Rides in Neighbors Cars

Rides in Neighbors Cars began with the idea of helping increase the independence of people who can no longer drive by matching people who need a ride with people willing to give a ride. Rides are provided to Bowdoinham and Bowdoin residents age 60 + and those with a disability that prevent them from driving safely. A ride can be scheduled for a nonemergency medical appointment or to go shopping or do an errand. The program can be used to get a ride to church, use the Bowdoinham Food Pantry or Library or even to help get a pet to a vet appointment.

Over the years, RIDES has grown. In 2019, volunteer drivers provided 251 trips that took 627 hours and encompassed 10,332 miles.

When the pandemic began and many appointments were canceled, we dropped to 3-4 drivers that served several clients. Now, in 2021, we are back to a dozen clients, but unfortunately, we have lost some drivers.

Volunteer drivers find the program rewarding. One driver commented, "I have especially enjoyed getting to know our elder Bowdoinham/Bowdoin residents. I have learned so much about their lives and the history of our community." And the riders are very appreciative— "This program means EVERYTHING to me. It has allowed me to stay in my own home even though I cannot drive."

If you have just a little bit of extra time in your week and could volunteer to offer a

ride, we welcome you to join our group of volunteers. You might choose to help someone get to a regularly scheduled weekly appointment or you might only be able to offer rides every now and then. You can choose your availability monthly and typically drivers take 1 to 5 trips per month. Please call 207-837-9577 for information on how to get started with us.

This project is a crucial step in overcoming digital barriers and helping older residents engage more fully in the life of our community.

The Library is actively recruiting volunteers for this project who have a working knowledge of any Android, Windows, or Apple device. Expertise is not necessary. We are looking for individuals who are compassionate, good listeners and communicators, and who can address issues in a clear and logical manner. Volunteers will be asked to participate in four hours of training with our consultants in September and October. Beyond that, participation will be subject to a volunteer's interest and availability.

Road Work

t Town Meeting, a \$900,000 bond was approved for road work and the paving of the Fire Station Parking lot. The Town has hired All States Construction to pave the middle section (section 2) of Carding Machine Road and Dingley Road. We expect this work to be done in October. Until then, Public Works will continue to replace culverts and work on the ditching on Dingley Road.

The Townspeople also approved a \$250,000 bond for the Mallon Brook Stream Crossing on Dingley Road to match the \$125,000 stream crossing grant the Town has been awarded. The Town is expecting to complete this project between July and October 2022.

Bowdoinham Cemetery Advisory Committee

uring the summer, the Committee met monthly except for July. At our August meeting, we welcomed a new member, Linda Temple, who has been an active volunteer for several years. We have focused mostly on assessing the conditions and needs of various plots and reporting them to the Town Manager, Nicole Briand and the Public Works Foreman, Tobey Frizzle. The Public Works crew have been great about checking out complaints and problems and correcting them or reporting back to BCAC or the Town Manager of any needs.

Daniel Samaha recently confirmed that he is the Keeper for the Coombs- Buker Cemetery on the River Road and has been for at least 10 years. Carissa Jefferson has become the Keeper of the Preble-Grant Plot on the north end of the River Road and has requested assistance in removing a hanging tree limb. Public Works will be taking care of this. Sam Tome, current Keeper of the Pratt Cemetery on Wildes Road is upgrading the fencing and placing a stone on the unmarked grave of an early Pratt couple. He has also taken on being the Keeper for the Sedgley Plot and the Reed Tomb, both located in the State Game Preserve on the end of Wildes Road. Linda Temple, Karen Tilbor, and Susan Tuttle are looking for "2 or 3 burying grounds on the east side of the Abagadasset River near the Dinsmore Mill site." Access from the River Road is difficult due to very rough terrain near the Riverbank; they hope to get to the area via the river. The above information about these possible sites came from Ed Webber to Marilyn Hinckley in the 70's. The Blair and Libby plots in the Carding Machine Road

area have not yet been found and may be these, as there was a Blair Family on that side of the river according to Helen Graves in "Along the Abagadasset 1738 to 1934." Any hunter, fishers, and foragers out there, have you ever seen anything suggesting a burial site along the upper Abagadasset

We haven't firmed up plans yet but hope to coordinate a volunteer effort assisting Susan Tuttle for a clean-up in the Browne Cemetery. We also hope to organize a Town-wide assessment and cleanup weekend in the old Meeting House Burying Ground and the adjacent Adams-Cromwell Cemetery on Abagadasset Road. These are two of our oldest cemeteries and have never really been worked on. If confirmed dates will be posted on Bowdoinham.com and Facebook. September and October are good times for such work!

