Temporary Crosswalk and Gateway Demonstration Project

n response to reports of speeding traffic along Route 24 and concerns of pedestrian safety crossing this road at the Main Street intersection to move pedestrians to our waterfront park, the town has partnered with the Bicycle Coalition of Maine and Maine Department of Transportation to install temporary traffic calming and placemaking features including:

- A temporary crosswalk connecting the existing sidewalk and landing at the southwest corner of Main Street and Route 24 across Route 24 to the northeast corner of Main Street and Route 24 at the Three Robbers restaurant;
- A temporary landing in front of Three Robbers Pub using 4-foot-long planters;
- Delineator gateways at all four corners of the intersection.

The installations will seek to slow motorist traffic to the posted speed limit and give pedestrians the safest directive and peace of mind as they navigate this intersection during our busy summer and fall months. We will use this project to gain feedback from the community on how a crosswalk is received. There are funding sources available to work towards a more permanent solution and the survey data we collect on this project could be used to support the next step.

Project Details

The location of the crosswalk must meet Maine DOT sight line and speed limit requirements. While it has been observed that pedestrians have been crossing Rt. 24 at the corner of the Masonic Lodge, a crosswalk here does not meet sightline requirements which has dictated its current location.

Further, DOT requires a safe landing for the terminus of the crosswalk. This includes an ADA texture pad and landing bolstered



by a curbed sidewalk on both sides to keep vehicles out of the landing. Where this is a temporary solution the placement of two bolted down galvanized tubs decorated as planters acts as this barrier and painted dots and a white line further delineated where a sidewalk would be.

The crosswalk was enhanced with a "gateway" of white delineators (corner posts) positioned where the fog line meets the crosswalk and north of the crosswalk to calm traffic entering and exiting the intersection. Delineators are used to calm traffic by tightening intersections and slowing turning vehicles which improves safety for people walking.

The delineators used are white (for roadway edge) and yellow (for centerline) with matching retro-reflective tape on them for visibility during nighttime hours. The spatial needs of turning vehicles were considered, and delineators were placed to minimize impacts and gateway designs are adjusted as needed to meet the needs of the location. With the number of large



vehicles using this intersection we moved the delineator back several yards from the intersection. However, the experiment still proved that a center line delineator would not be effective and was quickly removed.

This project is intended to be seasonal. Delineators will be removed no later than November 5, 2023 or sooner by Bowdoinham staff. With the repaving of Rt. 24 the scheduled for the end of August the project might be removed before Celebrate Bowdoinham on September 16, 2023.

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Town Hall Preservation

hen you drive into town via Route 24, the Town Hall steeple is there above the trees to greet you, as it has been since the late 1880s. I'm reminded of the words of Silas Adams, author of History of Bowdoinham, Maine, who called the Town Hall the "conspicuous landmark of this Town." This majestic icon is featured prominently on the plates celebrating Bowdoinham's 250th anniversary. Now, the future of this "vigilant sentinel" has reached a crisis point. Since 1959, when my family came to this town, the Town Hall has become Intertwined with some of my fondest memories. I'm sure others could say the same. I can't imagine looking up and not seeing that steeple on the hill. Based on comments shared at June's Town Meeting, many others feel the same way.

To be fair, there are some who think tearing down the building is the best option. While that may seem like an easy solution, that too may have a significant cost. That same funding could support some of the major repairs needed to stabilize the building. Removal of the Town Hall may create space for a parking lot, but this historic icon would be gone forever, along with the largest closed-in community space available in town. Restoration provides an opportunity to finally realize the goal of the 1990s improvement efforts to revitalize and update the building so that it pays for itself. Once again, the building could host holiday shows for the Artist's Guild, rummage sales for the Community School, Contra dances, family celebrations, and maybe some new endeavors,

like public theater or line dancing.

As I've shared before, preserving the Town Hall will need to be a community efforts, through financial support from the community, major fundraising, volunteering for work projects and supporting Town initiatives. I'm confident that if we roll up our sleeves and turn on that famous Bowdoinham spirit, we can get this done!

Celebrate Bowdoinham (September 15-16) We will have a booth at the waterfront with lots of information on our committee's past/present/future work. STOP BY!! We will also have a presence in the Town parade.

Universal Design: The Age-Friendly Bowdoinham Committee is committed to spreading the concept of Universal Design which promotes features in public and private spaces that allow for easy use by people of all ages and abilities. We were delighted to receive funding from AARP to develop a Guide for homeowners showing the many ways we can incorporate universal design when we update, remodel and build our homes. The Guide is expected to be available in late Fall.

