any time.

Referendum Election - November 7, 2023

Referendum Elections are held to provide Maine's citizens an opportunity to vote on People's Veto Referenda, Direct Initiatives of Legislation (i.e. Citizen Initiatives), Bond Issues, other referenda proposed by the Legislature, and Constitutional Amendments. Referendum elections are an important part of the heritage of public participation in Maine.

Questions Appearing on the November 7, 2023 Ballot

Question 1: Citizen Initiative

An Act to Require Voter Approval of Certain Borrowing by Government-controlled Entities and Utilities and to Provide Voters More Information Regarding That Borrowing

Do you want to bar some quasi-governmental entities and all consumer-owned electric utilities from taking on more than \$1 billion in debt unless they get statewide voter approval?

Question 2: Citizen Initiative

An Act to Prohibit Campaign Spending by Foreign Governments and Promote an Anticorruption Amendment to the United States Constitution

Do you want to ban foreign governments and entities that they own, control, or influence from making campaign contributions or financing communications for or against candidates or ballot questions?

Question 3: Citizen Initiative

An Act to Create the Pine Tree Power Company, a Nonprofit, Customer-owned Utility

Do you want to create a new power company governed by an elected board to acquire and operate existing for-profit electricity transmission and distribution facilities in Maine?

Question 4: Citizen Initiative

An Act Regarding Automotive Right to Repair

Do you want to require vehicle manufacturers to standardize on-board diagnostic systems and provide remote access to those systems and mechanical data to owners and independent repair facilities?

Question 5: Constitutional Amendment

RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Maine Regarding the Timing of Judicial Review of the Determination of the Validity of Written Petitions

Do you favor amending the Constitution of Maine to change the time period for judicial review of the validity of written petitions from within 100 days from the date of filing to within 100 business days from the date of filing of a written petition in the office of the Secretary of State, with an exception for petitions filed within 30 calendar days before or after a general election?

Question 6: Constitutional Amendment

RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Maine to Require All Provisions in the Constitution to Be Included in the Official Printing

Do you favor amending the Constitution of Maine to require that all of the provisions of the Constitution be included in the official printed copies of the Constitution prepared by the Secretary of State?

Question 7: Constitutional Amendment

RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Maine to Align the Proceedings for Circulating Written Petitions for People's Vetoes and Direct Initiatives with Federal Law

Do you favor amending the Constitution of Maine to remove a provision requiring a circulator of a citizen's initiative or people's veto petition to be a resident of Maine and a registered voter in Maine, requirements that have been ruled unconstitutional in federal court?

Question 8: Constitutional Amendment

RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Maine to Allow Persons Under Guardianship for Mental Illness to Be Electors

Do you favor amending the Constitution of Maine to remove a provision prohibiting a person under guardianship for reasons of mental illness from voting for Governor, Senators and Representatives, which the United States District Court for the District of Maine found violates the United States Constitution and federal law?