Our applications for the summer MOCA Training Workshop in South Thomaston were not accepted. This is very disappointing, as I felt we were all but promised some slots. However, Nicole, Tobey, and the BCAC are working on a plan to develop our own training and equipment for some restoration, repairing and resetting. The tree removal and trimming has been completed for now in the Village Burying Ground, and Public Works is keeping it well groomed. However, many stones are in rough shape, and we are shocked at how many stones and fencing has gone down over the bank toward Sampson Brook. Erosion and unauthorized "tossing" seem to be the major issues. Nicole is looking into state regulation and support in dealing with this. Nicole has the "draft" of the revised Policy for Maintenance of the Town Cemeteries to be finalized by the Select Board.

Tips for Air Travel

Especially Elders

n April, I made my familiar trip back from the West Coast, flying from Seattle, WA back to Portland, ME. The airports and planes were still fairly empty which made things much easier for travelers. However, there are still huge challenges, especially for elders.

Take the offered ride

Before I got my bionic hip and knees, airports proved too huge and painful for me to walk. I started to request a wheelchair when I booked my ticket. Life became much easier. Wheelchairs are whisked through lesser known and often uncrowded corridors. On one hilarious occasion my aide rushed me down ramps and through emergency exits and secret tunnels which got me to a departing bus in time. There are also the multi-passenger carts which can hailed more spontaneously by simply stopping one or asking airport staff to get one for you.

Pack light

The airlines are not letting plane staff lift your luggage to the overhead racks (and why haven't they switched the storage bins to put them under the seats?!). Understandable since people have huge and heavy carry-on bags these days. You can still ask strong and kind fellow passengers to lift your roll-on bag into the overhead bin, but you may have to do it yourself in a pinch I can travel indefinitely with a small roll

Prepare for the Security Xray check

Wear slip on shoes or bedroom slippers Use the bathroom before you join the security line as waiting times are unpredictable. Label ALL electronic and electrical devices - put your name on hearing aid chargers and electric toothbrushes, Kindles, phones, electric razors, keys. This is a wonderful use for all the name/address labels you get free from charity organizations. To be extra safe, photograph all devices. Any device can trip the Xray scan - it will then have to be scanned a second time in a different number of bins. This is how I got separated from my hearing aid charger. Count carefully the number of individual bins you fill to run through security, especially if you have to do it a second time. Let the security person know if you have any artificial joints or metals in you.

And one last tip that I got from a savvy traveler (important even in a pandemic) USE every nice bathroom you come to ahead of time.

Nazarene News

s of August, the Bowdoinham First Church of the Nazarene celebrated 73 years in our community. Sarah Stapler recently noted that the high winds last winter had blown shingles off the church roof which sits just below the Town Hall, the highest point in Bowdoinham. So, in an ongoing effort to maintain this beautiful church, the congregation decided to have the roof replaced. The last nine years the church has had the leadership of Pastor Christina Couch, who has put her heart and soul into maintaining the

church and helping it to grow and be a place where anyone can feel welcome.

The Church, originally named "Church of the Redeemer," was built for the Universalist Society in 1890 by John P. Rideout, a shipbuilder, and the great-grandfather of Linwood Rideout, part of a longtime family Bowdoinham family. The church closed in 1925 and was empty for over 20 years, until Linwood Bishop and Rev. Harland C. Joyce met in 1948. Mr. Bishop, who had gotten married in the church, held the deed so that it would not be turned into a garage, allowed Rev. Joyce to hold meetings there. Soon after those began Mr. Bishop, with the encouragement and facilitation of Rev. Joyce, sold the church to the Nazarene denomination. Thus began the history of The First Church of the Nazarene.

Over the last 73 years, many longtime families of Bowdoinham have continued to be a part of this church, along with families from other communities. Because it is among the beautiful buildings in the center of Bowdoinham, it is important to the congregation to maintain this 131-year-old church. It has retained the original stained-glass windows, chandeliers, and much of the woodwork. In addition to a new roof, work will continue on the exterior painting, thanks to a generous donation from Tom and Betty DeForeest, who also married in the church.

Upcoming Exhibit

"Beyond the Blues"

This is an exhibit of traditional and contemporary Shibori textile art by Kathleen Goddu. Shibori is an ancient Japanese process of folding, clamping, twisting, stitching, plaiting fabric and compressing it before dying in indigo to resist the dye from entering certain parts of the fabric. This creates a 3-D effect on a 2-D surface. There are hundreds of patterns and processes.

Beyond the Blues also offers textiles that demonstrate color blending with natural dyes and other dyes using Shibori techniques. There will be wall hangings, scarves, and home décor items for sale.

hank you to the Board of Selectmen and the Town of Bowdoinham for their support of Merrymeeting Hall which allows us to offer free use of the Hall to any Town connected group, Bowdoinham Non-profits, and other community groups!