Our committee continues to work with several other town committees to keep our concerns in their discussions. The Housing Advisory Committee is looking at ways to help create affordable housing options for both young families and older adults as the town grows. The new town provision for allowing Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) is an important step in this direction. Jeremy Cluchey and Peggy Muir are part of the group looking at a future rail trail which hopefully will have provisions for people of all ages: the long distance biker and hiker,

less abled walkers who may want a short walk to a lovely shelter, young families who want to explore and play, and daily walkers. We had an assessment of our waterfront trails by Enoch Giddens, a disability advocate, who has submitted his recommendations.

We met with Debbie Atwood, Volunteer Engagement Director for Habitat for Humanity in July. This organization is now focusing on home repair which include ramps, minor electrical and plumbing and general repairs but does not include roofs, window weatherization or major electrical and plumbing work. There is a \$1500 limit to materials per project, which does not include materials available through Restore. Labor is covered by volunteers who are covered by liability insurance through Habitat. The program is restricted to homeowners who must complete the application on the Habitat website and meet their income guidelines. We will have information on this at our Celebrate Bowdoinham table down at the waterfront.

Resource Guide and Flyers: The Committee has spent extensive time updating the current Resource Guide for older adults. The updated version focuses on local services and programs that are free or at little cost in each of the following areas: Referral & Assistance, Housing & Repair, Support Services, Health & Wellness, Financial Relief, and Social & Education. A laminated one-page flyer is available at the Town Office for easy access to the most commonly used services. The full Resource Guide can be found on the Age Friendly website at www.bowdoinham.com/project/resource-directory-older-adults-bowdoinham or copies will be available at the Town Office upon request.

TRAVEL

Summer is a time for travel. Thousands of tourists come to Maine and thousands of Mainers travel to other places. Travel can be a major challenge for people of any age, but especially for the elderly. It really helps if you research and plan ahead of time! Some transportation hubs are well-planned and some are not. Some tourist sites are well equipped for people of all abilities, and some are not!

Parksandtrailsandbeachesvaryinaccessibility. Popham Beach has a good long beach "ramp" access for wheelchairs. Range Pond too.

The Portland bus and train stations provide quite easy access to trains and buses with only short distances to manage and lots of seating available, although challenged people (not in wheelchairs) still have to hoist themselves up the narrow bus steps.

It helps to order a wheelchair ahead of time for airports! You can be met at the curbs and at the plane with both a chair and aide. During one trip before my knees and hip replacements a fabulous aide zipped me from my plane through crowds and secret back passages and I made an earlier bus connection than expected. On other trips I've had to wrestle my roller bag through endless corridors and up/down stairs.

I spent part of the year near Seattle and have learned about elder travel the hard way. Airports and trains and buses and ferries have major challenges. The famous ferries from Seattle to many islands in Washington State are a good example—the ferry I need to take has a necessary walk of almost 3/4s of a mile with little seating and no visible assistance or assistants! Recent expensive renovations have made matters worse and seem to have little accommodation for the less abled visitors. And - yes - I've "voiced" my complaints and suggestions.

Many places assume that someone in a wheelchair will automatically have a companion. At one doctor's office in Portland there is a sign at the front door (with its step up) that says "Inquire about ramp at desk inside.

Just be warned. Prepare for travel if you or a companion have mobility issues and let's be vocal in asking for aids and aides!

Updates on the Plan:

The Housing Action Committee, which is a subcommittee of the Comprehensive Planning Committee, has resumed meeting on the 1st Wednesday of each month at 6:00-7:30, in the Kendall Room of the Coombs Building.

- Any person who lives in Bowdoinham is invited to attend especially builders, planners, people interested in living in town, people just generally interested in the topic, etc.
- These meetings build on the Housing Community Conversations co-hosted by BCDI and the Comprehensive Planning

Committee.

About 1/3 of residents in Bowdoinham are over age 60 and many are interested in staying here as they grow older. There has also been a big jump in under-10 year-olds. Young families also need housing. There are not as many rental properties in town as are needed, and housing is very expensive in general. There are lots of challenges in the area of housing all over Maine and the country. This committee is working on identifying needed and doable changes as soon as possible, including possible changes to Land Use ordinances and the process of building permits.

ell, we finally did it! The BCAC held a teaching and stone cleaning workshop at the Village Burying Ground on July 15. (The one scheduled in June had to be cancelled due to heavy rains). A total of 12 people, 4 BCAC members, Frank Connors, the Sexton and Tobey Frizzle, Public Works Foreman, and 6 community volunteers cleaned 35 stones and raised and reset a stone. Tobey brought down the Town truck with water and other supplies. A lot of water is needed for stone cleaning! We also brought cemetery cleaning kits, bug dope and sunscreen (not needed!) It was overcast but pleasant. Volunteers started arriving at 9AM. Peter and Nina signed them in, while Linda and Elaine and Tobey distributed cleaning kits and taught cleaning techniques. Frank Connors soon arrived from a burial at the other end of the Cemetery. The following people came, learned and worked! Steve Ciembroniewiez, Rick Leach a local stone mason. Both of these men are close neighbors of the VBG. Also, Amy Rudsznis, Karen Tilbor, a former BCAC member who helped teach others, and Nathan Stroyer, an amazing worker, who did more than 10 stones, himself! Elisa Diaz was unable to come in the morning but arrived at noon and helped with the finishing and cleanup.

Cemetery News



Frank brought a long tool for raising stones; and he and Tobey and Rick Leach, who supplied stone fill from his own business, raised and reset the fallen stone of Percy Tibbets, with just manpower, no other equipment. A lot of work, for a scheduled 2 ½ hour work session, but people actually stayed until after 1:30!

The next two VBG Workshops are scheduled on August 12 and September 9, 9AM to 12:30. And we plan to assist Susan Tuttle, the Keeper, with a cleanup in October. Meanwhile Linda and Elaine will be contacting Keepers, delivering kits and updating cemetery assessments. Nina, as Chair continues to work with the Town on finances, and Peter on making All Cemetery information accessible on a Town website. The BCAC will not have meetings in November or December of this year, but will resume in January 2024 on first Thursdays at 4PM in the Coombs Building. We hope to have more new members by then!



◆Tax Liens were applied August 25, 2023 on all outstanding 2023 real estate property taxes

If you have not paid your property tax, please do so as soon as possible. If you have any questions, please contact our office at (207)666-5531.

Only Guaranteed Funds (i.e., cash, money order or pre-paid bank check) will be accepted for:

- ◆ Payment of real estate taxes within thirty (30) business days of the anticipated date of lien filing or impending foreclosure.
- ◆Payoff or Discharge of existing lien or foreclosure.

Personal or Business Checks may be accepted for partial payments of accounts with existing liens or foreclosures.

Tax Year 2024 Property Tax Bills

2024 Real Estate and Personal Property Tax Bills will be mailed out soon. Please watch for an envelope from the Town of Bowdoinham.

Your tax bill is due in two payments – the 1st of Nov. and May. At the bottom of your bill are two payment coupons. You will NOT receive a bill for the second half due in May. For anyone whose taxes are not paid through escrow, please mark your calendar now for both due dates.

If you owe back taxes, your payment will be applied to the oldest bill first. Should you make either payment late, you will incur interest. If you are unsure of how much you owe, you may contact our office at any time.

Do You Work From Home?

The library is excited to announce a new initiative to better meet the needs of local entrepreneurs,



farmers, artisans and other professionals working from home. Whether selfemployed or teleworking, working alone can sometimes be challenging and isolating. As part of a larger, grant-funded project titled "Remote Work in Libraries", the goal is to make the Bowdoinham Public Library the "go to" place for remote workers. Whether the need is a change in scenery, a replacement computer, access to high-speed internet during unexpected crashes, scheduled access to a room and video equipment for in-person or zoom meetings with clients, assistance with a research project, or a place for random and intentional collaboration - the library wants to help. This Fall, the Library will begin hosting informal conversations with at-home workers to help guide our efforts so we stay attuned and responsive to their needs in a rapidly changing environment. Grant funding is from the Maine State Library and Maine's Department of Economic Development.

We have an annual stipend to offer the right person; someone who is organized and personable and familiar with social media platforms as well as Google tools. New Kindles and iPad classes

Thanks to a grant from the Maine Community Foundation, the library now has three Kindle Fires to loan with a Bowdoinham library card. Read the latest e-book, listen to an audio book with provided headphones or just surf the web. Free of charge and available for a three-week loan. Instruction available by appointment.

We will be hosting a class an in-person class (with a remote instructor from NEDC) called "iPad Basics". It is a three part class meeting three times for one hour, on September 19, 20,21st. This course covers the basics of how to use Apple's popular iPad. The class starts with the basics of how to log on using multiple methods from passcode to touch id to face recognition technology. Apple's iCloud service will be discussed, including how it will help secure your data and allow your data to be used across multiple Apple devices. BUYER BE INFORMED: Private Sales

When purchasing a motor vehicle, motorcycle, trailer, boat, ATV or snowmobile from a private sale there are a few things you need to make sure the seller can give you before you buy so that you can register your purchase.