For private parties, we charge \$100 per event in summer and \$150 in winter. If you use the kitchen for extensive cooking or do not clean the Hall after use, other fees apply.

Slowly groups such as "Singing Bowl" are returning, and folks are scheduling showers and parties!

Merrymeeting hall will be the site of BHS's contributions to Celebrate Bowdoinham, on Saturday, September 11th. They include the presentation and first public display of the Pandemic Quilt: Bowdoinham 1912 to 2012. With this we will also be displaying the Bowdoinham 1762 to 1912 Quilt (finished in 2012), the Barbecue Quilt, and the Coombs School Quilt as well as other Bowdoinham-created quilts.

We also hope to be able to have an "Open House" to show off BHS's new quarters in Merrymeeting Hall's lower level. BHS's "Rideout Research Room and Archive" is close to being finished. Next, we can begin moving materials from the MMH main floor and from our former quarters on the 3rd floor of the Coombs Municipal Building.

We can always use help with this project. It's fun and supports the Historical Society and Merrymeeting Hall. More information will be forthcoming.

We hope there will soon be a TOWN HALL RESTORATION AND PRESERVA-TION COMMITTEE which will work to bring the 1823 Union Church/ Town Hall back into good and useful shape. This iconic building will be 200 years old in 2023. If you don't want to be 'on the official Town committee 'but still want to help, please consider joining 'Friends of the Town Hall', a group of folks who will further this important project in other ways such as volunteering labor or fundraising.

It's September, and kids are returning to school. For our knowledge about Bowdoinham's many schools over the last 250+years, we thank Ella Purington Curtis for her research and article in the book Bowdoinham: The Seventeenth Town in Maine 1762-1962.

Though in 1774, the Town raised money to support two schools which were held in private homes, it wasn't until 1791 that the town was formally divided into three dis-

tricts, and schoolhouses began to be built. As the population of the town grew, more districts were added until in 1870, there were 17 Districts and 17+ schoolhouses. Then as population diminished, so did the number of schools, until in 1940 there were but three rural schools in addition to those in the village. In 1946, it was decided to close the Coombs High School and send students to Brunswick or Richmond. By 1950 a new elementary school was needed. The people of the Town of Bowdoinham built this building, the first part of our Bowdoin-Community School, themselves, literally; funding it with money made at the Bowdoinham Chicken Barbecues.

For a complete school history, pictures, and a map of districts, please look at Ella's article. It is available in the Library in the 1762-1962 Bicentennial Book mentioned above. BHS also has a number of notebooks devoted to schools and school issues. These will be available to enjoy once BHS's new Rideout Research and Reading Room is open in the next month or so.

Once Covid is under control, we hope that young scholars will again attend Jellerson School for a school day in 1910.



rances Perkins, pictured below, (b.1880- d.1965), the first woman to serve in a U.S. presidential cabinet, was Secretary of Labor (1933-1945) for the entire tenure of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Perkins was the driving force behind many



of the groundbreaking New Deal programs that are still the foundation of the American social safety net—Social Security, unemployment insurance, the 40-hour work week, and the minimum wage. Born in Boston, educated in the public schools of Worcester, and a graduate of Mount Holyoke College in South Hadley, Massachusetts, she spent summers throughout her life at her ancestral family homestead in Newcastle, Maine, now a National Historic Landmark owned by the nonprofit, nonpartisan Frances Perkins Center.

Michael Chaney, pictured right, the speaker and Executive Director of the Frances Perkins Center based in Newcastle, ME, with administrative offices and a public exhibit on Main Street in Damariscotta, will present a program and documentary video about the life and legacy of Frances Perkins. Chaney, a native of Alna, ME, holds an undergraduate degree from the University of Maine-Orono and a Master's in history from the University of Connecticut. Before returning to Maine in 2010, Chaney's career was in non-profit management and public history in Vermont and New Hampshire, including, from 2001 to 2009, serving as President and CEO of the New Hampshire Political Library, a nonprofit educational organization founded to preserve New Hampshire's first-in-thenation presidential primary. From 2010 until 2014, Chaney was the Executive Director of the Yarmouth (Maine) Historical Soci-

The program is sponsored by the Loose Ladies Book Club which is in its 19th year and it is in memory of Louise Huntington,



a member who was an avid reader and lover of biographies.

About the Frances Perkins Center The Frances Perkins Center is dedicated to honoring and preserving the legacy of the woman behind the New Deal by continuing Frances Perkins' work for social justice and economic security and by preserving for future generations her nationally significant family homestead in Newcastle, Maine. The Homestead is currently undergoing a major restoration project and will open to the public in 2022.