<u>Bill of Sale</u>: Containing the following information:

- Vin Number, Year, Make and Model
- Both the Seller and Buyers name, address, and signatures
- Date of sale
- Amount of sale

<u>Title</u>: These are required for the items listed below if they are 1995 or newer.

- All motor vehicles except special mobile equipment.
- Trailers over 3,000 lbs. (unladen weight)
- Motorcycles with engines 300 CC and over

Name on Title should be the name of the Seller, if not see special circumstances below. All fields on the top part of the backside of the Title must be clearly filled in. The State of Maine does not allow cross outs or white outs. If a mistake is made an MVT-16 form

(essentially a form similar to the top part of the Title) needs to be clearly filled in and attached to the original Title.

All owners written on the front of the Title must sign the back of the Title and the Bill of Sale.

Boats, ATV & Snowmobiles: It is helpful but not necessary to have the previous owner's last registration or the last sticker number. This just makes it easier to find the vehicle in MOSES, the Inland Fisheries & Wildlife system.

<u>Sales Tax</u>: The State of Maine requires you to pay Use Tax at the time of registration. This is 5.5% of the price paid.

Special Circumstances on Titles:

- <u>Previous owner(s)</u> is deceased: The seller needs to give you a copy of the Death Certificate as well as a copy of their Personal Representative papers. If the Seller is the spouse of the deceased and their name is on the Title, they also need to give you a copy of the Death Certificate.
- The Seller is not the name of the owner listed on the title: This could happen if

the Seller never registered or titled the vehicle. The previous owner transferred ownership by filling in and signing the back of the title over to the Seller. The Seller needs to title the vehicle and sign that title over to you before you can register it. Or give you the Bill of Sale they received from the Owner(s) on the title, the filled in Title with the Seller as the buyer, a clearly filled in MVT-16 form transferring ownership from the Seller to you and a Bill of Sale from the Seller to you. You will then have to pay for Double Title fee at time of registration (\$66).

• The Seller is a third party: If the seller is not the owner on the title or the person listed as the buyer on the back of the title: The Seller must title before selling the vehicle.

<u>Disclaimer</u>: This information in no way covers all or every scenario, only the most common ones that we have seen in the Town Office. If you have questions, you can always call the Town Office and we can help direct you on this matter. If we do not have the answers, we can get them for you.

Bowdoinham School Community students will notice a big change this year when they head back to school: a free market in the gym foyer! The Falcon Market is essentially a satellite pantry. Shelf-stable food, snacks and personal hygiene items will be available for student and teacher access. During the months that fresh produce is abundant, the Market will offer a sharing table of fresh vegetables and fruit open to the school community. Additionally, the Market will be stocked with seasonal gear and a closet of clothes. Our goal is to engage the fourth and fifth graders in this endeavor, having them restock and occasionally "staff' the Market to encourage younger students to use its services. We're also working on

connecting with a few highschool students to staff the Market each Friday afternoon. During school events such as Open = House and the Art Show, the Market will be open to the school community.

This idea was born out of necessity and a recent cut to our prodramming. In early May, we were notified by Mid Coast Hunger Prevention Program (MCHPP) that they would be eliminating their Backpack and Snack Programs at the end of last school year. For years they've sent bi-weekly prepackaged bags of shelf-stable food, which we distributed along with our own "Backpacks" consisting of two breakfasts, two lunches, two dinners and a whole lot of snacks. The goal of these bags, which are delivered to homes each week, is to bridge the gap over the weekend when kiddos don't have access to school meals. Additionally, MCHPP made bi-weekly deliveries to the Bowdoinham Community School of snack foods that teachers could access for. kiddos who were unable to bring a snack from home. As of June 16th, both of these programs ceased.

As you might imagine, this news has been met with a great deal of worry. While our robust Backpack Program will continue to run "business as usual" - minus those white bags from MCHPP - the real Concern is at the elementary school where snacks are no longer provided. Nicole Dunton, Bowdoinham Community School's social worker immediately got to work assessing just how important these snacks are to the school. community. She conducted a survey (as you might have guessed) that these snacks were indispensable to keeping little bellies full during the school day. The two * large totes of snacks rarely lasted the whole two weeks and many teachers regularly supplemented out of their own pockets to provide snacks for their classrooms. She was determined to find a way to support students. Nicole, Chris Lajoie, the school principal, and I sat down to find a solution. The Falcon Market was born. We had a clear vision of what we hoped this Market could be, but we needed to find the funding. With Bowdoinham being the community it is, that didn't take long. Tourtelotte Excavation and Bowdoinham Gas & Diesel stepped up and donated \$1000 to get this project underway! Because of this generous donation we were able to get the Market up and running THIS school year.

Parent Partnership members Kayla Samson, Elaine DeFreitas and Sarah McLaughlin have been instrumental in making this project a reality; we are so grateful for their support and hard work.

The infrastructure is in place; now we need your help. We are looking for monthly sponsors. For \$300 you can support the Market for an entire month! That means helping more than 180 kiddos have full bellies! Consider combining resources with another family or two; ask a grandparent (they love feeding kids) or even approaching your employer! Or perhaps consider supporting in another way, such as holding a back-to-school snack drive!

For the past eight years, we have been committed to providing transportation for residents who are 60+ and those with a disability that prevents them from driving safely. Stones that tell stories: Putting the Graves' Gravestones Back

Norman would be so pleased.

For years, my father-in-law Norman Marriner and I made random and "business" visits to our Town's old Ridge Cemetery, and each visit would end with what became, "Norman's lament," a walk to the back of the Cemetery where six of his ancestor's gravestones lay broken and on their faces. "We can't even know who is who," he'd say.

Well, all that changed this summer, after a chance meeting with Albert Stehle over hot dogs at the Bowdoinham Country Store. Albert is well known in our area, but who knew he had a little Business called, **Ridge Preservation?** We talked, he knew the site I described, and three days later, we met at the cemetery, found six marble stones, facedown, broken and askew from their original granite bases. Albert, who says he's, "preserving Maine history, one stone at a time," and I, a long-time local Sexton with questionable stone repair experience, went to work. We picked the stones with his handy, dandy tripod and chain fall. Once they were safely out of the way, and laying face UP so Jane could see and research the names, we rolled those six-foot granite bases away, dug out

the old cement foundations, and set a new foundation, using crushed stone the Public Works crew delivered. Working evenings and between rainstorms, the old bases landed on the new foundation, and the marble stones of two generations of James Graves gravestones were drilled, repined, cleaned and almost lovingly replaced to their 19th Century positions. James Graves' stone (1811-1893) and his son James Graves' stone (1853-1901) with their wives, were erect again, almost sparkling in the west sky sunset.

I was pleased, and finally, so would be Norman!





Find the stones. Drive Ridge Road past the Community School, the cemetery is on your left, nearly four miles from the Village. Enter the Cemetery, using the first gate drive three-quarters of the way toward the woods, you won't miss the stones, standing like proud soldiers, on your right side.

Summer residents living on Gotts Island had an affect on Ruth, introducing her to literature and encouraging her to go to








Pickleball - noun. pick-le-ball / pikəl-böl. plural pickleballs: an indoor or outdoor game that is played on a level court with short-handled paddles and a perforated plastic ball volleyed over a low net by two players or pairs of players.

This sport is gaining notoriety and interest all across the country. And our little town has not been lost in the mix. We have received a lot of questions about the availability of pickleball, a family friendly activity, at our recreation courts.

Some may have noticed the Public Works crew working diligently this summer to install new drainage piping and stone around the perimeter of the basketball and tennis courts, as well as our baseball and softball fields. Their hard work will help to ensure we don't encounter another "Grand Canyon" crack through the middle of our courts like those that have appeared over the last few years.





The next step in the restoration of our courts, in partnership SAD #75, was to have a court specialty company, clean, pressure wash, repair, resurface and repaint both the basketball and tennis courts. And, included in this repainting process, was the installation of the long-desired pickleball court lines. The addition of four regulation pickleball courts, along with some existing and some new nets, sets up the opportunity to finally bring (back) an organized pickleball program to Bowdoinham.

In addition to regular playing times, we are also bringing in experts to help with instruction for those who aren't familiar with the game. This is a game that is easy to learn, fun to play and great for all ages and abilities. - ◆General Assistance (GA) is a program administered by the Town in coordination with Maine DHHS. Applicants must qualify financially and show that they are in need of assistance.
- ↑ Heat Assistance Fund the Town of Bowdoinham has a donation-based program for heat assistance. This is usually used in emergency situations for anyone who does not qualify for General Assistance.

You can use the General Assistance application to apply for both programs. The applications can be found in the office and in the green mailbox by the front door to the Town Office.
